Cpl. Stevens Is In Group Honored By U. S. Congress

Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Stevens of Lherator Village, Ft. Worth formerly of Ranger, have received word that the unit of the Air Transport Command in the India-China area, of which their son, Cpl. Floyd A. Stevens, is a member has been voted a Congressional Citation for their achievements, which were referred to as "outstanding".

It is the duty of this group to fly supplies over the Himalayas into China and it is officially credited with delivering more supplies by air than were trucked in over the famous Burma Road before it was cut off. Cpl. Stevens is an instrument specialist in this group.

He recently sent his little brother, Jimmie, a small silk Chinese flag. It is worn on the backs of American men operating in that area and bears Chinese inscriptions directing natives to render all possible aid to the wearer should he become separated from his group, injured or otherwise in need of assistance. He has also sent home one of the Gurkha knives, the favorite weapon of the ferocious Indian Gurkha fighters for hand to hand combat. Cpl. Stevens stated that in order to qualify for membership in this crack Indian unit, a native must be so adept in the use of this huge knife that he can cut off a bull's head with one stroke.

Cpl. Stevens went into service in September 1942 and before enlistment was employed by the Southern Ice Company. He received the Air Corps at Sheppard Field, Chynute Field, Illinois, and at Army Air Base in Utah, Wyoming and California. He attended Ranger high school.

Locker Plant Men To Be In Ranger Sometime Sunday

David D. Pickrell, president of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce stated today that men who will install Ranger's locker plant if one is placed here, Sunday investigate the situation and before they arrive the Chamber of Commerce must have a definite idea as to how many people will subscribe for lockers if the plant is built.

Every person who would be interested in having a locker is asked to contact the secretary of the Chamber of Commerce and indicate in this way that they are interested. This, it was pointed out does not mean that persons are committing themselves to take a locker, it is simply an effort to determine what the demand for lockers will be.

According to the locker company, boxes will be \$15 and \$18 a year which is a very small monthly outlay for the preservation of food the year round. The plant will be equipped with quick freezing equipment and all the other features for preparing food for the lockers. All types of food may be stored in the lockers.

The plant, unquestionably would be an asset to Ranger and persons are asked to act immediately to indicate if they would be interested in having a locker.

WASHINGTON (UP)—Perhaps the cost of living has climbed on the home front, but the ceiling prices on the island of Emirau in the Southwest Pacific are lower than a hand-woven sleeping mat (50 cents and it's yours.)

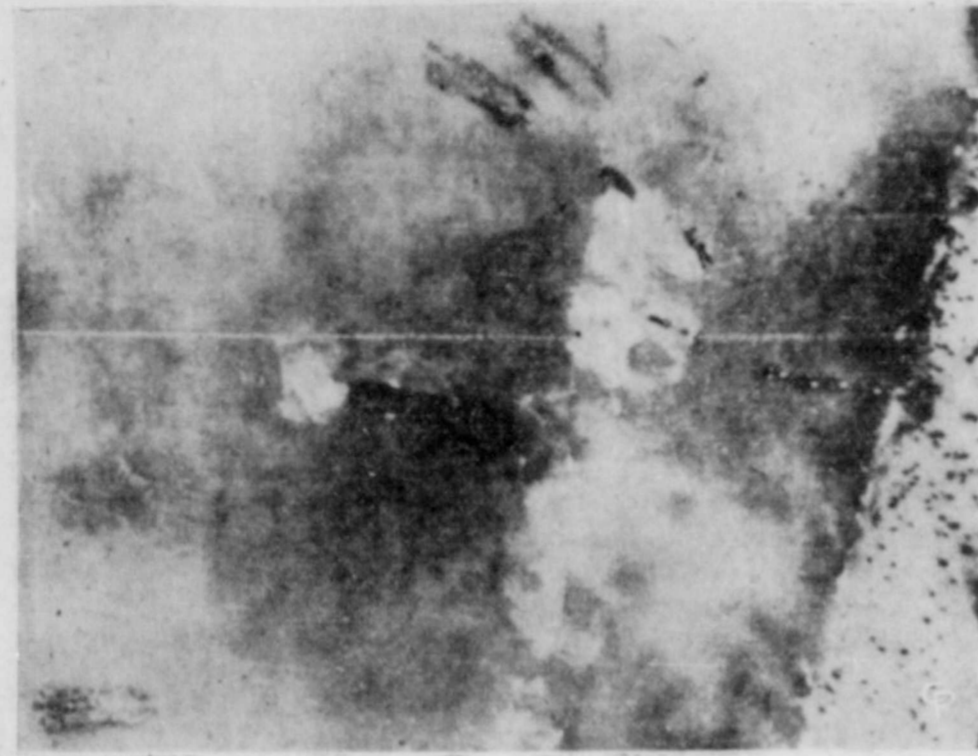
Marines on the island can buy a bunch of bananas for a dime, a chicken for a quarter and apples and eggs for one cent each, according to Capt. Sanford B. Hunt, Jr., of Elizabeth, N. J., who returned here from a Marine outfit which participated in the unopposed occupation of Emirau in the St. Matthias group.

