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Gallons and Gallons of Rain at Last!

Rain pelted Castro County this week, clothes-damper fashion, in the most energetic and scattered display of the year. When the sky cleared Wednesday, an official .55 of an inch had soaked into Castro County soil and more rain was termed "probable."

Edwin "Goose" Ramey, US Weather Bureau analyst for Castro County, said this week's rain brought the total thus far this year to 3.28 inches, still two to three inches below "normal."

The week's rains, however, defied tabulation as some parts of the county went dry while as much as 3.5 inches soaked other sections, indicating the inconsistency of the weather activity.

Light rains over Castro County came Saturday night, when thunderclouds literally rolled across the High Plains, releasing tremendous amounts of electrical energy but little moisture. Enough energy to run every irrigation well in the county for several years was released in a violent electrical storm early Monday, as lightning knocked out a transformer near the Gene Vye home in Dimmitt and touched ground at several other points.

It was during this storm that a farmer near Lubbock was killed by lightning while on his tractor. The rain began in Dimmitt at 1:45 a.m. Monday as water dropped first in mild sheets, then in a steady downpour from dark, dipping clouds. Winds of 30 to 40 miles per hour accompanied the rain, causing bursts of thunder to "roll" a half mile or more. The sound brought lights to many of the county's windows; it was not unlike that of a Texas tornado.

The clouds and activity rumbled on to the northeast about 4 a.m., however, after releasing an official .37 of an inch of moisture.

This storm dropped what were apparently the heaviest rains in the county when it reached Frio. Floyd Cole of Frio reported an

approximate two inches, while Mrs. Annie Springer recorded 2.75 inches. These local rains almost equaled the total since January for some parts of the county.

Ray Riley, whose farm is between Hart and Sunnyside, recorded 1.72 inches Monday. The general report from Hart, by O. D. Dinwiddie, was an approximate .80 of an inch Saturday, .22 of an inch Monday, and 1.50 inches Tuesday, with a sprinkle from heavy clouds Wednesday afternoon.

Philip Jones of Hart is reported to have lost part of his turkey flock in a heavy local rain of near flash flood proportions.

Rains at Nazareth followed the general trend, widely scattered, heavy here, light there. Heaviest rain in the Nazareth area was near the Ray Schulte farm, where an estimated 2.5 inches fell.

Leonard Gerber of Nazareth reported that area to have received an approximate 1.5 inches in all, with the showers being local in nature. The rain apparently helped the wheat there, he said, since most Nazareth farmers have not

yet begun combining. Jumbo was close to the official tabulations, having received .80 of an inch since Saturday, with approximately three inches for the year. M. L. Simpson of Jumbo said the rains continued their haphazard ways as they passed over northeast Castro County, dropping both heavy and light local showers.

In the Bethel community in western Castro County, widespread light rains were recorded. This area of the county was apparently the only one to receive a rain Monday evening. The rain was like most others this week—high winds, dark clouds, and relatively little moisture—and covered an area approximately cornered by the Fred Bruegel farm, the Flagg Gin, the Andy Behrens farm, and the George Bagwell farm, which reported .17 of an inch.

The Sunnyside picture also was one of local rains getting heavier near the extreme southern part of the county, and about three inches overall for the week. Sam Gilbreath, who delivered the county's first load of wheat, said that the rains only held up wheat harvest a few days and that the cotton got a good boost from the moisture, being "way ahead of the cotton around there this time last year."

And that seemed to be the general opinion; the wheat wasn't hurt, and the cotton was helped.

Maintenance Building Will End First Work Stage at Park

Dimmitt Lumber Company Wednesday won in bidding on a new park maintenance building as another step in the park-building series was taken.

The low bid was for \$2,318, and according to city manager E. E. Noble, is just about at builder's cost. "Page Construction Co. has been doing our dirt moving at about their cost," he said, "and Hays Implement Company has donated several pieces of machinery to the work."

