Germans Unable to Mass Strong Counter Forces? Non-Stop Attacks on Japs By U. S. Navy Foreseen

WASHINGTON—Military sources in Washington are now convinced the Germans have not counter-attacked in Normandy because, since D-Day, they have been simply unable to amass the required amounts of men and materials.

This opinion is in sharp contrast to published statements of the allied leaders when the invasion was launched—that a general counter-attack must be expected at any time designed to attempt to hurl the Allies into the English channel.

In the early days of the invasion, it was said, the Germans could have checked the Allied tide with comparative small numbers of men and guns. Now, however, a large army would be required, and its chances of success would be much more slim.

One competent military source—who declined to be identified—went so far as to say that with the capture of Cherbourg, the Germans have been forced to abandon any plans or hopes they may have had to sweep the Cotentin peninsula free of Allied armies. All they can do now is to prevent them from spilling over into the rest of France.

WHEN VICE PRESIDENT HENRY A. WALLACE left Washington for China, it is now disclosed, he took with him a big bag of gifts. These included numerous packages of scientific instruments, books, educational films and agricultural seed.

The materials were assembled in Washington by the state department as part of a program of cultural relations with Chinese universities and technical centers.

LOOK FOR VIRTUAL NON-STOP OPERATIONS by powerful sections of America's mighty Pacific fleet against Jap bases and shipping from now on. Especially since our Navy dealt a smashing blow at the Japanese fleet on June 19 off the Philippines.

Tip-off on the size of the American armada now roaming the Pacific is the fact that it has been broken up into at least four separate fleets as well as some task forces.

First on the list is the Fifth fleet, which spearheaded the Mariana invasion. Next is the Third fleet, under Admiral William F. Halsey. In the southwest Pacific there is the Seventh fleet, commanded by Vice Admiral Thomas C. Kincaid, hero of the sweeps against the Japs on Attu and Kiska in the Aleutians. The Ninth fleet in the north Pacific now is under Vice Admiral Frank J. Fletcher.

Apparently any one of these can operate alone, or they can team up for a really powerful thrust. Thus, one fleet can go back for repairs, refitting or a rest while the other three carry on against the Jap's first team.

It was Admiral Raymond A. Spruance's Fifth fleet which tackled the powerful Jap fleet off the Philippines in one of America's greatest naval victories of the war.

THERE IS NO LONGER ANY CROWDING at the press tables in the mass session trial courtroom in the capital. When the trial started several weeks ago more than 50 reporters and special writers elbowed each other for better points of observation.

Since then most of the special correspondents have been recalled, apparently because their editors thought they could be writing more interesting stories.

Now many seats at the press table are empty, despite the fact that only "one principal witness" has been heard, and prosecutors say there are at least 200 to be heard.

AUSTIN, Texas.—(UP)—A monthly allotment of 15,000,000 Oxford units of penicillin has been used locally according to City Purchasing Agent, Roy Barrioch. "Good to excellent results have been noted," City Health Director J. M. Coleman said. "In five or six cases we used only 100,000 units, but in one brain abscess case we used 1,000,000 units."

ATTENTION, VOTERS!

READ CAREFULLY BEFORE CAST YOUR BALLOT ON JULY 22nd

It is a strange thing to what length some men will go in making desperate attempts to traduce the reputation of an opponent in a political contest; hoping by these attacks to confuse the minds of the voters, so they brought to vote against their own interests.

There lies before me as I write, a photostatic copy of a statement secured from the Secretary of State at Austin, Texas, in which it was enclosed bears the Ranger postmark, and was mailed on June 28th. It was addressed to the Precinct Chairman, Democratic Party, Scranton, Texas, who kindly passed it on to me. The Chairman, whom it was addressed, does not know from whom it came, as the sender failed to give his name. The statement sets forth from state records the number of votes W. E. Starr received as a candidate on the Socialist Ticket in 1936, and in several preceding elections.

