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NAZIS ADMIT EVACUATION OF ROUEN, ROBOT COAST GUARD

Two American tank armies stormed into Laon and the Cathedral city of Reims today. As the Yanks pushed rapidly ahead in the drive toward Belgium and the German border, Berlin admitted its troops had abandoned Rouen guarding the robot bomb coast of Northern France.

NEW YORK — The Nazis were reported to have sent troops from Norway to Northern France in a desperate attempt to hold the Allied drive.

A radio correspondent said that many of the troops already had been captured.

Seine bridgehead at Vernon, reaching a point 25 miles east of Rouen and 15 miles west of Beauvais. Germans trying to flee across the Drome River near its confluence with the Rhone, in Southern

NEW YORK — The British radio said that all allied patriots in Belgium have been called to join an army of resistance.

France, were engaged by American troops. More than 250 American heavy bombers hammered German flying bomb launching platforms in the Pas De Calais area today. At the same time, 600 Flying Forts and 300 fighters attacked the German naval base at Kiel and targets in the Bremen area.

With British Second Army in Northern France — A British correspondent estimated that the Germans may now have no more than 100,000 men in Northern France. He said the Germans had lost nearly all of their tanks and have little field artillery.

German sources said the Russians had penetrated the Ploesti area of Southern Romania. The Eighth Army on the Adriatic side of the Italian Peninsula moved up for an assault on the eastern end of the Gothic Line. The Allies were clearing the area

LONDON — Dispatches from Istanbul and Cairo quoted diplomatic circles as saying that Bulgaria has agreed to the Anglo-American peace terms.

around Florence, but the western end was quiet. Allied bombers made a heavy attack on the Japanese base at Amboina, below Halmahera, with 188 tons of explosives, and new blows were struck at the Southern Philippines and Halmahera. Wide-spread targets in the Central Pacific also were attacked.

Union And Shrimp Dealers Dispute Ties Up Fleet

GALVESTON, Tex. (UP)—The tide's shrimping fleet was tied up today and free shrimp had virtually disappeared from the local market, reportedly because of a price dispute between a newly-chartered union and major shrimp dealers.

The dealers refused to clarify the situation, merely reporting that the trawlers were tied up because of "unfavorable fishing conditions" in the Gulf. The new union, the Texas Fishermen's Association, reported through president C. D. McMillan, however, that the tie-up resulted from failure of the dealers to increase prices, which sh said are considerably below the ceilings fixed by the OPA.

Inside WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON—Funny, but when you live as close to important people as you do in Washington, you forget how important they are. You take them as average citizens. Daily associates. Plain folks, really. Until you get out of this town of distorted values and somebody says, for example:

"Have you ever met Senator Barkley? The one from Kentucky who seems to be sort of close to the president? I think he ran for vice president in Chicago—do you know him?"
"Know Alben Barkley?" (You tack on the first name or Washington method of celebrity calling. This always impresses the stranger.) "I should say I do know Alben Barkley! He lives in my apartment house. I often see him at the door struggling for a cab. He's sort of square architecturally and in character, too. Has two pretty daughters. One married to the nephew of Gen. Douglas MacArthur and the other is the wife of Max Truitt, a smart, young Washington lawyer. Mrs. Barkley is an awfully nice woman. She has not been too well lately."

"Who else do you know?"
"Mercy, what an order! Let me see, who've I run into lately? Oh, yes, Frank Murphy. Of the United States supreme court. Saw Frank lunching at the Mayflower with a bevy of beauties. The bevy consisted of two. Always a safe number for a bachelor who is given to shying at matrimony."

"Of course, there's Arthur Vandenberg, senator from Michigan. Arthur would have made a good presidential candidate. Arthur keeps on being a leader in his party. Look like? Well, he's a big fellow with rather handsome, bold features and a lot of almost white hair. He has presence and a sense of humor. Everybody doesn't know about the sense of humor."

"Vandenberg and his attractive wife live in an apartment hotel. Arthur won't make any engagements for Sunday. Prefers to loaf about the home all day. Thinking up new ways to do the New Deal in."

"I understand there are a lot of uniforms about." You are likely to have this mentioned by the out-of-towner.

"I should say so. But not half as many young uniformed men as you saw a month or so ago. Now many are off taking beach-heads and islands. The older ones here at home are thinking up ways of keeping the fighters going."

"Secretary of Commerce Jones seems to have a finger in every other Washington pie. Ever run into him?"

"Running into Jesse"—first name stuff again—"would be like running into a stone wall. He is as big as the state of Texas, where he went after he migrated from Tennessee. Jesse has a face like a very knowing chagab, pink and round and dimply. Has a dry humor and never gives in."

"Mrs. Jones is small and a little serious. She is a keen bridge player and a frequent partner of Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, of whom she is a great friend. Mrs. Wilson had quite a time in Hollywood when the movie about her husband was being made. She keeps far out of sight in Washington. Even has her secretary answer many letters in the secretary's name."

"Are the diplomats on view much nowadays?" Perhaps your questioner will ask this.

