## Americans Raid Bucharest, Ploesti

### P-T DISTRICT CONFERENCE TO BE HERE 18-19

The 33rd Annual Conference of District I Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers will meet in Ranger April 18 and 19. All sessions are open to the public, and the people of Ranger are cordially invited to hear these outstanding speakers.

### Sgt. D. W. Morgan Awarded Defense Service Medal

BIG SPRING, TEXAS.—According to an announcement by Lt. Col. Jas. F. Reed commanding officer of the Big Spring Bombardier school, Sgt. Dalton W. Morgan has been awarded the American Defense Service Medal. Such medals are awarded those army men who have seen honorable service at any time between the dates of September 8, 1939 and December 7, 1941.

Sgt. Morgan is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Morgan of 800 Cypress St., Ranger. He has been in service since September, 1940, and as a member of the 2052nd Ordnance Co. Avn., is doing his part to "keep 'em flying."

### RUSSIANS IN OUTSKIRTS OF SEVASTOPOL

MOSCOW, April 15 (UP)—Soviet tanks neared the outskirts of the big Black Sea naval base at Sevastopol today, driving the panicky remnants of an Axis garrison that once numbered more than 100,000 into a 250 square mile death pocket at the southern tip of the Crimea.

(The London Star said the Russians were within 10 miles of Sevastopol.)

Unshaven, unkempt and tattered German and Romanian soldiers their escape cut off by the lightning Russian advance, surrendered en masse as the Soviet re-conquest of the 10,000 square mile Crimea entered its final phase a week after it began.

### Two Fliers Have Narrow Escape

DALLAS, Tex., April 15 (UP)—Two young fliers from the fifth ferrying group, Love Field, considered themselves extremely lucky today after their Mitchell medium bomber was scattered in bits over more than 100 yards of hillside near Garland yesterday.

Following the crash, the plane caught fire and exploded after the two fliers had crawled out. The names of the fortunate airmen were not released.

### TOJO ASKS COOPERATION

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Premier Hideki Tojo, stressing Japan's determination to work more closely with other members of the Axis, told the joint Japanese-German-Italian technical commission today that "the thorough need for cooperation and collaboration has grown greater than ever before."

### TWO KURILES LEFT FLAMING AFTER RAID

Advanced Aleutian Base—Paramushiro and Shumushu Islands in the Japanese held Kurile chain were afire from end to end Wednesday and Thursday mornings as army and navy bombers ranged over enemy garrisons and air bases in clear moonlight, dropping demolition and incendiary bombs.

Allied forces, striking against the Japanese from land and air, carried an aerial offensive on the Kurile Islands in Japan's northern Pire, into the fourth day, while 4,000 miles to the south they captured Bogadjim, on the north coast of New Guinea, and were driving toward Madang, 16 miles away.

Jungle-hardened Australian troops occupied Bogadjim without opposition Thursday, the same day that U. S. bombers twice hit the big enemy naval base at Paramushiro in an intensified campaign against Japan's northern defense anchor.

### WAC Recruiter's Secretary Joins

ELLINGTON FIELD, Tex., April 15 (UP)—Miss Virginia Sharp quit her job as secretary to Maj. C. T. Reese today.

Maj. Reese is recruiting officer for the women's army corps. Miss Sharp, of Orange, Tex., handled much of the publicity and other details of the recruiting program.

### AGREE ON GOVERNMENT

NAPLES (UP)—Representatives of six Italian parties agreed today to participate in the formation of a new government by Premier Pietro Badoglio, which was expected to be shaped on a broad, Democratic basis.

### APRIL 24-29 TO BE RANGER CLEAN UP WEEK

City officials and directors of the Chamber of Commerce announced today that the week beginning April 24 has been designated as "clean-up week" in Ranger and property owners and renters are urged to cooperate in this move to improve the appearance of the city.

