WASHINGTON, Dec. 81 (UP)
-Admiral Ernest J. King revealed in a statement Thursday that the Allies will begin shifting their power from the Atlantic to the Pacific even before the final defeat of Germany. In an interview he made it clear that a tremendous offensive against the Japanese is planned for 1944.

These were his main points: 1. He agrees with Gen. Dwight O. Eisenhower that defeat of Germany next year may be expected and, meantime, unremitting pressure on Japan will be continued


