A Central Pacific Base—Private first class Fred K. Moseley of Ranger, Texas, was awarded the newly authorized Bronze Star for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy during the battle for Attu by Brigadier General LeRoy J. Stewart of the Seventh Infantry Division, in a ceremony held recently at a Central Pacific Base.

Pfc. Moseley, a member of an infantry assault unit, received the decoration in recognition of his outstanding actions, beyond the call of duty in the grueling three-week battle for Attu, top of the fog-bound Alutian Island chain, a year ago.

A veteran of two campaigns in the Pacific war, Pfc. Moseley participated with the Seventh Division in the recent assault and capture of Kwajalein atoll, center of Jap held Marshall Islands.

In addition to the Bronze Star, Pfc. Moseley wears the Good Conduct Medal, the Asiatic-Pacific Theater ribbon with two battle stars, and the Combat Infantryman's badge, and the Distinguished Unit Citation Badge.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James F. Moseley, Ranger, Texas.

The exchange prisoners include both officers and enlisted men. They will be removed to the Army Halloran Hospital at Staten Island New York.

After warming up on a few preliminaries last week, Southwest Conference Football teams are settling down to the season's work with a full schedule this week end. As they have for the past nine years, Humble Oil and Refining Company will bring broadcasts of the season's games to football fans.

The Rice-Randolph Field broadcast also starts at 7:50 over stations KXYZ, Houston, KTRA, San Antonio and KGKO, Dallas-Ft. Worth. Wes Box will handle play by play while Fred Nahas describes color.

800,000 Lost By Nazi Since D-Day

That number includes more than 500,000 thousand captured, 100,000 thousand killed and 200,000 thousand wounded seriously.

Aged Texan Still Recalls A Real Wild West Show

GALVESTON, Tex., (UP)—Eighty-six-year-old J. R. Stanton, retired Galveston locomotive engineer, is probably one of the few men still alive who can recall a real live wild west show, complete with masked bandits, speeding trains, spitting gunfire, sheriff's posse, jail breaks, and all.

It happened on the night of June 9, 1898, when Stanton was engineer for the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe Railway. He was bringing his train into Coleman Junction when he heard shots ring out behind him and looked up to see a .44 revolver staring him in the face. The man who was holding it had a long, black mask.

Then he heard some more shots ring out. One of the passengers on the train had opened fire on the bandits, of whom there were three and succeeded in wounding one of them. But that wasn't the end of it.

Stanton saw another bandit placing dynamite under the baggage car. The dynamite did not go off, but a fireman was killed and the bandits escaped.

When the train pulled into Santa Anna, a posse was rounded up to go after the bandits and two of them were captured. The third made a getaway.

One of the two who were captured went out and brought in the third for a promise of his own freedom.

The officers of the law never did bring the daring desperado to trial however.

He broke jail and made off with the sheriff's horse.

Besides his father he is survived by his wife, Mrs. Bessie Sharp and one son, Pvt. Ed. Sharp of the armed forces, and eleven brothers and sisters, including Mrs. Ben Ervin and Mrs. Tom Fox, of Ranger.

Interests Of Capitol Visitors Vary With Age

AUSTIN, Tex., (UP)—Age seems to draw a dividing line of interest among those who visit the House of Representatives chamber in the State capitol for the first time.

Boys and girls and the young men and women are interested mainly in historical happenings and the mechanics of government. Their questions to the House members seek answers about how frequently the legislature meets and the scope of its authority.

Men and women past middle age appear to have the background knowledge and their interests mostly are in the large panels of pictures of governors and House members which surround the chamber.

Large numbers of the older persons want to see—even before registering in the guest book—the pictures of former Governors W. Lee O'Daniel and James E. Ferguson. Of the pair, O'Daniel draws the larger number.

For several minutes some individuals and groups, will stand looking upward at O'Daniel's picture.

Said one South Texan as he gazed at the photograph: "God bless him and keep him. He ought to be president, and someday God will put him there."

