Playing Courts At City Park Nearing Finish

The City of Dimmitt prepared this week to resume work on the tennis, volleyball, and basketball courts in the City Park in South Dimmitt.

Begun more than a year ago, construction on the courts was halted due to heavy rains that prevented proper seasoning of the asphalt preparation on the surface. The surfaces are now in usable condition so finish work will resume and should be completed well in time for full summer use.

City Manager E. B. Noble went to Lubbock Monday and contracted for the fencing around the courts. After contacting several dealers, he awarded the work to Pioneer Fences, Inc., of Lubbock. The fence will be chain link and will be ten feet high. Cost will be \$1,918.20 installed and work is to be completed by May 30. Total length of the fence will be 540 feet, and it will also include a softball backstop.

Fifth Handicapped Children's Clinic To Be In Hereford

Fifth annual Children's Clinic will be held in Hereford on Saturday, May 21. It will be sponsored by the Oasis Shrine Club and is for children with physical handicaps, as well as those with speech and hearing difficulties.

Although the clinic is designed primarily for examination and diagnosis, immediate recommendations will be made and Shriners will assist in getting treatment for the children.

Parents of children are asked to fill out and mail the advance registration form in order to speed up the day's activities.

An outstanding group of medical men have been contacted for the Clinic. They donate their services each year. In 1959 more than 100 children were examined.

Examinations and diagnosis will be held in the Hereford Clinic and there will be a lunch provided by wives of the Shriners.

B & P W Club to Sponsor Course On Civil Defense

The Business and Professional Women's Club will sponsor a course in Civil Defense Adult Education beginning here Monday, June 6 at 7:30 in the Chemistry Room of Dimmitt High School.

This program covers such topics as "How to cope with tornadoes, hurricanes, floods, fires, and automobile accidents"; "Nuclear, chemical, and biological weapons of war"; "Sabotage"; and "How to prevent panic in emergencies."

The personal and family survival education series has been made available to adult Texans in 75 communities over the state since the program was inaugurated last fall. More than 8,000 adults have taken the free survival course which covers practical realistic training to meet everyday emergencies intelligently.

After starting June 6, the course will be held also on Tuesday, June 7, Monday, June 13, and Thursday June 16.

The Dimmitt Public School System has certified teachers to teach this free course. Classes are now being formed at the High School and any adult wishing to register should contact or call Paul Hilburn at 108-J.

Since January 1, 1959, there have been 83 tornadoes and 168 severe weather conditions in Texas. The season for severe weather and particularly tornadoes occurs about this time of year.

The combined efforts of the Dimmitt and Springlake Lions Club gained \$2,623 for Sunnyside tornado relief.

These funds were distributed out of the week, with \$200 going to each of ten families at Sunnyside and the remaining \$263 going to the Sunnyside Baptist Church which was destroyed during the tragic tornado which struck the community on Tuesday evening, April 12. This fund included \$347 collected by the two clubs through a minstrel program staged as a benefit by the Springlake Lions following the disaster.

Dimmitt's 'Little Red School House' Held Mixture of Fun and Learning

Every graduating class has its memories and within the scope of those memories can be found many small dramas arising out of routine school days. Dramas and incidents which help mold a class together, making the individual members become an entity and at the same time developing the individual's own identity. This, to a degree, whether we realize it or not, was education during the era of the "red school house" in Dimmitt and in America and it is education today in Dimmitt and America.

Dimmitt's "red school house" stood in the middle of what now is the city park, and it served the town's educational needs both as

a grade school and as a high school from 1912 until 1952 when it came to look like "a ragged beggar" on the outside and within. The teachers' desks had become "deep scarred by raps official"; the warping floor, the battered seats, the jack-knife carved initials, the worn door-sill betraying the feet that, creeping slow to school, went storming out to playing—all these things were sad evidences that Dimmitt needed a new school.

This year's graduating class is the last class who spent their first four years in "the old red school." It sat on a tall mound and grass grew "round" and we were not to get on that grass, one graduating senior reminisced,

with other members of the 1960 graduates Monday afternoon in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Cowen. Mrs. Cowen, Mrs. E. C. Caudle and Mrs. O. K. Howe who taught the graduates in their first four years of school in the old red school house and Mrs. Claude Forson who was principal, honored them with a party after school Monday evening. Mrs. Glenn Ratcliff was also a hostess. Mr. and Mrs. James Bates and Mrs. Inez Robison were also guests. Mrs. Bates taught in the red school and Mrs. Robison and Mr. Bates are senior sponsors.

