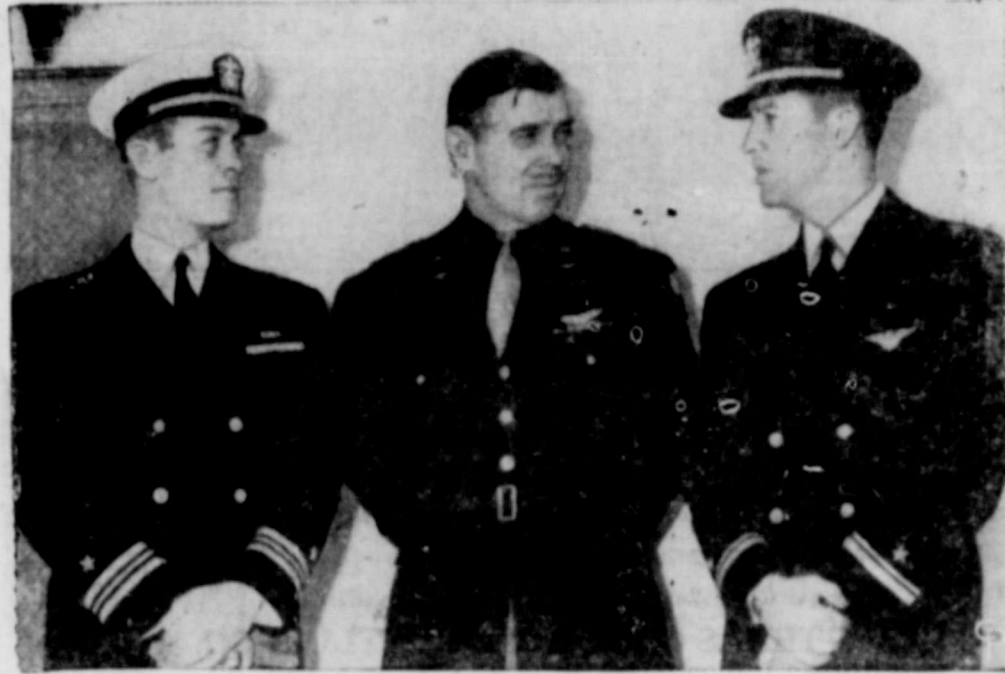

### WAR HERO UP FOR CONGRESS IN COLORADO

DENVER (UP)—The pulling power of a war hero at the polls will get its initial test March 7 in Colorado's special Congressional election to fill the vacancy created by the death of Rep. Lawrence Lewis.

The Democratic candidate for the post is Maj. Carl Wuertele, soft-spoken, good-looking bomber pilot who was badly injured on his 20th mission in the southwest Pacific against the Japanese. Wuertele, first veteran of World War I to seek a major public office, was chosen by party leaders after older and more experienced party members declined to take a chance in view of recent Republican gains in scattered elections throughout the nation.

The G.O.P. choice for the Congressional seat is a millionaire businessman, Dean Gillespie, who came to Colorado as a farm boy near the turn of the century and built up his own truck repair business.

Gillespie, also seeking public office for the first time, has hit at "unseasonal" policies of the Roosevelt administration.

Wuertele admits he knows very little about government or politics but says he has definite ideas about helping the servicemen to shift back to peacetime pursuits and about the kind of postwar world that should be established.

Decorated nine times the dark-haired young man has decided that peace must be maintained by force—possibly through an international police organization with aviation the chief weapon of enforcement.

Wuertele is a strong Roosevelt man and believes the President could be re-elected for a fourth term. He says the sentiment among servicemen overseas is that Mr. Roosevelt is doing a good job and that there is no reason for a change.

Wuertele hit the headlines during his service in the South Pacific through the exploits of his bomber, "Hel-Fin-Wings," named after his pretty wife, Helen. Modest to the point of being bashful, Wuertele admits that hundreds of people will vote for him purely out of gratitude for his Army service and says sincerely that he wishes to be judged on his qualification to hold public office.

He won't speculate as to whether the outcome of his race might be an indication as to how such a war hero as Gen. MacArthur or Gen. Eisenhower might fare if they should run for the Presidency. The special election is March 7.
