DOOMED: Allied Bombers In Race With Time To Crush German War Plants Before Invasion Deadline



VICTORY-THROUGH-AIR-POWER theories face an acid test. The greatest air-bittz ever conceived is now or the Allied blueprint and these are the places marked for destruction. It may begin at any moment. A definite deadline has been set for its accomplishment. The tensely dramatic question is raised: Can Germany be pushed to the point of surrender by air force alone? Britain's Air Marshal Harris and America's Gen. Arnold are ready for this race against time. It's these targets against innumerable Allied lives! When the deadline limit is reached, the plans agreed upon at the Moscow Conference calls for the beginning of ground invasion when "the hour strikes." Much depends on the ability of American air forces to carry out daylight precision bombing attacks. Centers of fighter plane production are highlighted in the raid plans and it is estimated that success would reduce German fighter strength to less than a thousand planes. (International

The Government has recently announced a Dairy Feed Paymer Program for the last quarter of 1943 in order that the produce may not suffer from the sharp advance in feed prices. All appli cations must be submitted to the real AAA Officer by November 30t., in tead of November 30th. previously announced.

Payment will be made on the llowing schedule: Whole Milk-50c per hundred

Putterfat-6c per pound.

Butter-4 8/10c per pound. Application for payment will be at the Eastland County AAA Office by those who are to eceive payment. Payment will be nade direct from the AAA office to producers who furnish in person satisfactory evidence of sales. Receipts showing date, name of eller, name of buyer and amount of sale will be considered satisactory evidence. Those who are mable to furnish written evidence nay make a personal certification of the amount sold, number of cows milked, amount and type of feed used, and customers served. Buy DEFENSE BONDS And STAMPS

Administration's Efforts to Balk Inflation Near Failure

OPA's Inability to Check Rising Living Costs Blamed

Special to Central Press

 WASHINGTON—Insiders in Washington are willing to admit that the administration's efforts to "hold the line" against inflation have falled and that the stage is being set to permit labor some

The timing of the new policy is aimed at laying the blame for the collapse of the "Little Steel" wage formula at the door of John L. Lewis and his United Mine Workers. But, actually, the real cause of the failure is the unavailing efforts of OPA to check rising living costs-particularly food costs

This factor, in turn, according to some official sources, is directly traceable to the belligerent attitude of congress toward holding down food costs by subsidies.

All factions of organized labor, viewing Lewis' victory and the position of the War Labor Board that the "Little Steel" formula cannot continue without the support of other anti-inflation agencies, smell blood. On to Gain

They are on a concerted campaign to gain con cessions for labor. Railroad workers, steel workers, garment workers and other groups feel the time is ripe to really press for more money. And, in the opinion of Washington observers, they'll get at least a part of whal they're seeking.

. DESPITE ALL THIS GLOOMY OUTLOOK for the forces butthing inflation, OPA is plugging hard to hold the price line. Latest tip in the capital is that the agency soon will slap price ceilings on more grain-oats, rye, barley and hard wheat. Most soft wheat and all corn already are under ceilings and the additional price maximums are planned to keep livestock feed prices down,

. NO MATTER WHERE THEY ARE, Uncle Sam's soldiers, sailors and marines are going to have turkey on Thankagiving Day For service men at home, of course, there will be fresh-killed turkey. but for those abroad the situation will be different.

. THE GERMAN NAVY has changed its U-boat tactics by mounting more anti-aircraft guns on the conning towers and decks of their. subs for protection against U. S. planes. But naval officers are not really worried about it because the subs still are no match for speedy Grumman Avenger bombers and Wikicat fighter planes which now operate from escort aircraft carriers, or "baby flat tops."

American attack methods were disclosed recently by the Navy. Wildcat fighters strafe the decks to keep German gun crews busy and Avenger bombers follow in to drop depth bombs

Unlike warships, submarines cannot cover their decks with enough AA guns to offer real protection, especially when four, six and eight planes can cooperate in an attack on a U-boat.

His repartee undoubtedly is of the best, but he has little devices which help him out of many a jam when the quick, bright answer is not One of his most-used dodges is to hurl back a biting reply at the

infortunate questioner who has made an un-wanted inquiry. This invariably brings down the house with the raucous laughter of the 100-odd reporters. When the laughter has died down, the reportervictim is in no frame of mind to repeat the question. Another favorite trick of the president is to devise a stock story

to be used as a reply to a question he knows is going to be asked. For example, when questione on the increasing cost of living, the wident will reply with the story about a housewife he knows who needs more money to fill her larder now than in peacetime,

But, the president triumphantly goints out, she is now-purchasing strawberries in January and asparagus in February-increasing her cost of living by buying out-of-season foods, contrary to her pre-war practice.

Some of the reporters who regularly attend the president's news onference have heard this strawberries and asparagus story three' or four times so far, and it's a safe bet the story will continue to be re-told as long as the waing cost of living is a factor in the news.

KEEPING YOUR WASHER "ON THE JOB"

Don't let your laundry problem get out of hand. If you are the fortunate owner of an electric washer in good condition, keep it that way. You can't buy a new one these days and repair parts are so scarce that a major repair may require weeks of waiting.



#### CHECK YOURSELF ON THESE POINTS

- 1. Don't overload the washer. Fill the tub only to the water line
- and add clothes to the washer's capacity, and co more. 2. When you finish washing, fill tub with clear water, remove the agitator, then drain tub and wipe inside clean with a soft cloth. Don't let dirty water stand in tub overnight.
- 3. Don't overload the wringer. The rolls are rubber, and doubled-
- up blankets, buckles, and heavy buttons may damage the rolls. 4. Clean and dry wringer after use and leave in neutral position so pressure is off the rolls.
- 5. Empty drain hose thoroughly after each use. Avoid sharp
- 6. A noisy washer may be a washer in need of expert attention. Call a qualified service man if washer does not operate properly.

#### Doubling up on lamps conserves light!



By arranging furniture, one lamp can often serve two or more people effectively. But be sure that the lamp isn't too far away from either person.

#### OTHER WAYS TO CONSERVE EYESIGHT AND LIGHT

- Clean lamp bowls and lamp bulbs regularly. Dry thor-oughly before using.
- 2. Keep shade linings light. Clean or brush regularly. Repaint or reline dark-col-ored paper or parchment 5. Have eyes examined regu-
- 3. Sit close enough to the lamp to get all the help it can give your eyes.
- Avoid direct glare from lamp bulbs or bowl by using shades deep enough and big
- larly by a competent eye-sight specialist. Turn off lamps not in use. Lamp bulbs use critical ma-terials. Make them last
- Don't waste Electricity just because it isn't rationed— use what you need, but need what you use.
