

# Nine Jap Ships Sunk In Running Battle

### FIGHT STILL RAGING; YANKS LAND ON SAMAR, CLOSE TO LUZON

The American Third and Seventh fleets have sunk or damaged at least 30 Japanese warships, including ten battleships and 3 aircraft carriers, in the Philippines since the start of the war, it was announced today.

Our ships and aircraft were still attacking and pursuing the enemy, and it was likely that the final total would be still greater than the 29 enemy warships already known to have been sunk, 3 probably sunk and 18 damaged.

Our losses—the aircraft carrier Princeton, several destroyers and escort carriers damaged and several P-T boats sunk or damaged.

American troops have landed on Samar and seized the southern coast of the island, last barrier in the Philippines before Luzon, while other forces extended their gains on Leyte to bring 31 towns and villages and 6 airfields under U. S. control, Gen. Douglas MacArthur announced today.

American troops have driven ten miles inland to capture Burauen, splitting the Jap forces on northern Leyte. Appreciable gains were scored on the other island fronts.

The invasion of Samar was carried out by the first dismounted cavalry, which made an amphibious drive up the east coast of Leyte and crossed narrow San Juanico Strait to land on the Philippines third largest island.

More than 50,000 Germans were on the run in a general retreat along a 100-mile front in southwest Holland today before British and Canadian armies closing swiftly against every major stronghold in a shrinking pocket below the lower Maas river.

Only at 8 Hertogenbosch were the Nazis making a fight of it, trying desperately to hold open the only practical escape channels.

The Soviet Arctic offensive today was driving the remnants of the German Lapland army back across the Norwegian barrens where it faced a bitter winter with virtually all Nazi supplies of its lost Kirkenes base in Russian hands.

Moscow reports from East Prussia say Red forces have penetrated the outer defenses of Insterberg and are preparing to assault the city itself.

Soviet forces in Poland were revealed to have reopened a flanking drive northwest of Warsaw.

### New Army Policy Announced Today By Henry Stimson

WASHINGTON (UP)—Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson today announced a new army policy whereby the remaining son in any family which has lost two or more boys in the war will be kept out of combat service.

He said this was an extension of the army's policy of providing relief from active duty or discharging those who have suffered extreme hardship arising from family circumstances.

### HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS AID NUT HARVEST

Under the direction of R. B. Thomas, Jr., vocational agriculture teacher at Ranger High school, students of the school are being enlisted to aid farmers in harvesting their peanut crop.

Students who wish to join in the work of peanut shelling are being registered with A. W. Warford, principal of the high school and H. J. Baskin, dean of Ranger Junior College. Before they are permitted to leave the school they must be assigned to some specific farmer and his work. Farmers are urged to call early for the students so they may be carefully checked by those in charge of the program.

It was stated today that the program will last through next Wednesday and parents of students are urged to cooperate in cases where their sons wish to join the work. The students will be counted absent from their grades but their grades will not be affected by the absence except in the examinations in cases where the students do not keep up with their work outside of class.

### Old Deed To Port Arthur Gives Official Jitters

PORT ARTHUR, Tex. (UP)—County Clerk Fred G. Hill was interested when he received from Washington a photostatic copy of a certificate of ownership of five lots that was dated 1856—40 years before the present town of Port Arthur was even dreamed of.

He was profoundly disturbed when he discovered that the location of these lots was in the middle of the most expensive business property in town.

Besides this, he estimated that the certificate gave its owner the right to half the riparian rights of the ship channel.

A search through old records showed that lots had been sold for a townsite where Port Arthur now stands by the holder of a Mexican land grant in the early days of Texas.

Most of the deeds had been turned back to the holder, but Hill felt sure that this was one of the originals.

However, he found that since the old townsite had never been recorded in official records and since it had soon died out, the deed had no legal validity.

Hill pointed out that the owner of the certificate still has a priceless possession—a share in the early traditions of Port Arthur.

### Hull Praises FDR's Ability In Foreign Affairs

WASHINGTON (UP)—Secretary of State Cordell Hull, in a statement praising President Roosevelt's leadership in foreign affairs, said today that he was a statesman "equipped by nature and by experience" as few statesmen have been equipped in the nation's history.

His statement did not mention directly the forthcoming presidential election but it obviously was an endorsement of Mr. Roosevelt's bid for a fourth term.

### Aunt Of King George VI Dies

LONDON (UP)—Princess Beatrice, 87, youngest and last surviving child of Queen Victoria and great aunt of King George VI, died today, severing one of Britain's few remaining links with the Victorian era.

