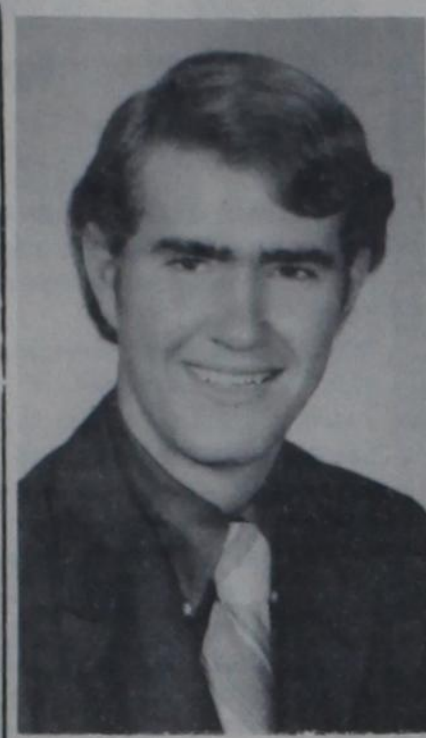

Dimmitt High School's Class of 1971 is setting a new record for scholarship.

EIGHT of this year's 89 seniors have been announced as honor grads, and the top two have the highest grade averages of any DHS graduate in the last 10 years.

Valedictorian of the class is Kent Bradford with a four-year grade average of 98.52.

The salutatorian, Pam Barker, is finishing her high school career just 0.04 of a point behind Bradford at 98.48.

BRADFORD and Miss Barker have both posted higher grade averages than any DHS valedictorian in the last decade.

The third and fourth ranking students in the class—Sharon Welch with 95.09 and Clyde Damron Jr. with 94.13—are finishing with higher averages than four of the last 10 valedictorians.

Four other members of the graduating class have been named honor grads, with grade averages above 90. They are Julie Hottel with 92.63, Anne Golding with 92.42, Susan Parish with 92.29, and Jo Ann Stone with 90.76.

THREE OF this year's DHS graduates have received honors from the prestigious National Merit Foundation. Bradford has been awarded a \$1,000 National Merit Scholarship, Miss Welch was a finalist in the National Merit Tests, and Miss Barker was named a National Merit Foundation Commended Student.

Until this year, the highest scoring valedictorians in DHS during the past decade were Robert Froehner with a 97.35 average in 1969, and Keitha Davis with a 96.52 in 1961.

This year's valedictorian is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Bradford. He is a member of the National Honor Society, president of the Bobcat Band, and has served as a member of the DHS Student Council. He has been president of his class and also has been chosen "Most Valuable in Class" and "All School Favorite."

A TOP competitor in UIL science competition he won the state championship as a junior last year. This year he captured the regional championship but did not go to the state meet. He also has won school awards in history, biology, geometry and algebra.

In addition to being a top scholar, Bradford has gained state and national acclaim on the basketball court. He was given an honorable mention this week in the high school All-American selections, and earlier this year was named to the all-district, all-South Plains

### Do you notice anything new?

Do you notice anything different about your newspaper? IT'S THE type-face you're reading. It's new with this issue.

The News has changed from the "Teletype Regal" body type which it has used for years, to a slightly larger "Corona" face, designed by the Mergenthaler Linotype Corp.

Both type faces are of the Early Roman family, copied from the lettering styles engraved on the marble and granite buildings of ancient Rome. Because of their easy readability, Early Roman type faces are used in virtually all newspapers, books and magazines.

THE MATRIXES, or brass molds, for the old Regal type face were becoming worn and were producing unsightly "hairlines" between the letters. So when we changed to all-new matrixes, we also changed type faces.

The main differences between the Regal and Corona faces are that the Corona is slightly darker, the bodies of its letters are larger, and it has shorter ascenders (such as the d) and shorter descenders (such as the p) in relation to the body.

For comparison, here's a clipping of our old body-type from last week's issue:

### In Hart wreck

## Lady seriously injured

A Dimmitt woman was seriously hurt in a car-pickup accident Friday morning at the intersection of State 194 and FM 168 in Hart.

INJURED was Mrs. Margarita Cantu, 59, who received multiple leg fractures, a severe neck injury and chest injuries when the pickup in which she was riding collided broadside with a car that was crossing the highway.

The car, a 1970 Buick, was driven by James Eugene Corlett, 63, a Lubbock insurance agent.