Due to the fact that through scrap drives on behalf of the War effort, most premises have been cleared of trash, no city wide organization will be formed to conduct the drive but each individual is to be held responsible for clearing of property occupied or owned by him.

It was stated that in cases where persons cannot dispose of collected trash, that city trucks will be sent to collect it if a call is turned in for aid in this way. Those who wish to have trash collected by city trucks are asked to leave it in containers in the parkway between sidewalks and curbs where it will be accessible to the trucks.

Those directing the drive stated that it is the desire of the city to cooperate in the national clean-up campaign but that it will have to be largely the work of individuals as former cooperative methods are handicapped by the shortage of trucks, tires and gasoline, and wherever possible persons are asked to dispose of their own accumulations of waste.

During the week of the drive those who desire to have trash moved by city trucks may call 31 and arrangements will be made to have the collected trash moved.

### Cpl. Limbocker Training For Duty On Bomber

Corp. William H. Limbocker, 21 the son of Mrs. Mammie Lee Limbocker, and husband of Mrs. D. H. Limbocker of 113 Lawrence St. Ranger is now completing his training for combat duty as a crew member of a B-24 Liberator bomber and soon will go overseas to a combat area. He is presently stationed at Davis-Monthan Field, Tucson, Ariz.

Sergeant Limbocker entered the service in November, 1942 and won his "wings" as an aerial gunner. He is a graduate of Ranger High school.

### Tarnopol Taken, 13,600 Killed

LONDON.—Russian troops captured the long-circled Polish rail junction of Tarnopol today after killing 13,600 of its 16,000 garrison, and in the Crimea plunged to within seven miles of Sevastopol, newly shattered by a mass air assault which left it afire.

AUSTIN, Tex. April 15 (UP)—A man sentenced to be hanged more than 20 years ago who escaped to Mexico may be electrocuted if caught and returned to Texas, the Attorney General's Department today advised state police. Since the man was sentenced to be hanged, electrocution has been substituted for executions.

State Police said they understood a man had been located at Nuevo Laredo who had escaped 144 D. Sweeney Field on Saturday, after being sentenced to hang 23 years ago for the murder of George West, Tallahassee, Fla., Nov. 16, Georgia.

### MAY BE PART OF A Pincer ATTACK FROM BRITAIN, ITALY

LONDON, (UP)—A force of at least 500 American heavy bombers based in Italy, striking in support of the Russian armies invading Romania, blasted the important rail and communications center of Bucharest and Ploesti today, and German fighter planes rose to challenge them.

The German radio, broadcasting reports that Allied planes were approaching northwest Germany, indicated there might be a pincer attack on the Reich from Britain and Italy.

Strong formations of Lightning and Thunderbolt fighter planes escorted the Italy-based Fortresses and Liberators on the Romanian raid and shot down some of the German planes which gave battle.

The rail yards at Ploesti were raided on April 5, while Allied bombers last struck at Bucharest on April 4. The raids should be of considerable assistance to the Russians, for the Germans and Romanians must funnel supplies and reinforcements for their hard-pressed armies through Bucharest and Ploesti.

The announcement at Naples said the bombers flew "in great strength," indicating a force of at least 500 Liberators and Fortresses.

The German broadcasts concerning the approaching Allied planes from Britain made no mention of bombers and it was possible that American long-range fighters were on an offensive sweep.

### Lad Vs. Monkeys Cost 20 Stitches

GALVESTON, Tex., April 15, (UP)—Four-year-old Jessie Mendoza today displayed 20 stitches on his legs after an unsuccessful bout with two full-grown monkeys.

Police said the monkeys attacked the lad. A charge of keeping vicious animals was filed against the owner. Doctors at Sealy Hospital, who closed 10 deep lacerations on Jessie's legs, said he was the third victim of monkey fights within two weeks.

### 2 Die In Dallas County Accident

DALLAS, Tex., April 15 (UP)—A father and his two-year-old son were dead today after a collision between their automobile and a motor freight truck.

