## Third Army Closer to German Border

### BULLDOGS WIN FROM CISCO BY 32-19 SCORE

In a thrilling game that at times was nip and tuck the Ranger Bulldogs defeated the Cisco Lobos in the annual November 11 football game by a score of 32 to 19. The game was played Saturday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the Bulldog stadium.

Cisco kicked to Ranger to open the game. Dally Woods took the ball and returned it 40 yards. In a fumble on Cisco's 30 yard line Cisco recovered. After three plays Ranger recovered Cisco's fumble and on the third line play Woods went over for the first touch down of the game but the team failed to score the extra point.

The second quarter opened with Ranger holding the ball on Cisco's 45 yard line and in the first play Woods gained 23 yards. In the next play Ranger fumbled the ball, Frankie Ford came through the line, picked it up and tossed a perfect pass to Pete Dawn who was already behind the goal line. They failed on the extra point and the score was then 12 to 0.

The next score of the game came in the second quarter when Ford passed 30 yards to Leonard Artterburn who went over for another touchdown and this time the extra point was scored.

Cisco took the ball the latter part of the first half and on line plays went over for a touchdown and scored the extra point, making the score 19 to 7 at the end of the first half. Tompkins of Cisco scored their first marker.

Ranger's first score of the second half came on another pass. Ford tossed to Dawn who was poised on the goal line and carried over. In the try for extra point it was carried over by Woods making Ranger's score 25.

The last touchdown for Ranger came in the third quarter when Woods again went over for six points. Johnson and Tompkins of Cisco got to work in the second and the result was two more touchdowns for Cisco but both times they failed to score the extra point. Tompkins took the ball on one line play and ran 80 yards for a touchdown with Bulldogs in touching distance but never close enough to pull him down.

Collectively and individually the Bulldogs turned out good game. Woods was again the high score man but Arterburn, Dawn and Ford showed fine football ability in the game Saturday, and added their share to the score. Bobbie Gray and Libburn Baker who were in again and out again, too many times to check them both played a good game of football.

### France Invited To Come Into 3 Power Commission

WASHINGTON, (UP)—The United States, Great Britain and the Soviet Union today invited Gen. Charles De Gaulle's provisional government of France to be a full member of the European advisory commission now formulating surrender terms for Germany and planning postwar treatment of that country.

Acting secretary of state Stettinius made the announcement for the United States.

"The government of the United States is happy to join in extending to the provisional government of the French Republic an invitation to full membership on the European advisory commission," Stettinius said.

### METHODIST MINISTER AND FAMILY ARRIVE

Rev. Wallace N. Dunson, recently appointed minister for the First Methodist church in Ranger, and his family have arrived to make their home in Ranger, and are temporarily living at the Paramount Hotel. They expect to be in the parsonage within the next ten days. Besides Rev. and Mrs. Dunson, a daughter, Virginia Kathryn, and a son, Wallace, will reside here.

Rev. Dunson who comes to the Ranger church after four years as minister of the First Methodist church in Clifton, will fill the pulpit of his new church at both services Sunday. In speaking of coming to Ranger, Rev. Dunson said, "We come to make our home in Ranger, become a part of the citizenship and make what contributions we can to the life of the city."

Prior to going to Clifton he held pastorates at the Broadway Church in Ft. Worth and for four years was minister of the church at Thurber. In fact he says he helped "bury that town."

He has worked extensively with young people, having served as dean of men in the conference of Young People's Assemblies at Georgetown. He has directed intermediate camps at Glen Lake at the Methodist camps at Lakewood.

For the past six years he has served as secretary of the Central Texas Methodist Conference board of missions and church extension and at the recent meeting of the conference in Ft. Worth was elected to this position for the next four years.

Part of his work is evangelistic as he holds several meetings during each year.

Aside from his work with the church Rev. Dunson takes an active part in civic activities and was serving as president of the Clifton Lions club at the time he received the appointment to the Ranger church.

### ARMISTICE DAY OBSERVED BY THREE NATIONS

American, British and France near the climax of their second great war against Germany in a quarter of a century, joined today in observance of the Armistice which ended hostilities of World War I on Nov. 11, 1918.

In Washington, Pres. Roosevelt watched as a wreath was placed on the tomb of America's unknown soldier in a brief and simple ceremony at Arlington Memorial Cemetery. He was accompanied by his high military advisers.

Prime Minister Winston Churchill and Gen. Charles De Gaulle, provisional president of France, attended similar ceremonies in Paris yesterday, but rigid security regulations held up the announcement of their arrival until today.

The Armistice celebration was more or less incidental to the visit of Churchill and Eden, who came to France for conferences with De Gaulle and other French officials.

### BIG FORCE OF B-29 SUPERS BLASTS JAPS

WASHINGTON (UP)—A large task force of B-29 Superfortresses today blasted "three targets of vital importance to the Japanese war machine."—Omura on the Japanese home island of Kyushu, and Shanghai and Nanking in Jap-occupied China.

The 3-way blow was announced by 20th Air Force headquarters here following Japanese broadcast reports of such action.

