

## Americans Sink 4, Damage 10 Jap Ships

### LT. BURDETTE, CPL. BRETTON TO BE HERE FOR BIG RALLY

Captain Van Gilder, recreational officer at McCleskey General Hospital in Tampa, has announced that the two War Heroes who will appear at Ranger's big War Bond rally next Thursday afternoon will be Lt. Maurice Burdette and Cpl. Alfred Story Bretton.

Both men are veterans of the Southwest Pacific theatre of war and have some worthwhile stories to relate. Lt. Burdette was an intelligence officer with an infantry division and was in combat at Guadalcanal, Russell Islands, New Georgia Islands, and at Bougainville. He fought for 38 consecutive days during the battle of Munda before being wounded in September 1943. After recuperation he returned to duty and was wounded again at Bougainville in November 1943. He wears the Silver Star and the Purple Heart with Clasp.

Cpl. Bretton has been in the army for four years and served overseas for 44 months. He was at Pearl Harbor at the time of the attack on December 7, 1941, and was sent to Munda and was on the front lines for 33 days and then was sent to Barak Harbor. He was hit in the left leg by six bullets and received 15 transfusions of blood plasma.

These men will appear at the big rally along with the movie stars Bill Elliott, Jimmie Wakelley and Adele Mara. A number of ceremonies will come with the group and other guests will include Colonel Renth of Camp Wolters and a 30 piece band from the camp.

The rally will be held in front of the Arcadia theatre and will take place from 1:00 to 3:00 o'clock Thursday June 29. The move is the outgrowth of the program outlined by the theatres of the nation for participation in the Fifth War Loan and similar rallies are being held all over the country.

### AMERICANS IN LONDON TRACE FAMILY TREE

LONDON (UP)—Tracing the English ancestors of United States relatives, unknown to them until they got in touch with the society, would have been disappointed in their quest but for the foresight of the society in filming the registers before some of them were destroyed by fire and water during the Battle of Britain.

The society has just finished the micro-filming of 9,000 parish registers—it has another 2,000 to cover to complete the filming of the entire historic church registers of Britain—and copies are available to United States servicemen who can peruse them at leisure during leave periods.

Many of the Americans who have been able to contact distant relatives, unknown to them until they got in touch with the society, would have been disappointed in their quest but for the foresight of the society in filming the registers before some of them were destroyed by fire and water during the Battle of Britain.

Mrs. Broomfield has discovered that no particular county or city can claim to have more American descents than any other. "There is no county in the land which is not claimed by some keen American visitor as the original of his family," she said. "The micro-filming of parish registers has helped to end the quest of many United States soldiers and altogether many thousands of Americans have found their English 'cousins' since American troops first came here."

### News Coverage At Conventions To Top Records

CHICAGO (UP)—Newspapers press services and the radio will carry the greatest number of words ever filed in one event when the Democratic and Republican parties hold their national conventions here this summer.

That is the prediction of party officials and communication experts who will be in charge of writing and filing stories about the two events.

More than 1,200 individual newspapermen, radio announcers and technicians and newsreel cameramen will take an active part in the convention proceedings, while many of the leading magazines of the nation will send their top political analysts here for background material.

The United Press Associations will transfer its political writers and other staff members from New York and Washington to Chicago to man a special bureau at the Stevens Hotel, press conference headquarters, with a supplementary bureau at the Chicago Stadium. Teletype machines will be installed in the hotel office.

Walter S. Hallman, chairman of the arrangements committee for the Republican meeting, has received requests for press facilities from every large newspaper in the country, and for papers from Alaska, Hawaii, and several South American countries. The same requests were made for both conventions.

Western Union, whose wires will transmit most of the copy from the conventions said the total wordage of the Democrat convention here in 1940 was almost 4,000,000 and that this total is expected to be exceeded by both conventions this year.

### PEOPLE URGED TO BUY MORE BONDS AT ONCE

Once again the people of Ranger are reminded that it will be largely through the purchase of Series E War Bonds that the Fifth War Loan Drive will be met and are asked to speed their purchases and to buy to the fullest extent of their ability.

W. F. Crigger, chairman for the drive in Ranger, stated today that the Series E Bonds are slow in sales and that many more will have to be purchased if Ranger meets its quota of \$164,000. This is the largest quota ever assigned Ranger and is proportion to the increase in the national, state and county quotas.

As it has been repeatedly pointed out, this drive is the most vital of all in as much as the invasion of Europe has started and the money from the Fifth Loan will finance what is expected to be the final drive to Victory for the Allies.