### Tyrone Power Is First Lieutenant

CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex. April 15, (UP)—It's 1st Lt. Tyrone Power today, according to a Marine Corps announcement of the movie star's promotion.

At the Corpus Christi naval base since last September, Power will finish the navy pre-flight training course here next week. He is a former civilian pilot.

WASHINGTON Report

Turkey's Ambassador Ertegun Despite War, Mins. am Envoy Holds High Hope for World New Dean of Diplomatic Folk

THE WASHINGTON DIPLOMATIC CORPS has a new dean. He is Mehmet Munir Ertegun, ambassador extraordinary and plenipotentiary of Turkey.

A soft-voiced, modest philosopher, with a wise understanding of people and nations, is this slender, dark, be-speckled little gentleman. Something of a prophet, too, is Ertegun and one who shines in a city of false prophecy. The day after Pearl Harbor he said to friends, "My country will remain neutral."

Battered by Axis nations and Allies alike for help, Turkey has managed to stand aloof. And today Mehmet Munir Ertegun, her representative in Washington, holds a most important position among the diplomats in the capital.

Turkey Meet It is both interesting and reassuring to realize that the dean of the Washington corps should be the ambassador of the most powerful of neutral nations. For, being dean, contrary to the opinion of most people, is not an empty phrase. The dean of the Washington corps has special responsibilities and influence. He is not a mere ceremonial officer. Frequently he directs the attitude of other representatives in the capital in matters where a mistake might offend many Americans. For example, during the days of prohibition, it was the dean of the corps who, on calling his group together for a regular meeting, suggested the attitude of the foreign embassies toward strong drink and such.

Ambassador Ertegun will exert a calming influence on the Washington diplomats though at the moment they seem to be in a most anxious mood. Turkey's representative is a man of honest humility. He is self-effacing and deeply religious. A devout Mohammedan, he has faith in the ultimate brotherhood of man.

"How can you be an optimist now Mr. Ambassador?" I asked. "These are the dark ages of slaughter and destruction."

"I believe," said Ertegun solemnly, "that war is like any other disease which afflicts human beings. The way to cure many diseases has been found. Some day the way to cure the disease of war will be found. That there are still many diseases preying on human beings should not be a discouragement. Human society goes on and on. It is immortal. There is much more time to treat its sicknesses than there is to treat the sickness of individual human beings whose lives are short."

"Perhaps," I ventured, "it is your religion, your Mohammedanism, that teaches you such faith."

"I cannot presume to give an answer to such a serious question," Ambassador Ertegun said, "without thinking all day. But I do not find anything in my thoughts or reading to make me believe that all people are not striving toward the same goal. The identity of the religion is not important. The purpose of all religions is the same—the effort of human intelligence to solve the doubts of the unknown which surrounds all of us."

The ambassador is probably one of the most earnest students in the Washington corps. He reads and studies many hours a day.

The ambassador's wife, Hayriyatullah Ertegun, is a lovely, gracious person with pink and white complexion, a fair hair bright, kind smile, a quick smile and a friendly, happy manner. She still makes a charming figure of 45 years of the corps. As a hostess to the handsome ambassador at St. Francis Circle, designed by George Chisley Tolson, Madame Ertegun has already shown skill and cleverness. She has entertained many people elegantly at big parties at state luncheon dinners. And for a few special friends in small groups there have been luscious Turkish dishes, exciting to the palate and delicious to the waistline.

Pretty Misses, Akhmet and Nevali Ertegun, the three college-age children of the dean of the corps and Madame Ertegun, are brilliant students at whom impatient parents of Washington children have often spoken proudly. "Why can't you be as smart as those young Erteguns?" They have had to learn the language you grew up in and what they are far ahead of you in civics.

RECORD TRAVELER

KILGORE, Tex. (UP)—Probably the most-traveled year-old child in young Larry Cooper. Since leaving Kilgore at the age of 14 days, he has traveled 19,000 miles with his parents. His father, First Sgt.