### JAP COLUMN BLASTED

CHUNGKING, (UP)—Chinese troops have annihilated a Japanese column at Sungiangkong, 22 miles northwest of threatened Kweilin, in what military spokesmen described today as a "major victory" in defense of the Kwangsi capital.

### Women Prisoners Share In Many War Activities

CHICAGO, (UP)—The almost forgotten part of the nation's feminine population—6,230 women imprisoned for felonies and misdemeanors and 4,520 girl delinquents—has accepted a part of almost every war activity engaged in by American women, according to the Central Howard association which devotes itself to post-prison rehabilitation of women.

These women are buying war stamps, giving their blood, knitting sweaters, serving as nurse's aides, learning new trades, and operating machines in prison shops.

The report, compiled from answers by heads of 13 women's institutions, nine girls' training schools and six other institutions, shows the female prisoners have purchased over \$31,000 in war stamps and bonds and have helped to sell thousands more.

A special few (13 Wacs, five Waves and two cadet nurses) have won admission to the active services following their release from prison. Others spend time in prison gardens raising and canning vital food supplies, sew for the Red Cross, write letters to men in service, stage operettas and other performances to stimulate war bond sales and some trustees even work outside prison walls in vital war industry.

### Archbishop Of Canterbury Dies Suddenly Thurs.

LONDON (UP)—Dr. William Temple, 96th archbishop of Canterbury and Primate of Church of England, died suddenly this morning after a heart attack.

The 63 year old prelate was ordered to bed a month ago when he was suffering from the gout, but there had been no indication that his illness had taken a serious turn until today when his sudden death was announced.

### PATTON'S ARMY NEARING METZ, FORTRESS CITY

Recent word received by Mr. and Mrs. George D. Nicholson is to the effect that their son-in-law Sgt. Buford Waggoner, is now in action with a B-17 Bomber crew somewhere in the European theater of war. He is ball turret gunner and cameraman on the bomber.

Sgt. Waggoner who entered the service around August 1 and in a letter received from him October 11 he stated that he had completed 8 missions over enemy territory including one mission over Cologne. He stated that on a reconnaissance of the United States Air Forces on January 10, 1944 was sent to foreign service around August 1 and in a letter received from him October eleventh he stated that he had completed one mission he was thoroughly enjoying the beauty of the country over which they were flying until the flak started hitting their ship. When they returned to base they discovered that their ship had been rather heavily hit.

Funeral services will be held at the Ranger Methodist church Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock with Rev. A. B. English, Rev. H. B. Johnson and Dr. W. H. Clark in charge of the services. Burial will be in the Evergreen cemetery.

Besides his wife and son he is survived by a brother, J. T. Long of Odessa and a sister, Mrs. V. E. Miller of Alpine and the following brothers-in-law and sisters-in-law, Melvin Outlaw, of Dallas, Rex Outlaw of Evansville, Indiana, George W. Outlaw of Sweetwater, Mrs. Etta Outlaw of White Deer, George Cunningham of Abilene, and Mrs. R. B. Stroud of Ft. Worth.

### CPL. RUTLEDGE MISSING SINCE OCTOBER 8TH

Mrs. Dayton Rutledge of Ranger was notified by the War Department Thursday morning that her husband, Cpl. Dayton Rutledge, has been missing in action in Germany since October 8.

Cpl. Rutledge was with the First Army in the Third Armored Engineers and was among the first to enter Germany. His latest letter to Mrs. Rutledge was written October 22 and was received by her October 27.

He entered the service in May 1941 and was trained at Ft. Sam Houston, Ft. Leonard Wood, Mo., Camp Polk, La., Camp Pickett, Va. and Indiantown Gap, Pa. Before going into service he was employed by an Austin engraving company. He is a graduate of Austin high school, and attended the University of Texas and the Art Institute of Pittsburgh.

Shortly before he left for overseas duty September 1, 1943, he was married to the former Miss Lorene Hatrell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Harrell of Ranger, with whom she is making her home while her husband is in service. Mrs. Rutledge has been employed by the Southwestern Peanut Growers Association at Gorman for several years.

### Appeal For Eggs Leads To Over Supply In U. S.

DALLAS, Tex. (UP)—Four hundred and 42 eggs for each and every individual in the United States "is just too many eggs for any requirement," says William Dewey Tormohlen, assistant chief of the War Food Administration dairy and poultry branch.