Highway Patrolmen said Mrs. Cantu's husband, Roberto, 54, was driving their 1969 Dodge pickup west on State 194 when the accident occurred. Riding with them in the pickup was their granddaughter, Becky Martinez, 3.

OFFICERS said that Corlett, driving north toward Hart on FM 168, apparently stopped at the intersection blinker light and stop sign on the south edge of Hart, but then started across the highway and drove into the path of the oncoming pickup.

Mrs. Cantu was thrown against the dashboard of the pickup. Her husband and granddaughter escaped serious injury. Corlett also was uninjured as the pickup slammed broadside into the right front door of his car.

Corlett was cited for failure to yield right-of-way at a stop intersection. Mrs. Cantu received emergency treatment at Plains Memorial Hospital, then was transferred to a Lubbock hospital.

TWO OTHER wrecks occurred on county highways during the week, but neither caused serious injuries. A calf was killed last Thursday night 3.7 miles south of Nazareth on FM 168 when it was hit by a 1969 Pontiac driven by Rev. Fredric Leo Hyland of Plainview.

Father Hyland was not injured, although the accident caused moderate damage to his car, officers said.

THE WEEK'S third accident occurred Monday afternoon

when a blowout on a car that was being towed caused the towing pickup to leave the road and overturn.

The accident occurred at 3:15 p.m., eight miles north of Dimmitt on US 385.

Patrolmen said Charles Basil Sherrill of Lubbock was towing a 1955 Cadillac with his 1965 Chevrolet pickup when a tire on the Cadillac blew out. Sherrill reportedly lost control of his pickup and it overturned. Both vehicles ended up in a bar-ditch on the west side of the highway.

Sherrill was not believed seriously injured, although damage to his pickup was extensive, officers said.

### Growers approve wheat assessment by large margin

Leo Witkowski, president of the Texas Wheat Producers Association, said that preliminary results Friday from the referendum canvassing committee indicate that the wheat referendum held May 11 had carried with 67.1 percent of those producers voting on the proposition favoring it.

THIS NOW provides for producer self-assessment of not more than five mills per bushel for research and market development.

He also said that nine producers had been elected to a board charged with the administration of the new program. Those elected, according to preliminary results, were Kenneth Kendrick of Stratford, C. L. Edwards of Panhandle, Delbert Timmons of Perryton, Leo Witkowski of Hereford, N. F. Renner of Spearman, John Cogdell of Crowell, Dwight Hamilton of Olney, Otis Harman of Tulia, and W. R. Moore Jr. of Munday.

The wheat producers now join the producers of peanuts, turkeys, grain sorghum and soybeans in having approved self-promotion of their commodities in an effort to strengthen farmer income under authority granted by the 61st Texas Legislature in HB 764.

"The Protestant Hour" religious radio program is now being broadcast by Radio Station KDHN, Dimmitt.

BROADCAST time is each Sunday morning at 8:35 to 9:05.

"The Protestant Hour" is a year-round series of religious programs featuring sermons by outstanding ministers and music by church, college and professional groups. The program is developed by four cooperating denominations: the Lutheran Church in America, the Presbyterian Church, US, the Fourth Province of the Protestant Episcopal Church, and The United Methodist Church. Each denomination produces segments of the program in series running 13 weeks.

More than 550 radio stations

## 'Stamps still a bargain'

Although the postage rates have increased from six cents to eight cents for a first-class letter, and from five to six cents for a postcard, Postmaster John Wood reminded local citizens this week that the new rates will still be cheaper than postage rates were 125 years ago.

IN 1847, after the first general issuance of postage stamps, the regular non-local postage rate was five cents per half ounce for mail traveling less than 300 miles, and 10 cents per half ounce for greater distances. By comparison, the new first-class postage rates are still 20 percent cheaper than before the Civil War.

"However, when one turns to

more recent history, first-class postage has always been one of the best buys for the money," according to Wood.

"For example," he said, "the cost of mailing a first-class letter in 1932 was only three cents. When the new rate is effective, it will mean that first-class postage has increased 166 percent. Yet if postal prices had risen at the same rate as retail prices, it would cost about nine cents today to mail a first class letter."

"DESPITE the great distances many letters must travel in the United States, our postal rates are still lower than in most other major countries."

Labor statistics show that the average American worker earns the price of an eight-cent stamp in 1.4 minutes, while the average West German works 3.1 minutes to earn letter postage. The British worker must put in 3.7 minutes to cover first class postage, and the French worker 6.4 minutes.