The group entertained themselves for several hours, simply calling to mind incidents which oc-

curred during these first four years in the old school building. There was the young man who didn't behave altogether properly one day and his teacher was forced to fulfill her responsibility to him. So, Mrs. Caudle directed the cherubic little culprit to yon green tree, and "There," she told him "you must stand during recess and watch while the others play." After a time she checked to see how he was doing. He was gone! "Where could he be? Why couldn't he be normal for once and do what he was supposed to? I'll skirt the building and make sure he's not on the play ground." On the opposite side of the building there was another tree and that is where Mrs. Caudle found her young charge. "Why this tree, when I pointed to the other one?" she asked. "B-but" he stammered with that terrible lump in his throat hurting, and that near-collapse feeling in his lungs like all the air had been squeezed out, and his tongue that acted so silly and wouldn't form syllables, "m-m-m-y d-dad will come b-by on the o-o-ther side on his w-way home and s-see me and know I've been bad!" That young man was one of Dimmitt's future star athletes, Hal Ratcliff.

Then there were the two little girls who decided to play house as all little girls will. Peggy Gilbreath was the mother and Carole Cowert was her little girl. Carole was naughty one day and Peggy wanted to be a really "good" mother; she wanted to fulfill her entire responsibility to Carole which included "discipline. Peggy was such a very young mother she didn't know much about modern child psychology. She decided the quickest form of discipline would be the best, so she turned Carole across her knee to give her a spanking. But this was old-fashioned and Carole was modern, so she bit a "hunk" out of Peggy. They broke up house-keeping after that and Mr. Cowert waved his hands in despair, and said, "Oh, Carole! if you had to fight, why did you bite?"

There were many, many other incidents, too. Every young child learns early in life how convenient it is to be sick. However, the ones who use this trick effectively are born "opportunists" and unless they are, it generally is wiser not to play. But how is a young man or woman going to know if he is or isn't an opportunist until he's played the game? It seems at the old red school house part of the girls in one class were to alternate playground area with another group. One area was well equipped and the other was not. When this particular group were to play in the area that was not equipped they fell ill. That way they didn't have to play at all... but memory plays such vicious tricks, sometimes, even on the young. They forgot and were sick one day

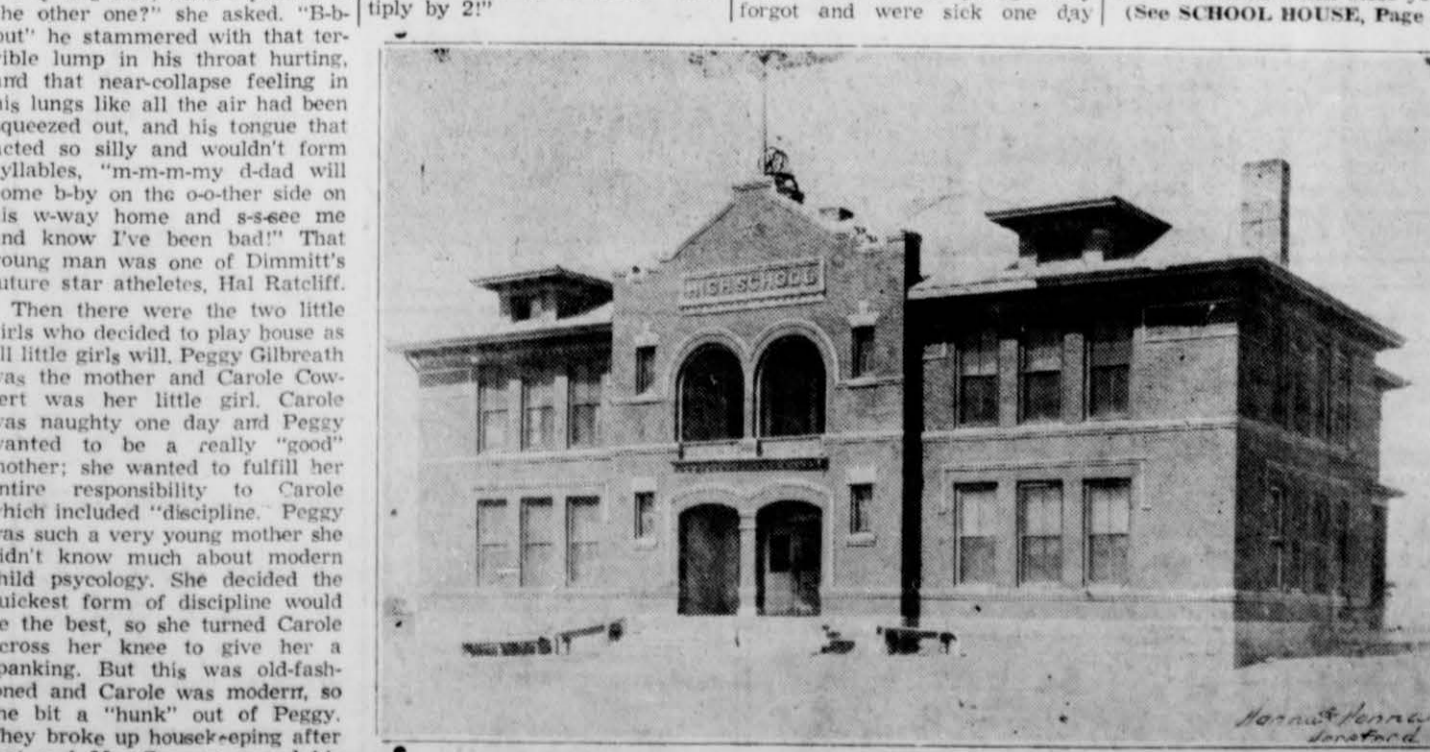
when it was their turn to have the seesaws, swings, slides, etc. No "born" opportunist would have had a lapse of memory like that.