The surplus of eggs is the result of an appeal to the nation two years ago for more laying hens. In 1942, there were only 140 eggs for every person in the country. Now the best thing the patriotic farmers can do for Uncle Sam, according to Tormohlen, is to cut down their flocks of hens by 15 per cent.

Tormohlen conferred with egg and poultry industry leaders in Dallas to see whether they could do anything about the situation in Texas.

To Win Dewey Must Carry Two States' 82 Electoral New York and Pennsylvania Could Swing the Election

WASHINGTON—Twin battlegrounds—both of which he must carry to defeat President Roosevelt's fourth term ambitions and gain the White House for himself and the Republican party—yawn before Gov. Thomas E. Dewey.

These vital scenes of political combat of the giants are the great states of New York and Pennsylvania with their 47 and 25 electoral votes, respectively.

The Republicans have expressed belief, some of them on the record, that the New York governor, gaining in stature, must carry both of these states or go down to a trouncing at the polls.

Demas' Hopes Are High But the Democrats regard Mr. Roosevelt's chances as much better in Pennsylvania, and they are hopeful of New York, although the polls give Dewey an edge in the Empire State.

The Democrats, too, concede in private mainly that Dewey "would be in" if they can carry both states along with his certain top-heavy majority from the populous and anti-New Deal middle west.

Republican hopes in New York state are more than hopes—the GOP expects to come down into Manhattan and the boroughs with a 500,000 to 750,000 majority to offset a sure thing Democratic majority in New York City.

In Pennsylvania the Republicans are counting on the possibility of the commonwealth's return to the status of a GOP stronghold by the aid of an anti-Roosevelt United Mine Workers vote and the farm vote. Yes, Republicans are hopeful and the Democrats anything but cocky.

Hence, most political experts expect to see the presidential election fought out on the two battlegrounds—New York and Pennsylvania.

WITH THE REST OF THE WORLD, including the major political parties, embroiled in strife of various degrees, a legion of American duck hunters also are out gunning—this time against the interior department.

They're ready to fight over the San Joaquin river marshes in California, which annually attract some 200,000 marksmen from throughout the country in peace-time. The marshes, 106,500-acre summer home of countless wild ducks, are threatened by drought unless they are given enough water from the Friant dam project.

Representative Bertrand W. Gearhart (R.) of California has become a spokesman for the army of duck hunters in skirmishes with the interior department's bureau of reclamation. He says:

"The required 70,000 acre feet (of water) is merely a fraction of the San Joaquin flow (required to feed the marshes) but reclamation bureau officials seem reluctant to guarantee it until they have completed all other water commitments attending the Friant dam project.

"I am determined they shall decide on other commitments until the rights of the sportsmen and dairy farmers are satisfied."

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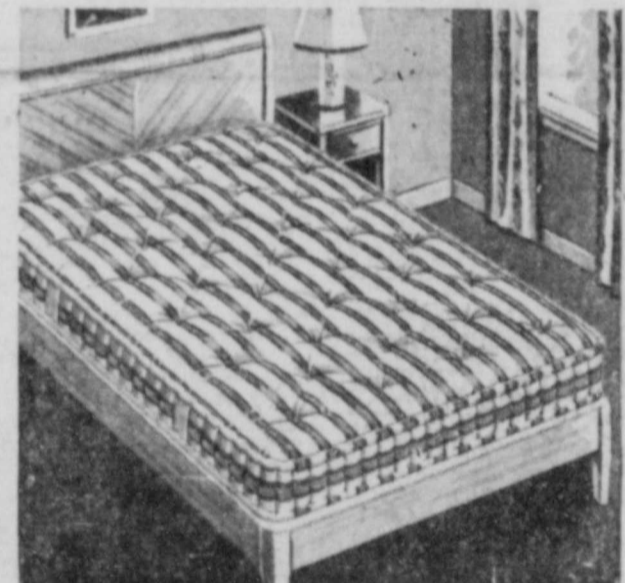
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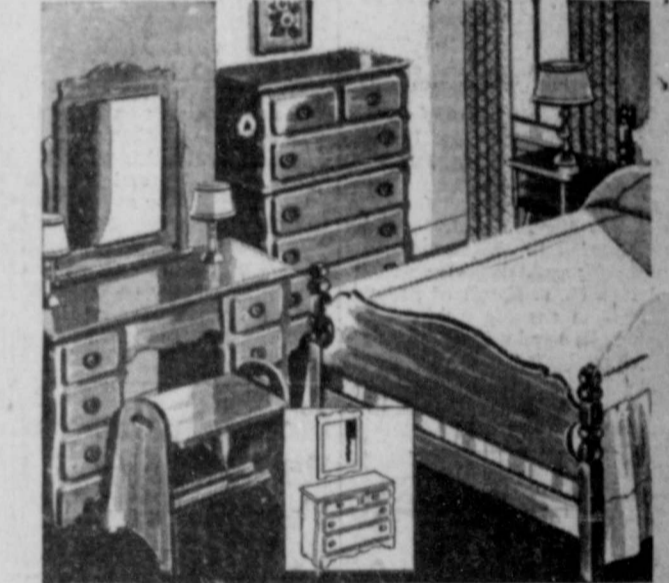

