REDS ANNOUNCE MORE GAINS IN UKRAINE

LONDON, Dec. 16 (UP)- Mon cow told the world Wednesday that the Russians had recaptured sixteen more towns in the Ukraine where battle raged from the captured town of Cherkasy to within five miles of Smela. At the same time the Germans announced two powerful Russian drives in White Russia, possibly presaging a powerful winter drive.

The Russians also reported that Germon forces counterattack ing toward Kiev were shoved back from several populated places south of Malin while a Russian drive toward Kirovograd in the South Ukraine gained improved

A Reuters report that the Russians had succeeded in linking their Kremenchug and Cherkasy bridgeheads across the Middle Dnieper was not specifically confirmed. The town of Lomnvatoe, fifteen miles southeast of Cherkasy and twenty miles east of Smela, was captured, indicating that a junction, if not made, would not

Adair, noted cancer specialist and executive officer of he New York Memorial Hospita.

Asked in an interview if the thousands of wounded-and perhaps gassed-troops would be suseptible to cancer, the noted cancer specialist declare here was no corelation betw he dread disease and the wor sually suffered in battle.
