WASHINGTON COLUMN

STORIES that a Hollywood make-up artist from the Walter Wanger studios had been brought on to Washington to work on the President's face before his public appearances in the closing weeks of the campaign are definitely bunk. The whispering campaign that people sitting close to the President have detected a thin film of powder on his face has started the rumor.

There has, however, been a Hollywood expert around the White House in the last few weeks advising on lighting effects for the President's pictures. He is none other than Harold (Hal) Rosson, head cameraman for Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer.

Rosson just happened to be in the east shooting sequences for "Week-end at the Waldorf," which is to be a kind of American Grand Hotel, only better, of course. He ran into a number of newswomen and they immediately began filing him in as one of their standing Washington gripes—the terrible conditions under which they had to work in making pictures of the President at the White House—portable floodlights, etc.

RECENTLY the newsreels have been catching a lot of criticism from theater managers and patrons for the bad pictures of the President which have been showing up on the screens, beginning with those horrible pictures taken on the presidential special train in San Diego last June.

Rosson therefore stepped into this situation and offered his services in advising on proper lighting equipment to use in the White House and in getting a proper place in which the cameramen could work.

After several huddles with White House Secretary Steve Early, the thing was worked out. One room was set aside as a kind of movie studio, and some modern, incandescent lighting equipment such as the Hollywood studios regularly use on interior sets was brought in as a permanent fixture to replace the old floodlights.

The new White House equipment, by the way, will probably be left there for Mr. Dewey to use, when, as, and if he moves in.

THE President is of course fully conscious that "one picture is worth 10,000 words," but Governor Dewey is no less so, and both he and Mrs. Dewey have gone out of their way to be kind to cameramen.

The governor won't pose for any trick pictures, but he will pose for any amount needed to cover a story. The governor understands that when two cameramen shoot at practically the same time, one of the men will get a blink. Whenever that happens, Dewey always calls on the cameraman who got the closed eyes shot to shoot again.

Dewey never shows himself much on the way to a major speaking engagement, sticking to his car for work on his address. But he makes up for it coming back, by visiting every car and stopping to chat with everyone. At stops, he always looks around to make sure all the cameramen are present, and if one is missing, asks why Frank or Mike isn't there. When told they've had to rush off on an early Telephoto, he makes sure they're covered by one of the others.