### Governor Seeks To Aid Good-Will Between Americas

AUSTIN, Tex. (UP)—Nelson Rockefeller, Co-ordinator of Inter-American Affairs has been invited by Gov. Coke E. Stevenson's Good Neighbor Commission to make a series of addresses in Texas this fall, and has tentatively accepted for speeches at Dallas and San Antonio.

The activity of the commission probably will be expanded shortly. For instance, negotiations have been started with Don Hinga, Houston newspaperman, to have him serve as public director for the commission.

As a step toward smoother handling of foreign labor problems, R. E. Smith of Houston, chairman of the commission, has requested the assistance of the regional chambers of Commerce in Texas.

Smith in his letter stressed importance of preventing instances of misunderstanding when migratory laborers are in Texas for the harvesting season.

Favorable responses already have been received from the East Texas Chamber of Commerce and the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

The program of the State Department of Education toward Inter-American Good will includes a scheduled course of 26 radio broadcasts, a course in secondary Spanish, more Spanish literature for high schools, suggestions for changes in high school history courses, establishment of clubs and classes in Spanish in elementary and high schools for adults and elimination of discriminations.

Incidentally, it was announced recently that within the last six years 12 large high schools have been opened to Latin-American school children.

### Stimson Says Robot No Threat

WASHINGTON—Sec. of War Henry L. Stimson said today that the German Robot bombs are "not yet a major factor in the war," and said the fact that the enemy "has to rely on this weapon is an acknowledgment of the weakness of the Luftwaffe in the face of superior Allied air forces."

### U. S. LOSES 49 PLANES; TWO CARRIERS ONE BATTLESHIP HIT

Carrier planes of the American Fifth Fleet have sunk and damaged 10 enemy warships. The action took place off the Philippines Monday.

One enemy carrier was sunk. Another was badly damaged and left burning. A third, a big one, believed to be a 17,000-toner, was hit by three one thousand ton bomb hits. And a fourth, a light carrier, received at least one bomb hit. One enemy battleship and one cruiser were damaged. Three destroyers were hit, and one of them badly damaged and left burning. Between 15 and 20 Jap planes were destroyed.

Forty-nine American planes were lost. Two U. S. carriers and one battleship received superficial damage, but the communique says their battle qualities were not impaired.

Meanwhile Admiral Nimitz has revised upwards the estimate of enemy planes shot down in last Sunday's Jap air attack on the American fleet. The Admiral says 555 Jap planes were destroyed, rather than 500.

American troops have closed in on the three land sides of Cherbourg. They've almost reached the sea both east and west of the Port. The escape highway to the east already has been cut and the road west from Cherbourg is either already cut or under machine gun fire. Cherbourg docks are within American rifle range. It appears Nazis intend to stage last ditch fight.

### Camp Fire Girls, Boy Scouts To Solicit Pledges

Camp Fire Girls and members of the Boy Scout troops in Ranger will make a house to house canvass of Ranger Friday morning and Saturday morning soliciting pledges for War Bonds to be bought during the Fifth War Loan drive.

It was explained this morning that persons who make the pledges may fulfill them by buying the bonds at the big rally Thursday June 29 and by purchasing the bonds at the rally via a ticket to the Ardella's Bond Premiers which will be shown at the theatre Thursday evening.

Admission to the Premiers will be by bond purchase only and the bonds must be bought at the theatre sometime between Sunday 25th and Thursday 29th.

The people of Ranger are urged to cooperate with the Scouts and Camp Fire Girls and where possible make their pledges through them.

### Cherbourg, Pas De Calais Bombed

LONDON (UP)—The Allied aerial offensive switched from Berlin to the battlefields of north ern France today as hundreds of American and British planes raked the blazing port of Cherbourg with bombs and gunfire and smashed again at the Nazi robot plane catapaults in the Pas De Calais area.

### Predicts An FDR Statement Soon

WASHINGTON—Gov. Ellis Arnall of Georgia after conferring with President Roosevelt, predicted today that the Chief Executive will soon issue a statement indicating his willingness to accept a fourth term nomination if the Democratic convention so desires.

### HAILS NAVAL VICTORY

WASHINGTON, (UP)—The American naval victory off the Philippines "will be a mighty impetus to the speeding of our advance across the Pacific and into the inner defenses of Japan," Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson declared today.

Needs of this group are imperative; they are the supply line to victory."