"The South American ones are at many pleasant places. But the Europeans are living rather quietly. You hardly ever see them anywhere. They are probably sticking close to their desks, plugging away as the final steps of the war close in. Diplomatic parties used to be the most elegant in Washington. Done with a flair for entertaining and a big expense account, they made you feel awfully cosmopolitan."

"Does the president go out often?" Here is another popular question.

"If he does, few people ever know it. You see, he goes out this judiciously. Certainly the sound of siren and the rush of secret service cars and out riders is heard on the streets far less than in peace time. No wonder presidents of the like to pop off to strange countries for some reason or other. They are virtually prisoners in the White House."

"Yet it does appear that many people wouldn't mind being that kind of prisoner." Your listener is on the verge of taking the floor himself. So you stop the conversation.

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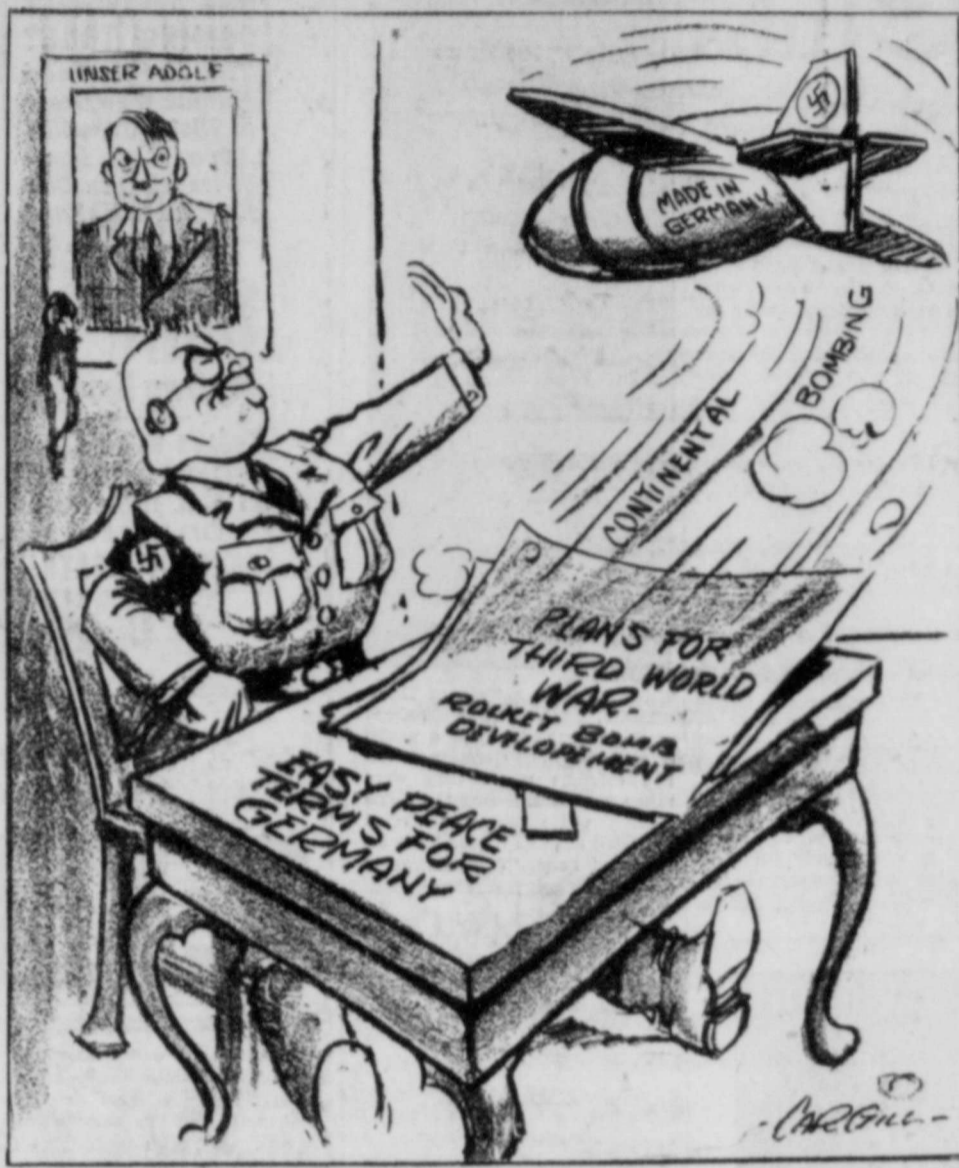

tificate from the Library of Congress for transcribing into Braille. She spent an average of 35 hours of tedious work in transcribing each story. In the collection are many books that have never before been transcribed into Braille.

Selection of stories is left to Mrs. Brown's two little girls who have chosen such tales as Bambi, Raggedy Ann, and Cowboy Ken. Mrs. Brown says that she is interested primarily in helping the blind to be as much like their seeing friends as possible.

In addition to transcribing the books Mrs. Brown illustrates them with cut out figures. She has also bound and hand embossed each of the volumes. She handles circulation, mailing and correspondence for the library and sends with each Braille book a copy of the original so that parents may see what their children are reading.

