

TIRE INSPECTION - All book holders must have secofficial tire inspections by Sapt. 30, 1943. Subsequent inspection for A book holders will once every six months, "B" holders must have second official tire inspection by June 30, 1943. "C" book holders must have second official tire inspection May 31, 1943. Second ficial tire inspection for "T" book holders must be made 60 days from Feb. 28, 1943, or ev ery 5,000 miles whichever come

TIRES If official tire inspec tor recommends a tire replace ment, apply to local ration board for the tire ration certificate. Tires will be rationed to all on the basis of tire inspections and county quotas available with most ssential mileage to come first Recaps can now be secured without rationing certificates.

OTHER RATIONING Eligible purchaser, needing new automobies, bicycles, typerwriters, rubber footwear and other commodities on which sale might be restricted should see their local ration board.

# AMERICAN, BRITISH PLANES BLAST BASES AS LAND FORCE FUND CAMPAIGN PREPARES FOR NEW ASSAULT

Russia reports immense reserves of German troops moving through the Ukraine toward Donets River Line

UNDATED-American and British planes blasted Axis strongholds in Tunisia today in one of the heaviest air ofensives of the entire war and Russia hinted at a brewing German drive in the Ukraine on the pattern of the 1942 Nazi summer campaign

The land fighting in Tunisia was on a comparatively mall scale as preparations were made for new frontal assaults on enemy lines. Moscow reported "immense reserves of German troops and equipment were moving through Ukraine toward the Donets river line. It was from this region that the Nazis struck last

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