Some of the other values on his list: Pineapples, 10 cents; Kau kau (sweet potatoes), 10 cents a dozen; moolies (limes), 20 for 5 cents; green coconuts, one cent; hand-woven belt, 20 cents; Pumpkins, 5 and 10 cents. Price lists were posted at each native village to establish set prices and "prevent unethical dealings and cheating by both parties concerned," Hunt said.

ALLIES INVADE FRANCE!



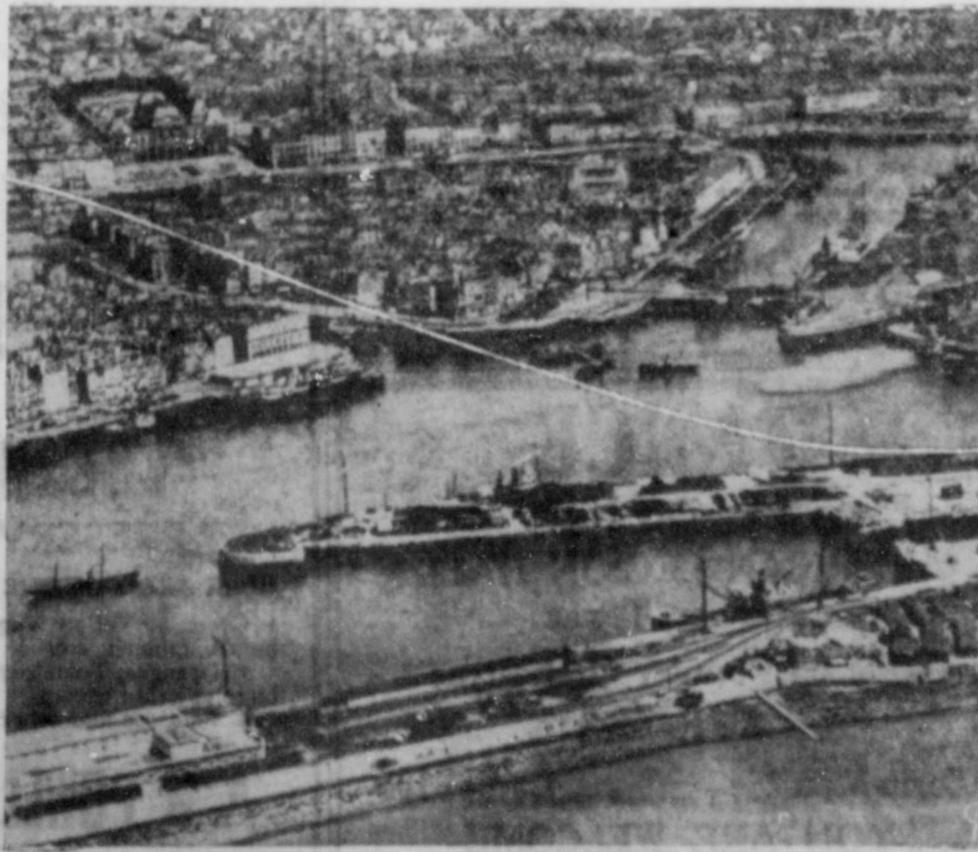

Canning Center Is Opened Here This Morning

The Ranger canning center opened this morning at 8 o'clock and will remain open through the canning season provided the demand is sufficient to justify its operation.

This is the second year the center has been operated and persons who wish to use the equipment and service of the center may do so on any day in the week from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. except on Sat. when the room will be closed at noon.