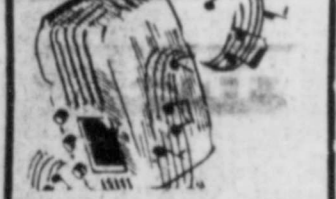

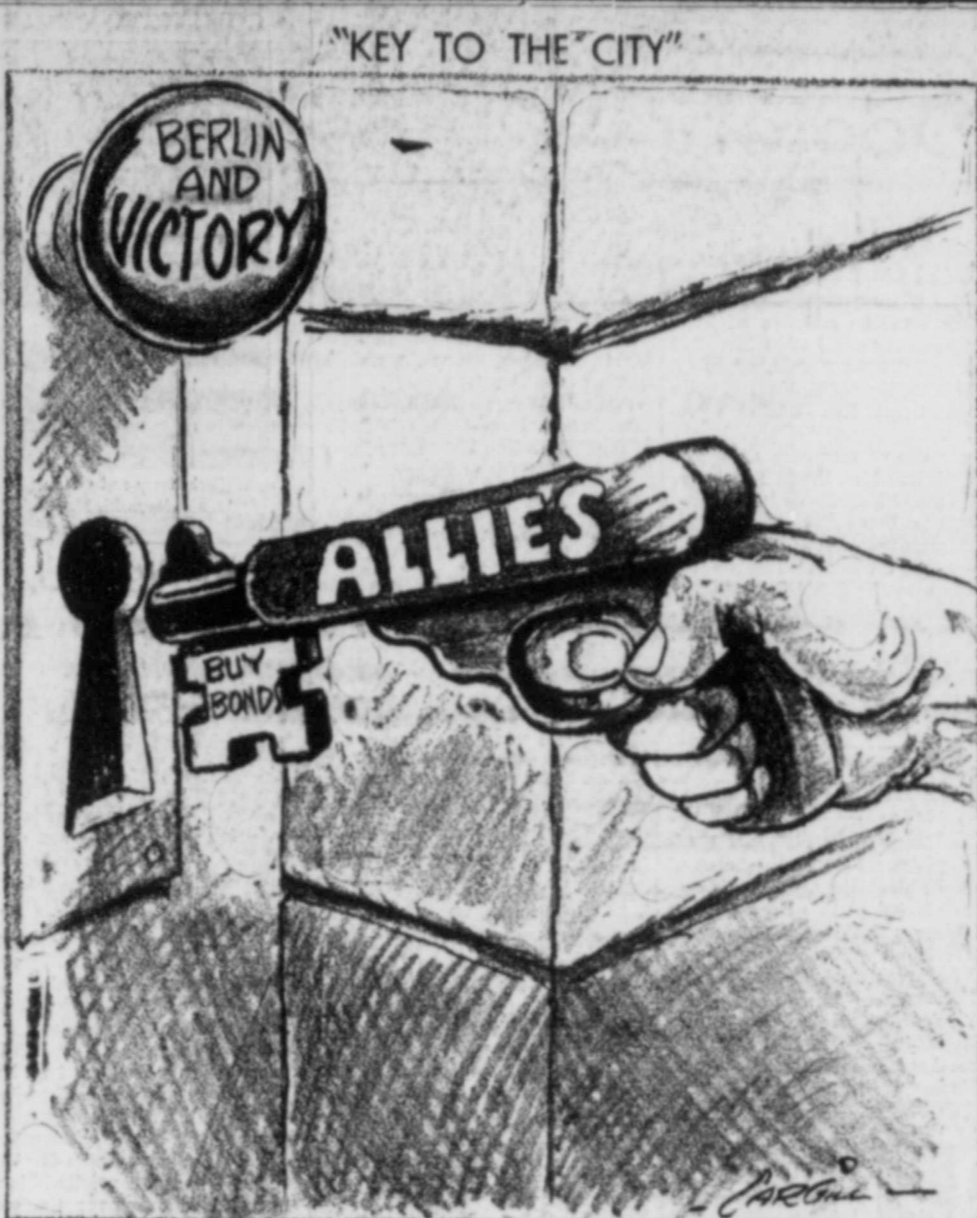

Chinese troops in the India theater, Osborne writes, have adopted basketball as their favorite sport and he wagers that "there is no team in the United States, if bar none, which can keep up with them at the pace they play."

Osborne pointed out that the Orientals, probably due to having use of only outdoor courts, have not developed the art of dribbling, so they pass constantly. Naturally, the rules (India version) have been altered slightly to fit that style.
