I want to correct an error that appeared in this column last week. It was along about here somewhere that we predicted that the Democrats would win the election. That was a mistake, the Republicans won. We gladly make this correction after studying the comparative strength of the two parties as measured by the votes cast for the party nominees. 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In the national election Tuesday Castro County added its mite, in proportion, to the Republican landslide that will place General Dwight Eisenhower and Senator Richard Nixon in the offices of president and vice-president, for the first Republican administration in twenty years.

Residents of Castro County marched to the polls in record numbers Tuesday to register a protest against the present administration and to add meaning to the often made claim that "it's time for a change", by placing their stamp of approval on the

Republican nominees in about the same proportion, percentage-wise, as was reflected by the voting in the state and nation.

All intensive get out the vote campaign, coupled with a widespread interest in re-election campaigning was credited with record turn out of 1995 voters in Castro County. Roughly, the vote was split on a forty-sixty percentage basis between Eisenhower and Stevenson, or Eisenhower 1169, Stevenson 826.

According to latest returns on balloting in Texas General Eisenhower piled up a staggering total of 1,014,814 votes to 878,706 votes for Governor Stevenson, making a margin of 53.56 percent for the Republican candidates.

On the national scale the balloting was reaching toward the 60,000,000 mark as tabulations of election returns continued to pile up. Latest returns gave Eisenhower a popular vote of 31,024,749 to 24,948,441 for Stevenson.

suitable for this purpose, and. WHEREAS: In many instances, areas in the State of Texas this source of water supply has been polluted by improper drilling and siesmographing, and.

WHEREAS: The siesmographing companies use a charge of dynamite, or other nitrate chemicals that are known to affect a large quantity of water, making it unsafe for domestic use.

BE IT RESOLVED: THAT. Intensive study be given to the effects that might be done to underground water and that recommendation be made to control the practice by companies using these materials.

RESOLUTION WHEREAS: There is an enormous amount of obnoxious weeds and grasses growing along road right-of-ways, and.

WHEREAS: In many instances the control of bind weed and Johnson grass, cause much expense to farmers over the State of Texas.

BE IT RESOLVED: THAT. The Texas Highway Department be encouraged to increase their efforts to control these obnoxious weeds, especially bind weed, and that information of chemicals used in their control be made available to farmers living within infested areas.

RESOLUTION WHEREAS: There is an increasing demand on the part of many to dispense with the refunding of the four (4) cent Road Tax of gasoline used in Non-Highway vehicles, and.

WHEREAS: The refunding of this tax is necessary to the economy of farmers in the State of Texas.

BE IT RESOLVED: THAT. The Board of Directors of the Castro County Farm Bureau, and the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, use its influence to prevent the passing of legislation, prohibiting the refund on non-highway used gasoline.

RESOLUTION WHEREAS: The light truck, or pickup, is used as a utility vehicle and in many instances for a conveyance, principally for the farm family, and.

WHEREAS: In many instances, it is expedient that this type of vehicle be driven in excess of 45 miles per hour.

BE IT RESOLVED: THAT. The Castro County Farm Bureau and the Texas Farm Bureau use its influence in securing legislation to increase the legal speed limit of the light truck, of one ton capacity or less, to the limit similar or equal to the speed limit of passenger cars.

RESOLUTION The papers and magazines serving the rural areas of the United States publish information concerning the cost of living. Also carry articles showing the amount of raw materials used in the finished product, and the large spread in the price farmers received and the cost to consumers. These papers and magazines are not commonly read by the consumers that live in Urban or Metropolitan areas, therefore.

BE IT RESOLVED: THAT.

Efforts of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation and the American Farm Bureau Federation give

maters of this type much study and consideration and if possible, from time to time, secure the cooperation of magazines such as "Life", "Look", etc., and by this means inform, or reveal, the difference in the amount received by farmers and the amount paid by consumers is caused by the amount of labor; and that labor's demand for higher wages and bigger profits to processors and retailers, would increase the cost of finished products to consumers, while at the same time there is a decrease in the prices received for farm products, such as cattle, hogs, dairy products, cotton, wheat, etc., this having a tendency to lessen the purchasing power of the dollar.

