B-29S STRIKE

WASHINGTON, July 8 -(UP) American B-29 Supperfortresses smashed at targets on the coast of occupied China as well as vital war industries on Kyushu, southernmost of Japanese home-land islands, and inflicted damage on all targets in yesterday's raid, the 20th air force announced

The Superfortresses attacked Hankow, on the Yangtze River, a principal supply base for Japanese operations in eastern China.

Also hit was Laoyao, a coal and ipply shipping port on the north

The third communique on the Superfortress attack carried out on the seventh anniversary of Japan's war with China revealed that previous designation of Tob. ata, Japan, as one of the target was in error.

Instead, the mighty. America bombers struck at Omura, a vital war industry center south-of Sasobo, Japan's third largest naval bomb load of the raid.

Yawata, center of a large part of Japan's steel industry, was the third Japanese homeland target. pacted by the returned fliers." the communique said.

Germans Unable to Mass Strong Counter Forces

Non-Stop Attacks on Japs By U. S. Navy Foreseen

Special to Central Press

 WASHINGTON-Military sources in Washington are now con-vinced the Germans have not counter-attacked in Normandy because. since D-Day, they have been simply unable to amass the required amounts of men and materials.

This opinion is in sharp contrast to published statements of the allied leaders when the invasion was launched-that a general counter-attack must be expected at any time designed to attempt to hurl the Allies into the English channel. Too Late

In the early days of the invasion, it was said, the Germans could have checked the Allied tide with comparative small numbers of men and guns. Now, however, a large army would be required, and its chances of success would be much more slim.

One competent military source-who declined to be identifiedwent so far as to say that with the capture of Cherbourg, the Germans have been forced to abandon any plans or hopes they may have had to sweep the Cotantin peninsula free of Allied armies. All they can do now is to prevent them from spilling over into the rest of France. SALES AND SECTION

• LOOK FOR VIRTUAL NON-STOP OPERATIONS by powerful sections of America's mighty Pacific fleet against Jap bases and shipping from now on. . . Especially since our Navy dealt a smashing blow at the Japanese fleet on June 19 off the Philippines. Tip-off on the size of the American armada now roaming the Pacific is the fact that it has been broken up into at least four separate fleets as well as some task forces.

First on the list is the Fifth fleet, which spearheaded the Mariana invasion. Next is the Third fleet, under Admiral William F. Halsey. In the southwest Pacific there is the Seventh fleet, commanded by Vice Admiral Thomas C. Kincald, hero of the aweeps against the Japs on Attu and Kiska is the Aleutians. 




