Faced with a critical backlog of thousands of unserviceable army motor vehicles in its repair shops the Eighth Service Command sent out an urgent appeal today for more than 3,000 civilian automobile mechanics and other automotive workers to help repair the vehicles for emergency army needs.

Direct recruiting orders for the workers and lists of available jobs in each installation have been laced with civil service office " throughout the service command. Applicants for the jobs, however, should apply at the United States Employment Service office, 104 Main, Brownwood, Texas. All transfers to the army automotive jobs will be made in accordance with War Manpower Commission regulations.

There are 2,000 openings for automotive mechanics alone, and , nearly 1500 opportunities exist for

The list of available jobs, includes: Automotive inspectors, automotive mechanics in all grades, tank mechanics, machinists, carburetor and ignition men, body repairmen, blacksmiths, and welders, battery repairmen, radiator repairmen, auto painters wheel and frame mechanics, upholsterers, glass cutters, lubricators, laborers, parts experts, artillery, small arms and instrument repairment.

AThe majority of the vehicles to be reconditioned calls for fourth echelon maintenance which in ar my terminology means complete overhauling.

To meet the quota of workers required to meet the emergency demand for the vehicles service command trials are calling upon worker the special automotive skills that temporary leave of absence from their pre-sent employment in order to help the army get the vehicles in shape

for immediate use.

The command is requesting employers and automobile associations to cooperate in a plan to playees on a temporary basis to work on the army backlog.

Returning war veterans are also being sought for the lobs.

6 WASHINGTON-Look for Admr. William F. Halsey. Jr., to make headlines again in the near future. Nothing has been heard about his activities since he was named commander of the Third Fleet, but you can be sure he hasn't been idle.

The Jap high command would give anything for an inkling of Halsey's plans, but the "fox of Guadalcanal" will show his hand only with guns and planes in a new

war zone on the road to Tokyo. Officers close to Haisey say that the admiral's greatest worry is that America might permit the Pacific war to end without smashing the Nipponese war machine completely. Haisey wants to see American fighting men marching down the

streets of Tokyo.

Halsey and other Navy men are afraid that the
Japenese might offer the United States alluring peace terms in the hope of getting a breathing spell in which to prepare for another war with

the United States. The Third Fleet undoubtedly will play a big part in the next major invasion move in the Pa-

effic, and the new "D day" should not be too far away. . WOMEN ADVOCATES of a proposed equal rights amendment to constitution are busy lining up votes now in Congress as the

climax to a 21-year fight. For the first time in more than two decades they feel they have a good chance to obtain congressional approval of the proposed addition to the constitution.

A joint resolution, sponsored by 24 Democratic and Republican senators, is now awaiting a vote, expected "in a few weeks."

Miss Alice Paul, chairman of the National Woman's party, leading

backer of the proposed amendment, hailed the action of the Demo cratic party in including an equal rights plank in its 1944 platform as tantamount to victory for "the cause."

If the amendment is approved by Congress it will, of course, have to be ratified by three-fourths of the states to become law. Many



# Would You Stab A Soldier In The Back Over Here While He Serves Over There?

### Negroes Endorse Critz

On August 18, 1944, a newspaper published for Negroes in Houston, Harris County, Texas, carried an editorial endorsing Richard Critz, as follows:

"In the judgement of the Examiner, the wisest thing for the Negroes to do is to help nominate Judge Critz for a third term.'

Based on this endorsement of a Negro newspaper editorial, would it be fair for the friends of Gordon Simpson to charge that the Negroes of Texas seek to control the Supreme Court, and ask the question, "Shall the Negroes or any other special interest group control the Supreme Court?" No, this would not be fair, and we do not make such charge.

In the first primary the voters of a portion of Texas where the newspaper of Hans Ankermann circulatedwhic hpaper was suppressed by the United States Government because of un-American activities- voted overwhelmingly for Richard Critz. Would it be fair, because of this vote, to charge that if Richard Critz were elected to the Sppreme Court the German-American Bund would seek to control the Supreme Court of Texas? No, it would not be fair, it would not be true, and we do not make such charge.

### **Duval County**

In the July primary, the block vote of Duval, Starr and Hidalgo Counties voted overwhelmingly for Richard Critz. In fact, this great soldier, Gordon Simpson, could get only five votes out of all Starr County, eight votes out of Duval County. Would it be fair to charge that Judge Critz would be the tool of that block vote, or that the vote would control the Supreme Court of Texas if Judge Critz were elected? No, it would not be fair; neither would it be true; so we do not make such charge.

### Harry Bridges' Union Attorney

On yesterday the supporters of Gordon Simpson received an affidavit made in Ft. Worth, Texas, which affidavit appears to be made for the benefit of Richard Critz.

This affidavit is signed by one JACK LOVE who, we have been informed, is an attorney for the International Longshoremen & Warehousemen's Union. This union is headed by HARRY BRIDGES. Would it be fair for us to charge that because this affidavit was made by the attorney for a union affiliated wth the CIO, that thereby Harry Bridges and the CIO were seeking to control the Supreme Court of Texas? No, it would not be fair and we do not make such a charge.

### NOW, IS RICHARD CRITZ WILLING TO BE FAIR?

Richard Critz has sent a letter to the lawyers all over Texas charging that the CIO has endorsed Gordon Simpson 100 per cent and has decreed that Richard Critz be defeated. Richard Critz says that he bases this statement upon the fact that a local industrial union council at Houston, Texas, before the first primary, issued a statement against Richard Critz and said that Richard Critz should be defeated; then Richard Critz used this as a foundation to declare that the CIO Political Action Committee has decreed the Richard Critz defeat. Further, he plainly implies that if Gordon Simpson is elected to the Supreme Court that the CIO would control that Court. In addition, thousands of postcards have been sent out and advertisements galore put in the papers by his henchmen making such charge. Is this not unfair? Is this not stabbing a soldier in the back over here while he serves over there?

Won't the mothers, fathers and wives of the boys who fight our common enemy condemn such unfair and un-American tactics?