Mrs. Brown says that she started the children's library because while some states have circulating libraries for the blind, none has books for youngsters.

Grandpappy Only Male Plane In Army Air Force

GREELEY, Colo. (UP) — In all our army, it is said, only one plane has a name which identifies it as of masculine gender.

That plane is "Grandpappy." Its pilot is Capt. Carmel F. Felice of Greeley.

Not only does "Grandpappy" have an unusual name; he has an unusual job — one that younger folks might welcome too. Because "Grandpappy" is the only airplane of its kind in the army, it draws such assignments as carrying pretty girls around the

world for USO camp shows, or taking medicine to South American earthquake victims.

"Grandpappy" can carry a good big load up to 50 passengers if he had to — so he also gets an occasional job carrying troops.

"Grandpappy" is nominally a heavy bomber, but there isn't another like him. He was built by Boeing in 1935, just one of three planes of his design. One of the ships was never completed and the other cracked up on its trial flight, leaving only "Grandpappy" for active service.

"Grandpappy" got that masculine name, according to Captain Felice, because "he is strong enough to deserve that reference and old enough to be a grandpappy."

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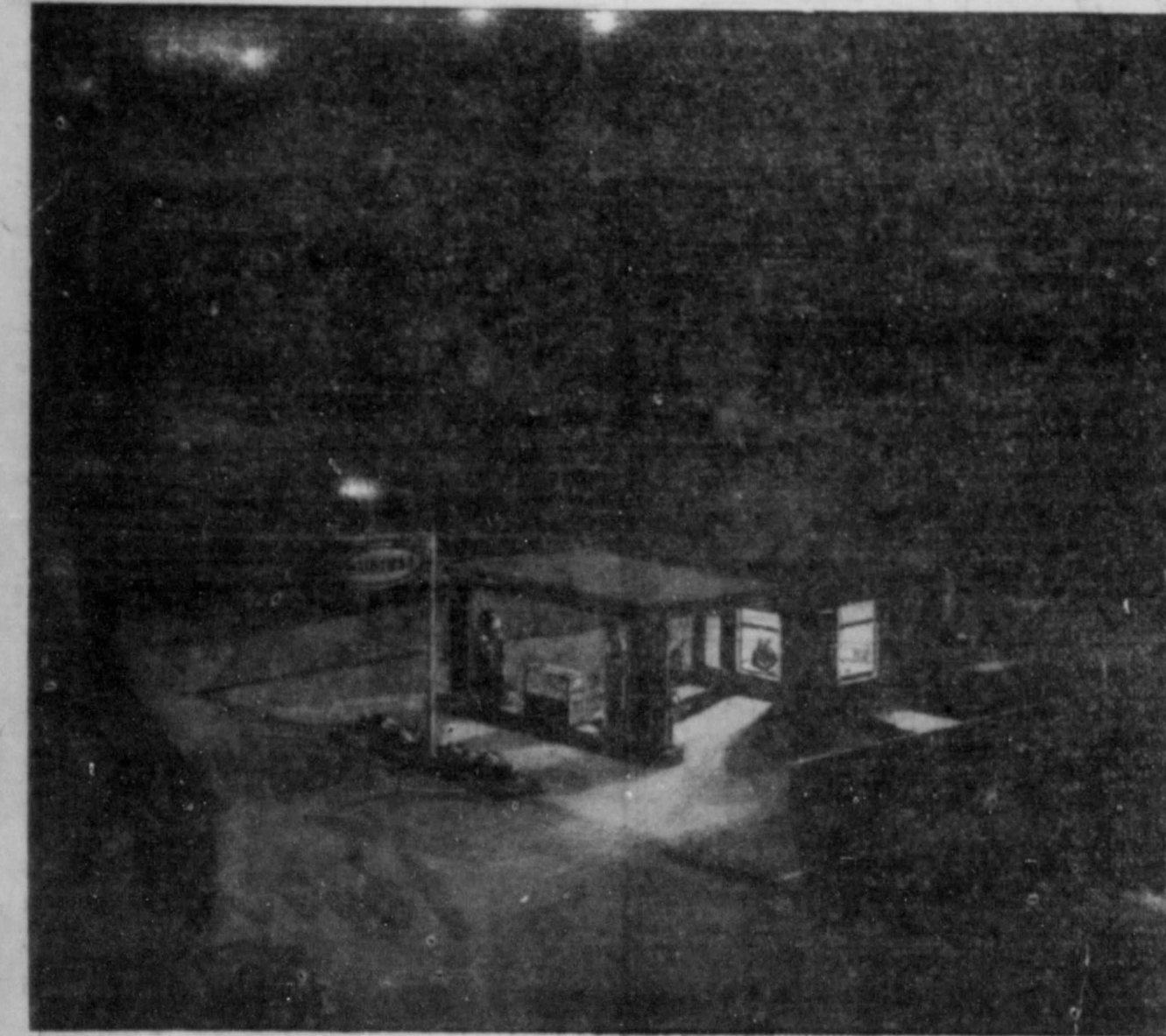

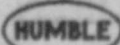