Not having the facts, this statement from Ranger does not inform the Public, that due to a difference in view as to the party program, W. E. Starr has had no active connection with the Socialist Party since 1936. Nor does this statement inform the Public that when W. E. Starr was first identified with the Socialist Party there were included in its planks: Old Age Pensions, Women's Suffrage, Federal Works Program for the unemployed, Soil Conservation Practice, Federal Loans to Stockmen and Farmers at low interest rates, Federal Development of Electric Power. At that time none of these measures were represented in the platforms of any other political party in the United States. In recent years, we have seen all these measures enacted into the laws of our country, and to this legislative action the Democratic Party has given its active support. A review of all the facts show that W. E. Starr is not inconsistent in making his present race for the State Legislature on the Democratic ticket. On the other hand, there is considerable evidence that one of my opponents will not vote for Roosevelt if he heads the Democratic ticket this year, WHICH I SHALL DO. Now, let this other candidate for the State Legislature who is so ZEALOUS REGARDING PARTY REGULARITY, make a similar public statement.

I wish to say that I have no quarrel with any citizen who votes his honest convictions—whether he votes for Mr. Dewey or Mr. Roosevelt. What we are concerned with at this moment, is what kind of men do we need in the State Legislature. This legislative body does not formulate government policies, nor enact them into law. These duties rest upon Congress at Washington. In our legislature, we need men of ability; whose integrity is unquestioned. They should have the energy and persistence to carry any problems presented to them to a successful conclusion.

Do you want a man who has never made a political move with the idea of promoting his own welfare above others; who, for over forty years has stood for the RIGHT in all local affairs—a man who, during all these years, has had the confidence of all with whom he has had dealings, a man, who in his lifetime has never been sued, nor has he sued others. If this kind of a man, as a candidate for the State Legislature, interests you at this time, then examine carefully the personal records of all the present candidates, and yet your conscience be your guide.

There is—and properly should be—a great deal of interest in our Old Age Pension System. With the cost of living having nearly doubled in the last two years, and with most of our business interests in Texas making more money than ever before, I think it is a shame and disgrace to our State to have these pensions cut as they have been in recent months. It is my intention, if elected, to put forth every effort to correct this situation, so we can pay those entitled to pensions the maximum pension, as allowed by our Federal Government.

One of my supporters, who is an independent oil operator, asked me some time ago, if I would make some public statement as to my attitude on matters affecting their business. It is this group of men who do nearly all the development work in oil production on our ranches and farms. I realize that the ceiling on the price of their raw product is entirely out of line with other prices, and they are suffering great hardships in many cases. I will be glad to work with them in correcting any abuses which I feel are unfair.

I again repeat my statement, that I am heart and soul for the interests of the stockmen and farmers. It is they who feed and clothe us all. Their prosperity is necessary for the security of our government. When our rural districts prosper—all prosper.

For a couple of weeks now, there has been a persistent rumor coming from many directions, that I am a "full-blooded German." Now, none of us are responsible for the accidents of birth, but it so happens that so far as I know, there is not a drop of German blood in me; however, we have many boys of German descent, who are fighting loyally for us on our many battle fronts, while their fine parents carry one at home. I would rather be a fine American citizen of German blood, than be a man who would knowingly stoop to such political trickery in trying to confuse the minds of the voters at this serious time.

Now friends, let's get better acquainted, and if I am the man you want to represent you from the 107th district in the State Legislature—say so in such emphatic terms on July 22nd, that a run-off in August will not be necessary.

I can honestly say that if I go to Austin this coming January, I will try to serve the best interests of every deserving citizen in Eastland and Callahan Counties.