An older couple once asked a hostess to see the bed in which Gov. Coke R. Stevenson slept, evidently thinking the governor resided in the capitol.

The hostess explained that the governor lived in the mansion where there is a bed in which General Sam Houston slept.

Premier, Woodley Make Two More Well Locations

Drilling operations of Premier Oil Refining Company of Longview and Ranger and the Woodley Petroleum Company of Houston picked up this week when the two companies announced the location and beginning of operations on a well located on the Tolle property in the edge of Stephens county close to the Eastland county line.

The new well is 340 feet from the south line and 1,320 feet from the west line of the Tolle property in section 458 of the S. P. Railway survey. The pit was dug the first of the week and operations are underway. L. H. Choate of Cisco holds the contract.

David D. Pickrell, superintendent of the Premier in the Ranger district, also stated today that the companies expect to start another well in that area in the next 15 days. This well will be located on the G. W. Thorpe tract and will be 467 feet out of the southwest corner of the northeast quarter of section 456, S. P. survey. It will be 900 feet from the first well drilled on this tract by the companies, and will be 1,600 feet from the Premier Oil Refining company's F. Thorpe. This well will be an Ellenberger test and will be drilled to approximately 4,200 feet.

The number 3 F. Thorpe now drilling is expected to reach production within the next 100 to 200 feet.

A blackout has been placed on all war news from Holland. Correspondents are not allowed to speculate on the course of the battle around Arnhem, where Allied paratroopers are in a serious plight.

A German military spokesman claims Nazi tank forces again have cut the Eindhoven-to-Nijmegen supply road in Holland.

Allied spokesmen say supply columns in Holland still are running the gauntlet of fire from the Rhine. The convoys have been forced to use secondary roads.

The Berlin radio boasts that the Allied drive into Germany will be "measured in inches and will cost streams of blood."

The American Seventh Army in eastern France is reported to have begun a large scale attack 30 miles north of Belfort, the gateway to Southwestern Germany.

The American Fifth Army in Italy virtually has been stopped

Suggestions Are Given For Fall, Winter Gardens

SUGGESTIONS ARE 18 N. . . Most back yards in south, central and East Texas will produce vegetables during the fall and winter, says Lorna Faye Hewitt, Assistant County Home Demonstration Agent. With average care most of the desirable vegetables such as onions, carrots, cabbage, spinach, beets, mustard, lettuce, radish and white potatoes will yield well.

Success begins with correct preparation of the soil. After clearing off weeds and other vegetation it should be plowed four to five inches deep and clods pulverized. Barnyard fertilizer broadcast freely over the surface will prevent the soil packing and increase its water holding capacity. . . .

Butyl Rubber Now Made In Texas

HOUSTON, Tex.—On September 9, the first Butyl rubber produced in Texas came from the finishing mill of the Government's new Butyl rubber plant at Baytown according to a story to appear in the current issue of the BEE, official refinery publication of the Humble Oil and Refining Company.
 The new plant, known as Plan-cor 1082, is staffed and operated by the Humble Oil and Refining Company, and was constructed by Stone and Webster Engineering Corporation for Defense Plants Corporation.
 The Butyl plant involves processes of recent development and produces synthetic rubber from a feed stock originating in Humble's two giant catalytic crackers at the Baytown refinery. Exerted in temperature are involved in the manufacturing process ranging from below 100 degrees F in the vessels where the rubber is actually formed to 300 degrees F in the roller mills where the rubber crumbs are converted into sheet rubber.
 Butyl rubber is one of the two types of synthetic rubber produced at Baytown, but unlike Buna-S, the other synthetic rubber (Butyl) is strictly a petroleum product. Buna-S is made by combining butadiene produced from either petroleum or alcohol, with styrene and other ingredients produced from other organic materials, while Butyl rubber is made direct from iso-butylene and isoprene, both products of petroleum.
 Buna-S is being used for automobile tires, while Butyl rubber
