Sgt. McCleskey went into the service with the National Guards n November 1940 and was trained at Camp Bowie, Camp Blandng, Fla., and Camp Edwards, Mass. He had been in foreign service almost a year having sail ed for foreign duty in April 1943. He was a native of Ranger and vas educated in the Ranger chools. He was 28 years of age.


