Employers Warned On Violation of Child Labor Law

ABILENE, Texas, Feb. 28statement by Jack B. Calvert, Act- in Ranger. ing Manager of the Abilene Soc ial Security Board field office.

"The Social Security Board d es not encourage people to obtai social security account cards u less they have a job or one prospect." he continued "ho ever, there are many young child wen, some of them only a fev months old, or a few years old have social security cards; some of them are in the movies; others are serving as artists' models for magazine cover pages and variou other occupations which do not in clude manual labor."

It was emphasized that in such cases as described above a social security account card is necessary since they come within the law's provision for old-age and survivors insurance the same as an adult person.

Under re condition should any employer regard a social security account card as evidence that he may disregard the child labor laws. The account card is for the sole purpose of identifying the individual's wage record which is maintained by the Social Security Board, Mr. Calvert said.

Some employers demand a soctal security card before putting the name of an individual on the payroll, which they may do if they so desire. This is a matter with which the employer alone is concerned and the Board has

nothing to do with it whatever.' While it is true, Mr. Calvert said, "that more children are working t ly than ever before, it is also time that there are more old people employed than in the history of the country; many beneficiaries have requested their insurance payments to be discon tinued for the duration in order that they may make a contribu tion to the war effort."

RED CROSS MONTH, 1944

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA A PROCLAMATION

BHEREAS the war has entered a decisive stage requiring the fullest neasure of individual sacrifice;

WHEREAS the American National Red Cross is an auxiliary to the United States armed forces and, as such, is providing indispensable service to our troops throughout the world as well as to their families at home;

WHEREAS these wartime activities, including the collection of lifesaving blood for the wounded, recreation work in military hospitals, provision of aid to families of servicemen, shipment of food parcels to prisoners of war, production of surgical dressings, operation of overseas clubs and recreation centers, and recruitment of Army and Navy nurses, all combine to save countless lives, restore hope, and provide comfort for our


MHEREAS, through its vast network of local chapters, this agency of our people simultaneously conducts an extensive program of training and community) service, while continuing with traditional efficiency to lessen the distress of those overshelmed by disaster; and



NOW, THEREFORE, I, FRANKLIN D.
