

BUCLANERK LATTIE LaFitte was the South's most famous pirate — a glamorous and romantic figure. Born in Bordeaux, France, of a well-to-do family, Jean LaFitte ran away to sea before he was seventeen. The U. S. Government forced him from his first kingdom on the island of Barrataria in the Mississippi Delta, and in 1817 he and his men landed on the Island of Galveston and took it for their own. Jean LaFitte stayed on, ravaging the Spanish ships of their golden cargo until 1821. It was after his men had captured and burned a United States Merchant Marine that he was evicted from Galveston for-ever. Men still dig for his buried treasure along the southern coast.