Considering the history of postal rates and the statistics surrounding the increase of postage, Wood is convinced that first class postage continues to be one of the best and most economical services in America today.

WOOD explained that the new increases—authorized on a temporary basis until the newly created Postal Rate Commission can make recommendations to the Governors of the Postal Service on permanent changes—also raised airmail letter rates from 10 to 11 cents an ounce, and airmail post cards from eight to nine cents each.

The increases will be borne more by business than by individuals, the postmaster pointed out, since about 75 percent of first class and airmail is from commercial mailers.

SECOND and third class have also gone up. However, the full increases proposed by the Post-

al Service will not be put into effect on a temporary basis, in second and third class, since the postal reform legislation contemplates that such increases be phased over five years—or 10 years for nonprofit organizations—provided Congress appropriates the necessary funds to ease the transition to full rates.

Because of the phasing provision, the increases for second and third-class are generally only one-fifth of the total increase which has been proposed by the Postal Service.

No changes are made in the rates for parcel post, which is the principal component of fourth-class mail. However, initial increases have been made in the "book rate" which is classified as fourth class.

### Canadian man earns SBA's state award

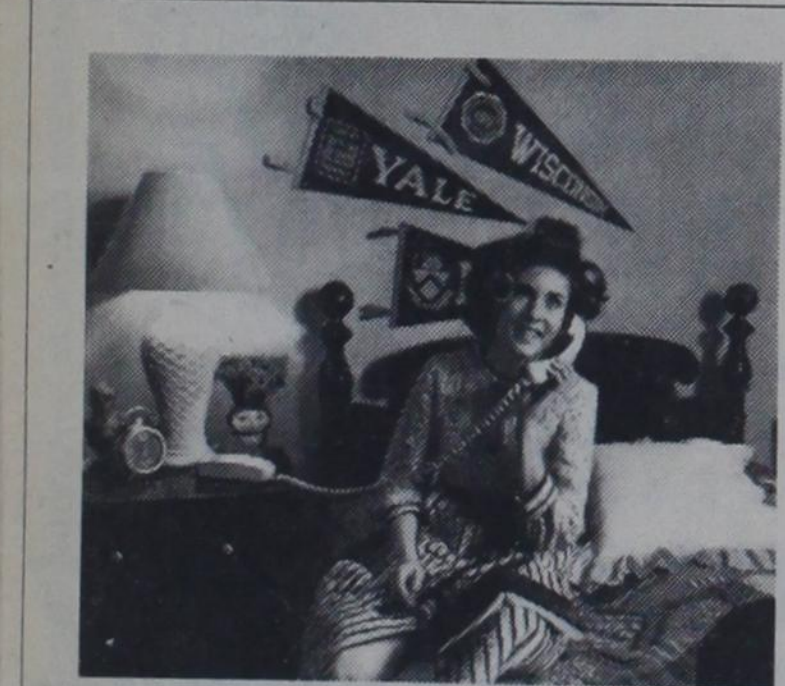

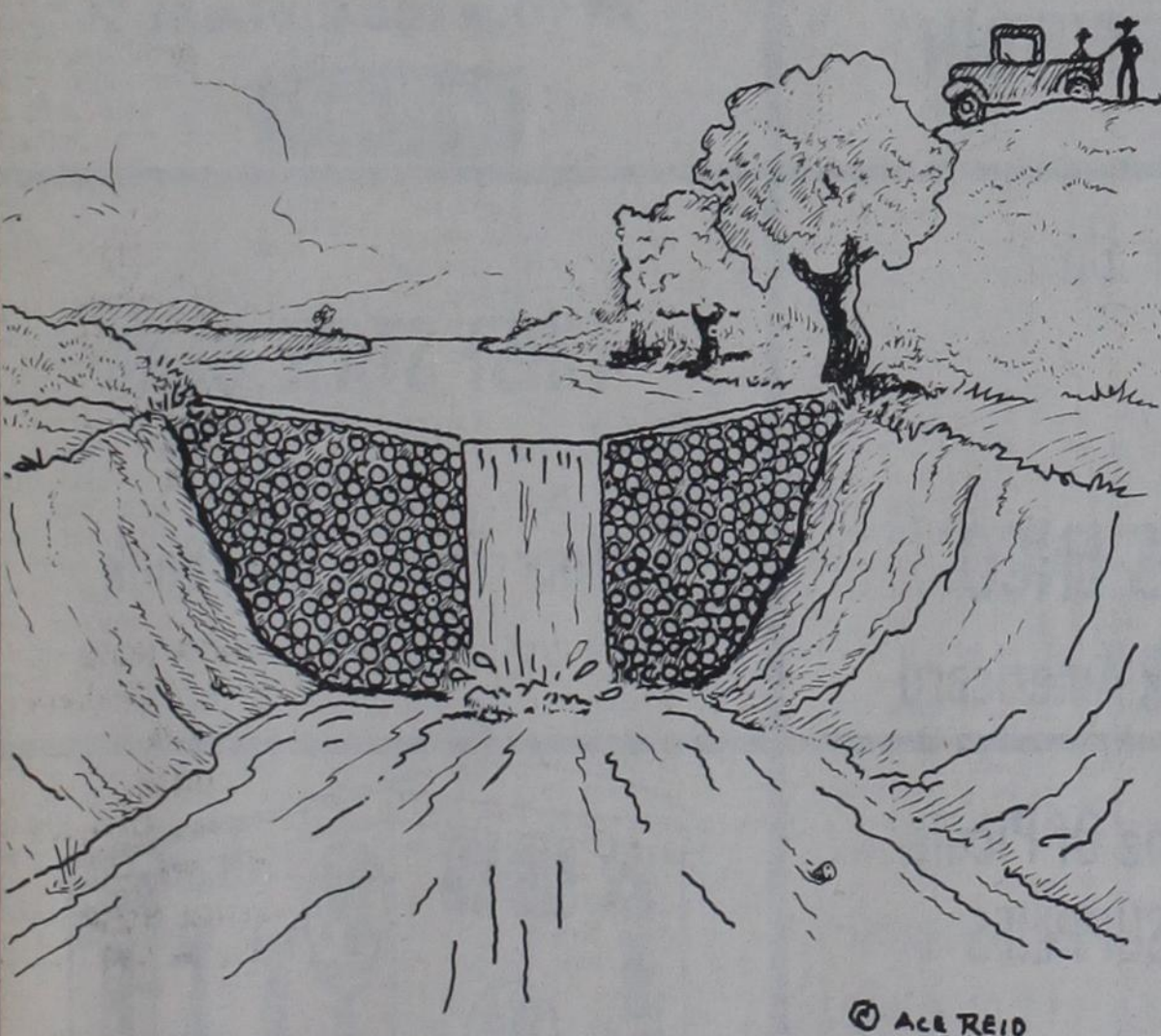

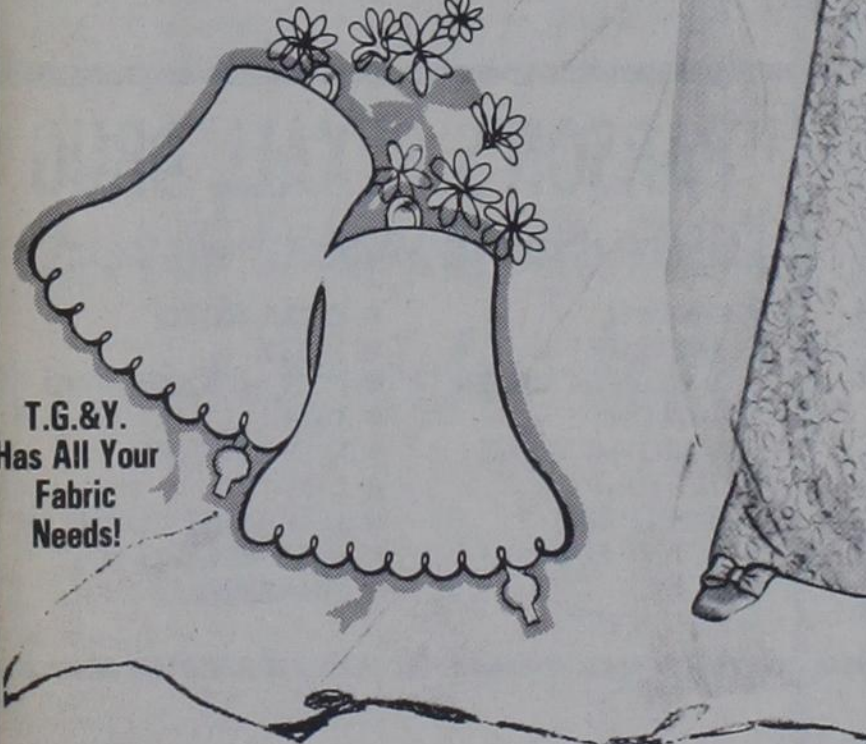

## Sports Afield

Remington has just come out with a brand-new cartridge with all sorts of possibilities—the .17 Remington that pushes ultra-small bullets along at a fantastic 4000 fps plus.