Where does a group of young fourth graders go, anyway, when they've been caught in the act of breaking some cardinal rule of the school, and the chips are really down because the principal is in hot pursuit? Where? Oh, just where does one go? But of course, the boys rest room! She'll never come in there! Boy, what a sharp idea! But the door, the only door in this rest room had, it swung open with such gusto it almost toppled some of the would-be escapees and there stood their lady principal, ped, but good!

Walter Rogers' WASHINGTON NEWSLETTER

DEMOCRACY

The news these days is filled with word of primary elections, which are commanding the attention of people in various States all over the country. These elections have assumed an even greater importance in this presidential year, and are certain to offer a demonstration of the vigorous way in which our democracy can work.

Our own great State held its primary this past week, and I want to say how grateful and proud I am for the confidence and friendship expressed in me by the people of the Panhandle. In addition to an earnest word of thanks for this expression, I want to say that I will do all within my power to justify the confidence in my efforts to uphold the best possible government.

Our government functions at its best with the cooperation and liaison between the representative and the represented. I would like to reassert that I solicit and ever welcome the expression and views of every single person in every one of the 28 counties in the 18th Congressional District of Texas in order to more effectively discharge my duties and responsibilities as your Congressman. I trust I may continue to receive them by mail, telephone, verbally, or in any other manner. The process of selecting a democratic government is always a tremendously exciting experience. No matter what the views one may hold, the right to express

those views in a free election, as was done in the Texas primary, seems to renew the hope of people all over the world in democracy. Such is the hope we are all expressing as millions of ballots are cast between now and the November general elections. At the same time, we might also be expressing the friendly wish that on some day in the not-too-distant future the same opportunity can be extended to men and women everywhere so that all may experience the far-flung possibilities of free government.

Elections have become increasingly important in the most recent history of our country, when responsible, active, and intelligent leadership has become so vital to our future. The United States, whether we like it or not, has become the free world's pivot. The features of our domestic life have grown so complex that it is virtually impossible to have a thorough, working knowledge of our world today.

So, in government as in just about everything else, we find ourselves coming to depend upon the good efforts of many other people. There are, of course, good and bad aspects of this process our nation is undergoing. I think we may at least be proud of the fact that people everywhere have a greatly increased opportunity to play an ever larger role in forging the type of country and world that is be-

lieved best. But as the opportunities for people increase, so do the dangers. The threats to our national security are pressing from both within and without. The responsibility of meeting these threats is indeed a grave and sobering one, but I shall continue to work toward that end and preserve the form of government which we all cherish so highly. I am deeply honored to have so many friends and supporters among the fine people of the 18th District, and I want you all to know that I shall continue to work for the best of my ability within the Congress of the United States.

YOU TOO?

The designation of the plane brought down by the Russians, the U-2, could have been the expression by Khrushchev, when he pointed an accusing finger at this country. It would certainly be appropriate, because the Russians have been doing the same thing for a long time and have been caught at it in this country and Canada. Although their activities have not yet involved aerial reconnaissance, so far as we know, I feel sure that some must have gone on. We would certainly be naive to think otherwise.

The big scream from Russia is based upon what they claim is a violation of international law. That is, the unapproved violation of their territorial boundaries. Since

a boundary line is fixed on land and water, extends downward to the center of the earth and upward to the heavens, it would probably be in order to call attention to the fact that Russia, by her own admission, violated the territorial sovereignty of this country when she placed Sputnik in orbit. She openly claimed that this object passed immediately over the United States. So far as I know, there has not been any separation of outer space insofar as territorial boundaries are concerned. Perhaps Russia is operating on the theory that the difference between violation or non-violation of territorial boundaries in the air space above a country depends upon whether or not you are able to shoot down the object in such air space. This has not, to my knowledge, been adopted as a rule of international law, and I doubt that it will be, but Russia has never been known to be hesitant in making rules that fit her own conduct favorably.