Anti aircraft fire and fighter opposition was meager at all 3 targets. On the basis of preliminary reports one U. S. aircraft is missing.

The Superforts flew from bases in China.

### TEXAS FURNISHING 93.6 PER CENT OF NATION'S OIL

DALLAS, Tex., Nov. 11—Texas is responding to the call for oil to win the war by furnishing 93.6 per cent of the national increase recorded this year in crude oil production, according to reports just released by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association.

The report shows that according to official figures of the United States Bureau of Mines, the national increase in crude oil production in the first eight months of this year over the corresponding period of last year amounted to 132,672,000 barrels. Texas' share of the national increase is shown to have amounted to 124,190,000 barrels, which represents 93.6 per cent of the total gain reported by all states.

### In England PROGRAM FOR G. I. JAMBOREE IS ANNOUNCED

Word has been received that he has arrived safely in England. Before entering the service he was a student at the University of Tex. He was inducted into the Army at Ft. Sam Houston and took his basic training at Camp Maxey, Paris, Texas. He was last sent to Texas Technological College at Lubbock for special training for five months before going overseas.

Pfc. Row was also first stationed at Camp Barkeley for a while.

### Korda Donates \$200,000 for U. S. Drama Comm.

LONDON (UP)—Sir Alexander Korda, British film producer, has offered Oxford University a sum of \$200,000 so that a commission can be sent to the United States to study and report on the organization and economy of American universities' drama department.

If Oxford accepts the donation and assignment, it is expected that the commission will leave England in March for six weeks tour. Close attention will be given by the English group to American methods of academic study of the history and science of film production as well as the drama.

### CITRUS DISEASE

McALLEN, Tex. (UP)—Plant pathologists are working hard to keep "sadness" out of the United States.

"Sadness" is the English translation of the Spanish word, "Tristeza," the name given to a devastating disease which has already ravaged citrus trees in South Africa, South America, and Java.

The disease is being studied by Prof. H. J. Webber of the California citrus experiment station at Riverside, Cal. Prof. Webber says that plant pathologists have found it impossible to discover the germ or virus from which the disease comes, and thus take effective methods to eradicate the cause.

W. F. Creager, chairman of the drive in Ranger, and B. E. Garner, manager of the Arcadia and Columbia theatres, are collaborating in making plans for the coming of the Jamboree, and today expressed their delight with the arrangements made by the committee for the Ranger show.

Col. Dutton has been active in civic affairs as well as having a virile business career. He was president of the Realty Board, Chamber of Commerce and Little Theatre in Baton Rouge. His wife is the former Mary Eleanor Creveling, of Baton Rouge, and they have one daughter, Mary Eleanor, aged eight months.

### BROTHER OF RANGER MAN IS PROMOTED

M. M. Dutton has received the following notice with reference to his brother's promotion in the United States Air Force:

BARKSDALE FIELD, La.—Barksdale Field's new commandant of troops is Lt. Col. Tom W. Dutton, former New Orleans and Baton Rouge business man and son of Mrs. J. F. Dutton, 615 Elm Street, Minden. It has been announced following sweeping administration reorganization of the Third Air Force base near Shreveport.

Col. Dutton, who was an All-American football player at LSU in 1913, will direct military administration for permanent party and trainee military personnel, and will have responsibility for the discipline of all troops, officers and enlisted men, in addition to supervising military formations and ceremonies.

One of the best figures in Louisiana, Col. Dutton was U. S. marshal at New Orleans from 1928 to 1934. Since 1936 he has been a member of two automotive firms in the state, the Dutton-Brown Motor company at Baton Rouge and the Clay-Dutton Motor company in New Orleans. He is a member of the Board of Supervisors of Louisiana State university.

He played center on the LSU team, which he captained for two years, and won recognition as the best player at that position in the country. He also was captain of the track team for two years and was a member of the rifle and tennis teams.

Dutton was in U. S. Naval Aviation at Boston, Mass., in World War I, and was given the rank of Lieutenant Commander in the U. S. Naval Reserve in 1932. He was in Naval Reserve Intelligence until 1942. On June 26, 1942, he went on active duty with the Army Air Corps and was sent to its combat intelligence school at Harrisburg, Pa. On August 1, 1942, he was assigned to the 319th Bomb Group at Harding Field, Baton Rouge, and twenty days later was transferred to the Intelligence Section of the 335th Bomb Group at Barksdale Field.

In May, 1943, he was assigned to 48th Wing Intelligence and on August 1 of that year was made executive officer of the 335th, where he remained until he was appointed commandant of troops for the base.

### Amateur Sleuth Rates Red Lights And Police Siren

DALLAS, Tex. (UP)—Some men collect stamps or butterflies, but W. O. Bankston collects law-breakers.

He is recognized by the Dallas police department as being the city's No. 1 amateur detective.

Bankston's car carries a police radio, red lights and a siren.

His most spectacular case came in July, 1941, when the capture of a man then listed as the nation's No. 2 bad man.