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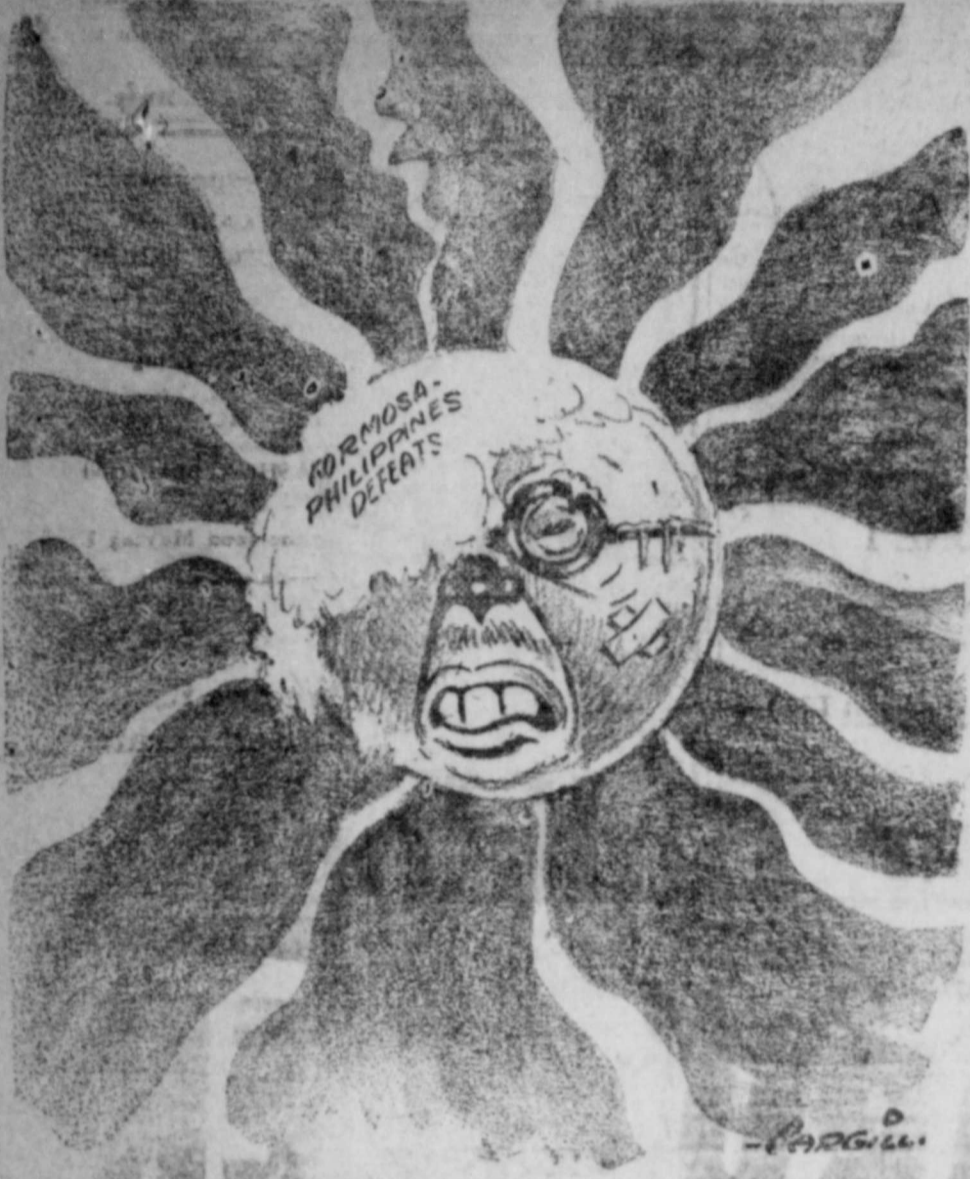

### Council To Aid Libraries In Europe, Asia

NEW YORK (UP)—The Libraries of Europe and Asia, many of them destroyed or damaged

and most of them suffering the loss of irreplaceable book collections, can look to America today for aid along the road back to the days of packed shelves.