Of concrete tile construction, the new park building will consist of a 10 x 20 store room, two 8 x 10 restrooms, and a 32 x 20-foot shelter in the center. An outdoor stage is expected to be added to the west side of the building later. Construction will begin immediately and is expected to be finished about the first of July.

At present work on the underground sprinkler system is in progress.

Facilities proposed to be included in the new park will be a court, a volleyball court, putting two tennis courts, a basketball greens, a rose garden, horseshoe

throwing space, a picnic area, a soccer court, shuffleboard court, wading pool, croquet court, softball field, school-age playground, and kindergarten playground.

Grass planting over the entire area in South Dimmitt will begin about the first of July according to the city manager. It is expected the grass will be in good shape next spring.

Trees will be planted in the spring. Among those listed are locusts, elms, sycamores, green ash, hackberry, black walnuts, crabs, purple leaf plum, redbud, mimosa pines, spruce, juniper, cedar, firethorn, weeping forsythia, French lilac, wax leaf and jasmine. All of these varieties of trees are reportedly able to take root and grow in this country.

Anyone interested in viewing the new park plans can find a full-color drawing in the city hall.

Funds for the new park were obtained by a \$15,000 bond issue last summer. However it is expected this figure will not be adequate to carry out all the plans for the park. It is expected various clubs and civic organizations will be called on to help with part of the program. The money derived from the bond will take care of the heavier expenditures, but a method to continue the work this summer will have to be worked out according to park board members.

Mrs. W. S. Dixon Rites Thursday At Baptist Church

Funeral services are to be held at 3 p.m. Thursday (June 7) at the First Baptist Church for Mrs. Ellen Irene Dixon, 83, who died Tuesday at 9 a.m. in Castro County Hospital.

Mrs. Dixon was born in Millcreek, Texas on July 29, 1872. She was married on Oct. 10, 1888 to W. S. Dixon in Millcreek. Mr. Dixon preceded her in death on July 11, 1951. In January of 1952 Mr. and Mrs. Dixon moved to Castro County and settled on a farm about six miles south of Dimmitt where their son, Elmer, now resides. They lived on the farm until 1942 when he retired.

Mr. and Mrs. Dixon are survived by their son, Emmett O. of Hereford; Clarence W. of Frio, William Harvey of Big Lake; Elmer of Dimmitt; and Ollie of Canyon. They are also survived by thirteen grand children and twenty-five great-grandchildren.

Rev. Geo. Ray will officiate at the funeral and interment will be in Castro Memorial Gardens. Services are under direction of Dennis Funeral Home.

ASC to Begin Cotton Measure About June 25

Cotton measuring out of the Castro County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office is expected to begin on June 25. According to manager Doyle Thomas enough men will be employed to complete the work by August 1.

Producers who are overplanted will have 20 days from the date of the ASC notice to destroy excess cotton.

Thomas mentioned four points that would help expedite the measuring:

"When the reporter calls at your farm, go with him and point out the fields in cotton and those not in cotton. This is a joint responsibility and if you accompany the reporter, you will understand what has been done and there will be less chance for error."

"Go over the map with the reporter when he has completed the measurements and before you sign the report. Remember as will not determine the acreage in the field. He will only plot the lines on the map."

"Each farm will be measured in the order that we come to them. No exceptions will be made."

"In order for a reporter to take out turnrows, irrigation ditches, etc., through the middle of the field, the strip must be at least four rows wide. If the strip is around the outer edge, it must be at least 6.6 feet wide. When you receive your notice of measured acreage, if you think it is wrong, come by the office and go over it with us. If an error was made, it will be corrected."

Sam Gilbreath Delivers First 1956 Load of Wheat to Local Grain Elevator

"So far as I know," John E. McCleskey, elevator manager, said, "this is the earliest wheat on record for the county. If there was ever any delivered before June 1 of any year, we haven't heard about it here."

The wheat was raised on Gilbreath's farm one mile north and

a mile east of Sunnyside. It tested out at 15 per cent moisture and 60 pounds per bushel weight, and sold for \$2.00 per bushel.
