Proper helpmates are these tactful, discerning, industrious wives. As I watch them working while they play and playing while they work, my Lily Dache, post-war model, is off to them, one and all.

Seldom accented by applause and orchids is the role of the wife of a man in public life. (My French great aunt once said, "Being any man's wife is a hard way for a woman to earn a living.")

Be that as it may, in its Gallic way, the wife of a public man has to be a combination of Eve, Sappho, the Mother of the Gracchi, Portia, Horatia at the Bridge, Polyanna, General Houseworker, Loud Speaker, Soft Voice, Public Relations Expert, Circle, a Valet and a Witch Doctor. She must be unobtrusive and watchful. She must know all and forgive all. She must be Patient (Priscilla) and a Minute Man. She must be everlastingly on the job. And while being all these things she must refrain, in a moment of too great understanding, from leaving the grand piano at her hero.

I've got facts to prove my theme. Begin at the American top. Begin with Mrs. Roosevelt. She's Mr. Roosevelt's Number One. She's the traveling salesman of his administration. If you belong to the school that thinks she travels too much, no matter—this is a traveling craze. You've got to keep moving if it's saving or conquering the world you're bent on.

Mrs. Cordell Hull makes the gentleman who made the Moscow conference click, her complete career. She watches his diet and his rest hours, she receives informally assorted personalities from all parts of the world. She used to give big parties in the grand way before the war.

When the Judge, as some of Mr. Hull's old friends call him, was a congressman running for office, Mrs. Hull went with him on campaign trips up mountains and across creeks. Sometimes she heard him make the same speech six times a day. The wives of most men holding elective offices listen to the same husbandly perorations over and over again and criticize and approve as they listen.

Mrs. Arthur H. Vandenberg, wife of the Michigan senator, is another good wife who is always on the tip of her toes in her husband's interests. Wherever Mrs. Vandenberg goes, it is Old Home Week. Or you think it is. Dozens of friends spring up, Democrats and Republicans, with "Hazel, how wonderful to see you again!" And before you can say "constituent," Mrs. Vandenberg has increased her husband's popularity with her own warm intelligent enthusiasm.

Wives of public men have to be "joiners." They must belong to both intellectual and homey organizations and be ready at any time to whip up a fruit cake, crochet a jacket for a new baby or dash off an essay.

Wives have got to be name rememberers. When the husband forgets whether the man who has just clasped his hand is Dr. Jones, president of the medical society, or Mr. Smith, secretary of the county fair, the wife must prompt with a "Oh, how do you do, Dr. Jones. I hear you read a wonderful paper on flat feet last Tuesday three weeks ago."

Wives of public men have to love constituents and smile at them until the face is about to crack in two. They must entertain and entertain and never show a hint of boredom. They must tote voters to the top of the Washington monument on sightseeing trips or bear the most unchic woman in the entire district to the most chic party in Washington if the moment demands.

Wives must adore state societies and know every officer in the parent-teacher organizations. They must hear no scandals, know no dark deeds. They must believe, openly, only the best of one and all and manufacture a little good if none exists—especially as election day approaches.

Mrs. Robert Taft is a splendid example of a smart wife. The wife of the Ohio senator is amusing and friendly and can make a good speech herself to pinch hit for her husband. Able Mrs. Bennett Champ Clark, wife of the Missouri senator, is another example of a wife who has given support to her husband. So is Mrs. Lister Hill, lovely wife of the senator from Alabama, and Mrs. D. Worth Clark, who helps keep Idaho senatorial constituents pleased with her husband. Mrs. Alben Barkley has aided her husband's career in Kentucky and in Washington as majority leader of the senate.

Mrs. Peter Goeliet Gerry and the senator from Rhode Island are a splendid team. Senator Millard Tydings' beautiful wife makes friends for her senator husband wherever she goes. Mrs. Burton K. Wheeler would fight wildcats for her Montana husband's sake if wildcats were around. Sometimes they are. Pretty Mrs. Claude Pepper never misses a trick that will advance the gentleman from Florida.

Mrs. James W. Fulbright is always an asset to her husband. Mrs. Paul V. McNutt is clever, beautiful and engaging. Mrs. Harlan Fiske Stone, like other ladies of the supreme court, sustains her husband in private and public decisions. Successful diplomatic wives are forever smiling and aware.

The presence of a sympathetic wife gives any public man courage and adds to his discretion. Without the Little Woman nearby he may seem either a pale personality or a little reckless. If I were a man who wished to sell himself to the public and perhaps move in the White House some day, I'd take my wife with me everywhere I went campaigning.