Although it may seem surprising, .17-caliber cartridges have been around for quite some time—at least 25 years, according to Pete Brown, Shooting Editor of SPORTS AFIELD. Wildcatters such as C. S. Landis and P. O. Ackley came up with some very potent cartridges, pushing bullets of about 25 grains at velocities that were often above 4000 fps. Two years ago, Harrington & Richardson introduced an Ultra-Varmint bolt-action, a handsome little rifle chambered for the wildcat .17/223. I handled for one of them and got excellent results.

This is a far cry from the early days of the .17 wildcats when barrel-making techniques would not produce as great uniformity (and hence, accuracy) as in the larger diameter. Now, the situation has changed, and standard Remington 700 BDL rifles in .17 produced half-minute groups and better.

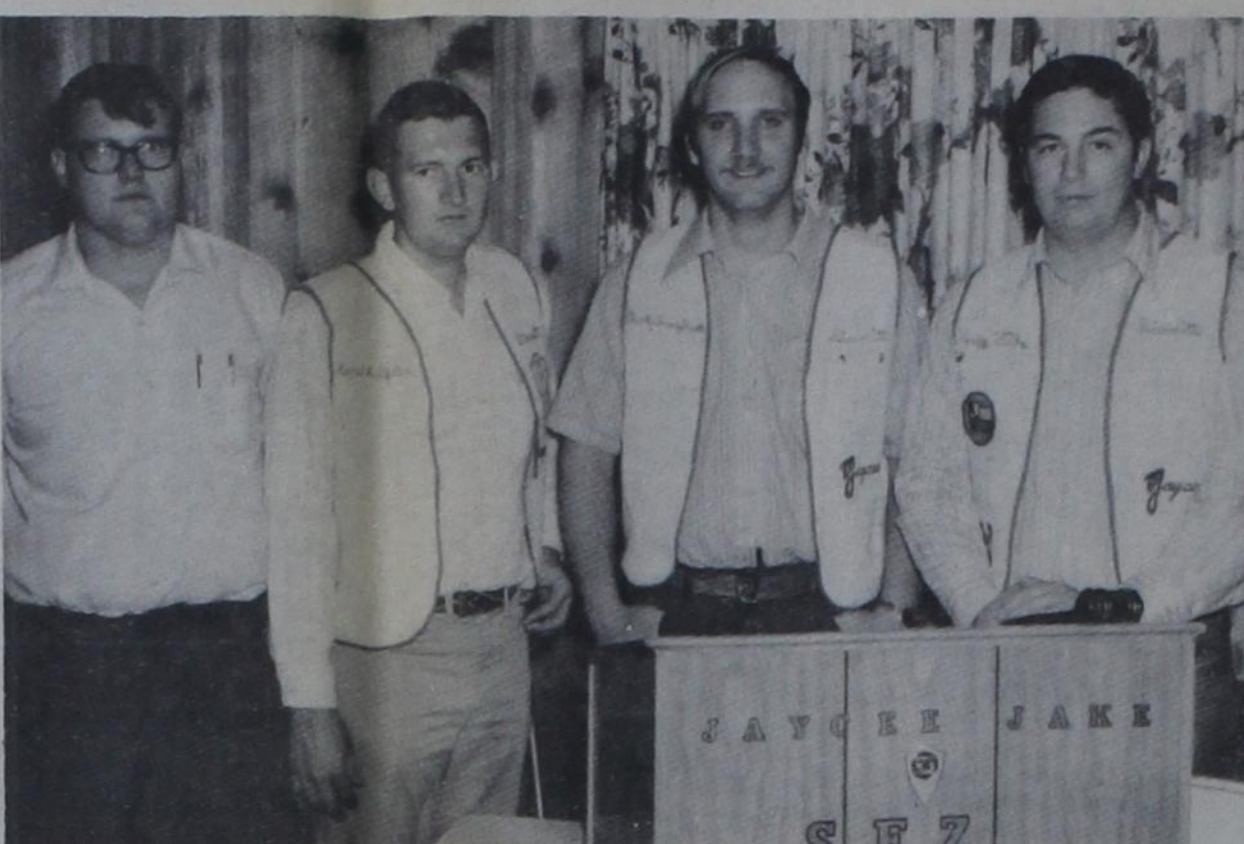
