### Dr. Jackson Speaks At 1920 Club Meet

The 1920 Club met Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock in the home of the president, Mrs. W. L. Jackson. Mrs. Hal Lavery, program leader for the afternoon, presented as guest speaker, Dr. W. L. Jackson, who spoke on "Socialized Medicine."

Dr. Jackson felt it his duty to inform the members of the club of this Wagoner-Murray Bill No. 1161 now before congress, which if passed would do away with independent practice of medicine and hospitals and would substitute medical service by the government under one head, who would have dictatorial powers over the entire in the interest of the patient as well as of the doctor, that either be free to choose whom to consult or reject. "It would defeat our very ideals of democracy and destroy private enterprise and competition," the speaker said. Dr. Jackson showed in exact figures how much it would cost the people, although free medical service would sound good, but that one can't get something for nothing. Dr. Jackson asked for everyone to write Representative Russell or Senator Connelly to defeat this bill.