It was pointed out that the equipment at the center is for large scale canning and will process larger quantities of food than the home size cookers. The center also has a pea sheller which speeds preparation of food for canning.

Federal funds are provided for the operation of the school and it was explained that unless the center is used by the people of Ranger and surrounding country, it will be closed and transferred to another locality.

Mrs. Lillian Eastland is in charge of the center and R. B. Thomas, Jr., is supervisor.

It was also stated today that additional kit bag material has been received for a new quota and workers are urged to give as much time as possible in turning out the quota.

GREAT BATTLE TO DESTROY MOBILE UNITS IN PROGRESS

Allied Planes Operating On Strips Taken In The Assault Area

Allied armies have "completed successfully" the first phase of the invasion of France, it was announced officially today, and have swung into the battle to destroy German mobile reserves moved into the assault area.

The fighting in Normandy now is spreading, and is especially savage in many sectors as the Germans throw in more and more armor, the latest word at Allied Supreme Headquarters revealed.

Germany's famous 21st Panzer division, which the Allies destroyed several times in North Africa and the Mediterranean Theater, only to find it reformed, now opposing the invasion forces in the Bayeux-Caen area of Normandy.

The Allies were striking out beyond captured Bayeux in an apparent attempt to isolate the Cherbourg Peninsula and win the big port at its tip, one of the best in Northwestern France.

Air sources revealed that Allied planes already have begun to operate on airstrips in the assault area, big transports moving in supplies and evacuating casualties.

The complete first phase of the fighting was described officially as the securing of a foothold on the continent and the defeat of the German coastal troops in the assault area.

The second, now in progress, is the elimination of German mobile reserves brought into the battle zone. The third, still to be fought, was the battle against the Nazi strategic reserves which may be moved into counter the invasion forces.

Chinese Break Thru Jap Lines

CHUNGKING—A communique reported that the Chinese forces, defending the Honan Province town of Loyang, had broken through enemy lines and escaped to the west. Loyang fell to the Japanese nearly two weeks ago. Three Chinese divisions made the break through after inflicting 5,000 casualties on the enemy and destroying more than 40 enemy tanks.

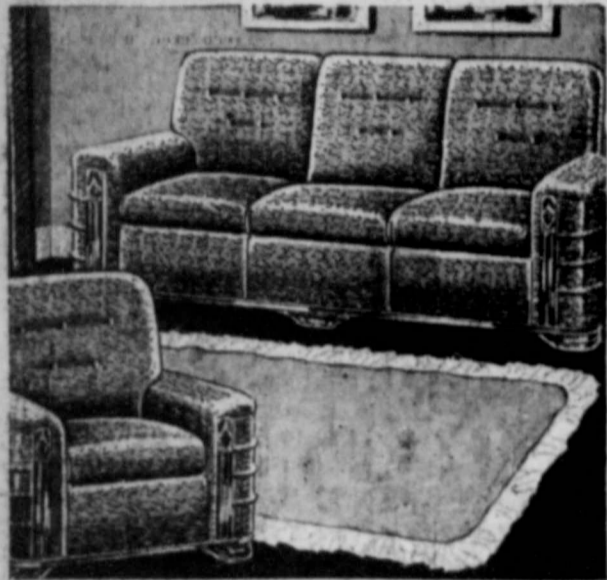

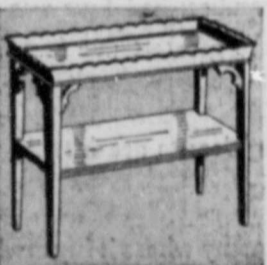

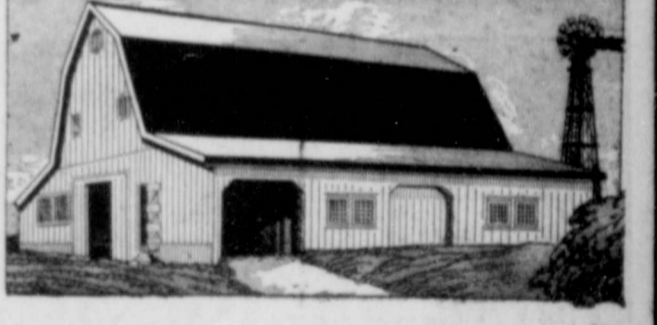