The Council of National Library Assns., representing United States and Canada, has established a joint committee to supply books to depleted libraries in the war areas.

Historic collections in many foreign university, city and state libraries fell to fire or plunder. None of the war area libraries has had an opportunity to add to working collections.

The national council plans to coordinate all efforts to restore war damaged libraries. Milton E. Lord, director of the Boston public library, directed a canvass this summer of the needs and possibilities of library rehabilitation.

Systematic plans for the purchase, handling and assignment of American book collections will be

discussed by the joint committee and national groups interested in the project. Learned societies, professional technical organizations and government agencies will be asked to participate.

England has taken the lead in restoring war-struck libraries by collecting books to restock her own and supply those in European territories.

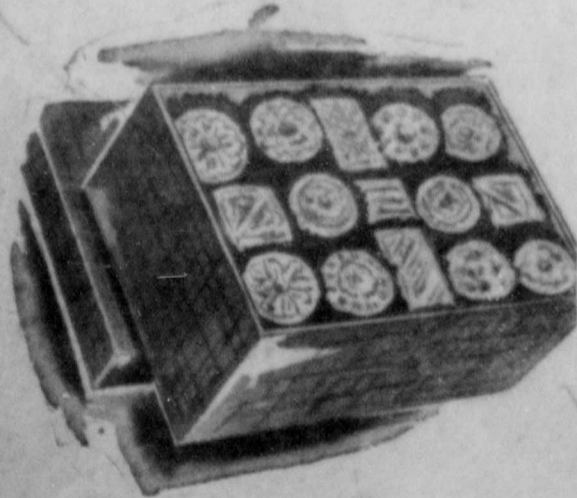

## War-Developed Lamps Seen In Postwar Use

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (UP)—Engineers working under wartime pressure have developed many new types of electric lamps adaptable to a host of peace time requirements. Samuel G. Hibben, director of applied lighting for the Westinghouse Lamp Division, said when he explained how three of the new lamps functioned.

"The light sources of tomorrow are born and are flexible enough to readily occupy a place in this swiftly-changing world," Hibben said.

The infra-red lamp was de-

veloped as one of 15 lamps in the postwar pattern of lamps as it is designed to produce radiant heat instead of light. The lamp is similar to incandescent lamps except that it produces mostly invisible rays.

"The infrared lamp developed for industrial drying in wartime," Hibben continued, "will be a valuable practicing tool both as a source of 'spot' comfort heating in the home and as an inexpensive and speedy dryer in the home and industry."

Developed for use in shipyards where welding sparks would shatter ordinary lamps, the shock-proof lamps will give as a heavy duty lamp for protecting around in the cargo or basement workshop, he said. For it contains a special filament, resistant to shock and its bulb is encased in a protective Insuper jacket.

The third type of lamp explained by Hibben was an ultraviolet bactericidal lamp called the Sterilamp. Invisible ultraviolet rays produced by this lamp quickly kill air-borne and surface bacteria and other disease micro-organisms. The dull blue glow in this lamp is a byproduct of its essential output in the bactericidal wave band of the ultraviolet spectrum.

Sterilamps are prominent now in guarding the health of servicemen and civilians in many fields where the destruction of bacteria, viruses and mold is important, and Hibben predicted the postwar installation of Sterilamps in many

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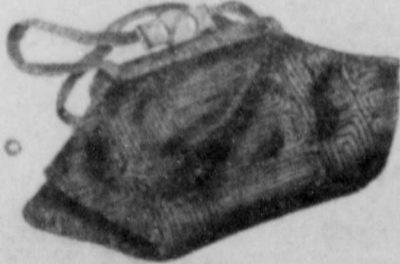
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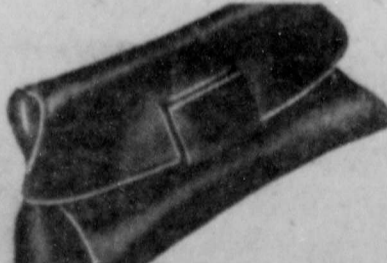
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
