WARNS DEALERS

Some well meaning but misinformed people are likely to go without canned and other processed foods in the near future, according to a statement today made by Jack W. Frost, chairman of the Eastland County War Price and Rationing Board.

"We have just learned," Mr. Frost said, "that some grocers in Eastland County have been accep ting BLUE instead of GREEN stamps from Ration Book IV, in payment for rationed processed foods. These blue stamps are not yet valid, and grocers who accept them will find that they cannot be used at this time to replace the goods sold. Only the green stamps in book four are valid now for the purchase of rationad processed

Consumers who use heir blustamps instead of the green stamps in book four now, will be in serious trouble later according to the chairman, because "when the blue stamps become valid the green stamps will have expired and the folks who have already spent the blue ones will not have any valid ration stamps with which to buy canned and bottled

processed foods." "We can prevent any future nisunderstanding like this if merchants or consumers who are in doubt will call the Board office"