The American Third Army, after making general gains of up to 7 miles yesterday, pushed ahead toward the German border on each side of Metz today. Two tank columns southeast of Metz advanced to within 25 miles of the frontier bastion of Saarbrücken, while in the Konigsbacher area north of Metz the Americans widened and deepened their new bridgehead across the Moselle within 2 and one-half miles of the border.

On the eastern front Russian artillery maintained a bombardment of German positions in east Prussia preparation for a renewed offensive, while in Hungary Soviet forces advanced westward toward Budapest after cutting the main rail supply line between German troops in northeastern Hungary and those defending the capital.

British Eighth army troops in Italy pushed northwestward toward Bologna from newly captured Forli on the Rimini-Bologna highway.

The Germans sent an Armistice Day barrage of robot bombs against London and southern England, although censorship prevented disclosing whether any of the new V-2 rockets were included in the attack.

Strong formations of British and American heavy bombers, attacked German oil and railway targets in the Ruhr and Rhineland almost on the hour of the Armistice that ended the war 26 years ago. Objectives included Gelsenkirchen and Coblenz.

London and Washington announced that American and British submarines have sunk 51 more Japanese ships, including a light cruiser, in the Pacific and far eastern waters.

The battle of Leyte increased in intensity as the Japanese got additional reinforcements ashore through the American air and sea blockade. The new forces added and undisclosed number to the 35,000 which Gen. MacArthur had ready estimated were fighting the Americans. The fiercest action was in progress along the highway from Pinaucompan on the north coast to Ormoc, with the Japanese apparently attempting a shore-down battle for the Philippines.

### Miss Penn Named Football Queen For Year 1944

In fitting ceremonies at the intermission at Saturday's football game between Ranger and Cisco, Miss Dorothy Penn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Penn, was crowned football queen for the year 1944.

As the loud speaker announced the approach of the queen she was escorted to the field by Mace Oylor, co-captain of the Bulldogs. Before the pep squad section of the grandstand the two were met by Frankie Ford, other team captain, who presented Miss Penn with a large bouquet of yellow mums tied with red and white streamers the Bulldog colors.

The football queen is selected by the Bulldog squad annually and her identity is withheld until the November 11th game at which time she is made known and crowned.

The attractive 1944 queen is a member of the senior class and a favorite with her school mates.

"There is no greater tragedy in medicine," writes Dr. Margaret C. Tod, assistant director of the Holt Radium Institute, Manchester, "than the death of a young patient who had been in perfect health until a small pigmented mole was removed for cosmetic reasons."

## Texas Company Announces New Hospital Plan

A hospital and surgical benefits plan for employees of The Texas Company and domestic subsidiaries is now in effect throughout the United States, it was announced here today by M. J. McGuigan, District Superintendent. Already 547 eligible Texaco employees in this locality have become members of this plan, which went into effect November 1.

The plan, a voluntary one, provides benefits for hospital confinement or similar provisions. Benefits include payment at the rate of four dollars per day for each day the employee is confined in a hospital, up to 31 days for each period of disability; a surgeon's fee allowance which provides up to \$150.00 for some major operations and smaller amounts for lesser operations; and reimbursement up to \$20.00 for incidental hospital expenses such as operating room, x-rays, and tests. The plan costs the individual employee

50 cents a month. The company pays the balance.  
Benefits under the Texaco plan do not interfere with but are in addition to any other hospital and surgical benefits to which the employee may be entitled under any other insurance policy or because of membership in any association.  
Texaco's hospital and surgical benefits plan is in addition to the company's employe benefit plans covering accident and sickness, permanent total disability, and group life insurance and pensions, which have been in effect for the past several years.

## Frame House Is Headquarters For Vast Film Park

ROCHESTER, N. Y. (UP)—Nestled among 100 industrial buildings in Kodak Park's 400 acres, is a two story frame dwelling.  
Formerly the home of Frederick Rothenberger, it has been headquarters for Kodak Park's yard department for the past 33 years. From it instructions are issued to 500 employees who operate and maintain the plant's railroads and trucks, plant protection, landscaping, street sprinkling, snow and ice removal, roads, sewers, ice distribution, coal handling, laundry,



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wastepaper salvage, and a number of other duties, that keep the film industry in running order.  
"Park" is a city in itself. It operates buses with "stand-up seats"; three plant locomotives and 75 freight cars; railroad facilities connected with New York Central and the Baltimore & Ohio which move more than 600 cars a week; 100 pieces of automotive equipment including trucks, trailers, and an ambulance and two 25 ton cranes for unloading coal cars.

### Franz Werfel's "The Song of Bernadette", Scheduled For 2 Day Run At Arcadia Beginning Wednesday

One of the most colorful and dramatic films ever produced is scheduled to be at the Arcadia Theatre Wednesday and Thursday when 20th Century-Fox's "The Song of Bernadette" opens for a two day run. Werfel had been in America before, but had never seen Hollywood until he arrived early in 1941 after a dramatic flight from the Nazis, during which he found sanctuary for several weeks in Lourdes, France, and vowed, if he escaped to America, "to sing as best I could "The Song of Bernadette."