RESOLUTION WHEREAS: Under the present Estate Tax laws there is a limit of 4 years provided, whereby Federal Tax Authorities can defer final settlement of Estate Taxes, and.

WHEREAS: In many instances the deferring of final settlement of Estate Taxes causes undue hardships, confusion, dissonance, and loss of money, and increased expenses for the Estate.

BE IT RESOLVED: THAT. The Texas Farm Bureau Federation use its influence in securing legislation providing that after an Estate Tax return has been filed, that this return either be accepted or adjusted and approved within a period of time not to exceed six months.

This resolution approved November 3, 1952.

RESOLUTION WHEREAS: The Federal Government has from time to time increased the Federal Estate Tax, and.

WHEREAS: This increase has in many instances worked undue hardship in raising the amount of money in settling the Estate Tax.

BE IT RESOLVED: THAT. The Texas Farm Bureau Federation favor a reduction in the Federal Estate Tax Schedule or an increase in specific Deduction.

This resolution approved November 3, 1952.

RESOLUTION WHEREAS: The soil is our most valuable natural resource, and.

WHEREAS: It is apparent that erosion and soil depletion is now taking a heavy toll of our farm lands, and.

WHEREAS: It is necessary to maintain the fertility and productive capacity of the soil for the maintenance of our National strength and the welfare of future generations, and.

WHEREAS: The income derived from farming is often not sufficient to enable farm operators to carry out soil conservation practices to the extent needed to maintain the long time productive capacity of our soils.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT: The Castro County Farm Bureau strongly condemn the action of the American Farm Bureau Board in recommending a reduction in appropriations for the Agricultural Conservation Program as administered

by the Production and Marketing Administration of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That we strongly urge the Texas Farm Bureau Federation and the American Farm Bureau Federation to work for a continuation of whatever assistance to farmers is necessary for carrying out approved conservation practices designed to maintain soil fertility and volume of production.

This resolution adopted by the Castro County Farm Bureau in meeting November 3, 1952.

RESOLUTION WHEREAS: The assembled members of the Castro County Farm Bureau are vitally interested in the problems of agriculture, and.

WHEREAS: It appears that H. R. 8336 and H. R. 8337 introduced by Congressmen Cooley and Hope, respectively and S. 3388 introduced by Senators Allender and Aiken will place the management, ownership and control of the permanent systems of Agriculture Credit now under the supervision of the Farm Credit Administration in the hands of the farmers and ranchers who own them.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That the assembled members of the Castro County Farm Bureau go on record favoring the passage of H. R. 8336 and H. R. 8337 and S. 3388.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT: The Texas Farm Bureau Federation go on record as favoring the passage of these Bills H. R. 8336 and H. R. 8337 and S. 3388.

This resolution approved November 3, 1952.

RESOLUTION WHEREAS: There is not ample protection guaranteed to grain producers and country elevators

in the present Texas Warehouse Laws, and.

WHEREAS: There are certain ambiguities in the present law,

BE IT RESOLVED THAT: The Castro County Farm Bureau and the Texas Farm Bureau Federation give the present laws much study, and use its influence in helping those interested in passing a law that gives both farmers, land holders, and country elevators adequate protection.

And that the Texas Farm Bureau Federation assist in correcting some errors or ambiguities existing in the present warehouse laws, and formulate laws that will give protection similar to the Federal Warehouse laws.

This resolution adopted November 3, 1952.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS: The Legislators of our State are receiving a salary of \$10.00 per day for the first 120 days of each session of the Legislature and \$5.00 per day thereafter, and.

WHEREAS: This amount is not adequate for the present day cost of living.

BE IT RESOLVED: THAT, the Texas Farm Bureau Federation favor an increase in salary to the amount of \$35.00 per day for the first 120 days, and \$10.00 for each day thereafter.