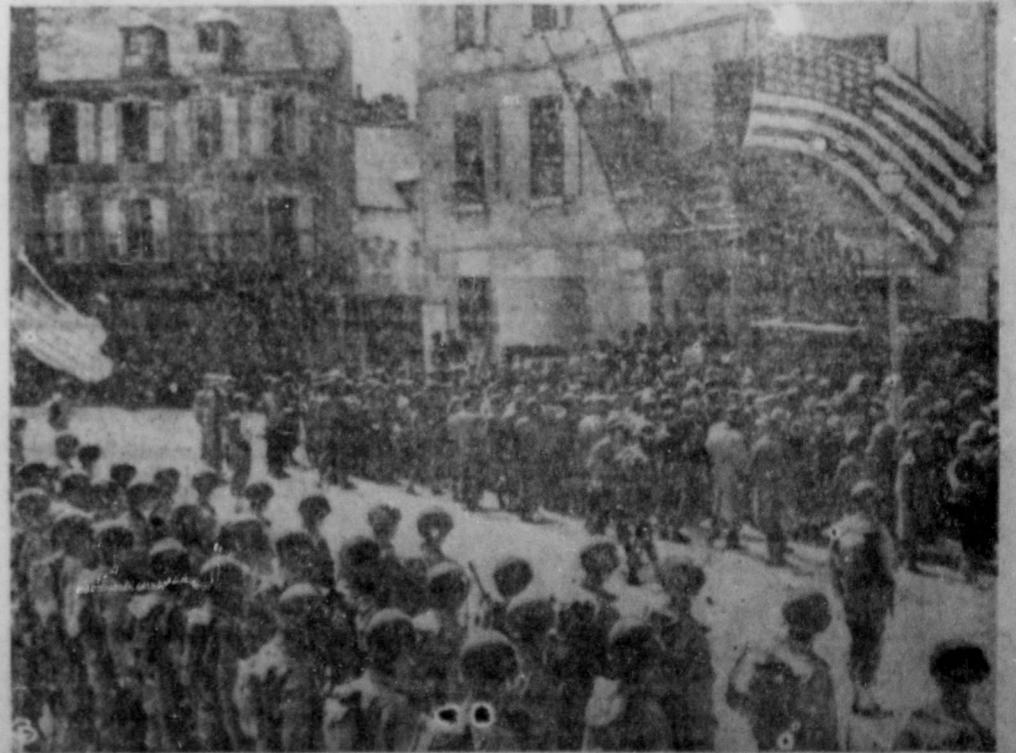

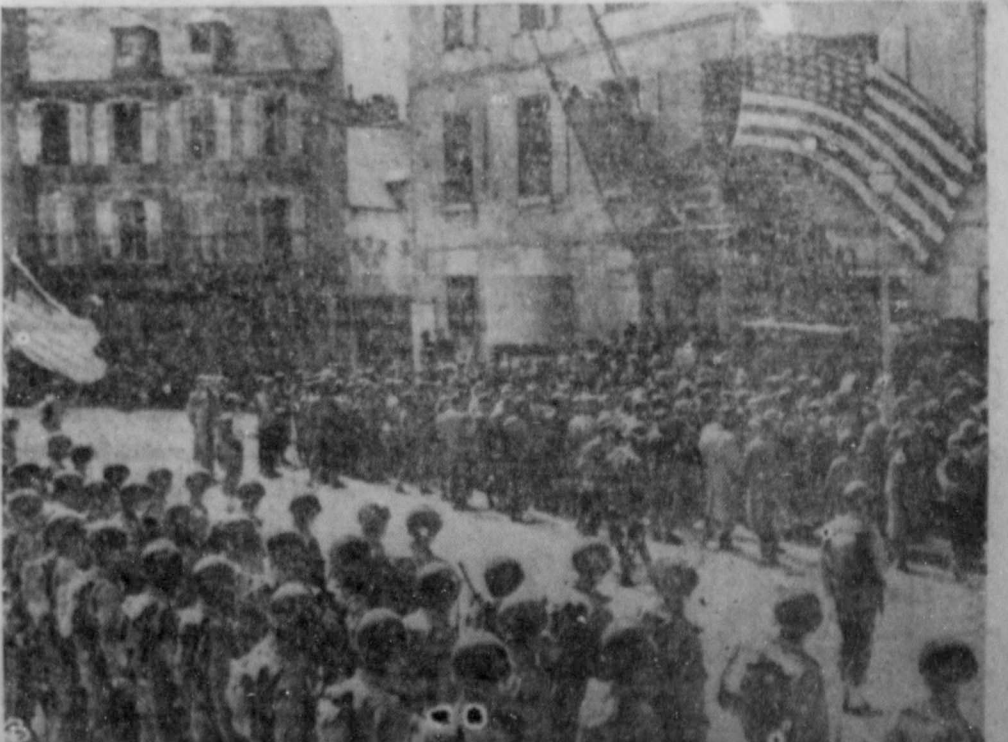

Points Necessary In Sale Of Home Processed Foods

COLLEGE STATION, Tex. (UP)—Belief that Texas producers and consumers are still unfamiliar with an OPA regulation governing the sale of home processed foods on the ration list has brought a full explanation from an authority on the subject. A home processor may sell home-canned foods, but with some limitations, says Myrtle Murray, Home Industries Specialist for Texas A. & M. College Extension Service.
