Germans Fall Back From Luxembourg

RANGER QUOTA IN SIXTH LOAN \$146,242.50

Break Down of County Quota is Outlined by Cyrus Frost, Chairman.

(Editor's Note: Following is the break down of Eastland county's quota in the Sixth War Loan Drive as outlined by Cyrus B. Frost of Eastland, county war finance chairman.)

Dear Editor:

By now every reading or listening citizen in this county knows that the Treasury of the United States has started the 6th War Loan Drive to sell 14 billion dollars worth of securities during the months of November and December 1944. Eastland County's part of this quota is \$646,000, \$255,000 of which is to be secured through the sale of Series E Bonds. Here you may be interested in knowing that our quota for the months of June and July, 1944, for the Fifth War Loan Drive, was \$725,000, \$300,000 of which was allotted to Series E Bonds. During that drive Eastland County purchased over \$1,000,000 of securities, 404,000 of which was represented by the purchase of Series E Bonds. Here again it may be said that the County over-subscribed its Fourth, Third, Second and First War Loan Quotas and every monthly quota from Pearl Harbor up to and including the month of October. The amounts of each and all of the last mentioned quotas are not deemed important in this connection.

The chairmen of the respective communities of this County together with the bankers, met in Eastland on November 17, 1944, to discuss the amount and allocation of the Sixth War Loan quota and ways and means of putting the drive over with dispatch. It was the unanimous opinion of all present that the County can fully subscribe the quota and all agreed the finances of the citizens of the County are such as to cause no undue burden on the citizenship in fully subscribing the assigned quota.

The Texas and Pacific Railway Company subscribed \$50,000 to be allotted to the county as a whole on the Third, Fourth and Fifth War Loan Drives and your committee assumed that they would make a similar subscription to the Sixth War Loan Drive. Deducting the \$50,000 to be allotted to the Texas and Pacific Railway Company from the \$646,000 quota leaves \$596,000 which was broken down and assigned by your committee to the different communities in Eastland County as follows:

Germans Fall Back in Italy; Tito Reports The Capture of Albania's Principal Port By Albanian Partisans

The Germans fell back toward the Rhine from Luxembourg to above the Swiss border today as the French and Americans in the south flanked their positions in the Vosges mountains, while the American Third Army broke into the Maginot line beyond liberated Metz and advanced three miles into the Saar Basin.

In the north the Nazis fought hard on German soil but gave ground steadily before the relentless pressure of three Allied armies hammering towards Cologne and the Ruhr.

The Russians closed in on some 20 German divisions pocketed along the Baltic coast of Latvia, while Berlin reported Red Armies were massing around east Prussia and along the Vistula river for a great winter offensive. Soviet forces in Hungary battered through the Nazi flank extending 80 miles northeast of Budapest to Miskolc, which was almost surrounded.

Tokyo radio claimed today that Japanese forces pushing southward through Kwangsi province in China have achieved a junction with north-bound Japanese troops, thus attaining the long-sought bisecting of China.

WEATHERFORD RANGER GAME TO BE AT 2:15

Coach Don Martin stated that barring more injuries his men should be in better condition for the Weatherford game than they were for the Stephenville game and will stand a better chance to win the game.

Mrs. Neally had six grandsons and two great grandsons serving with the United States armed forces.

WASTE PAPER AND USED FATS DRIVE SUNDAY

The American Legion and B. O. Scouts of Ranger will join Sunday in a big waste paper and used fats drive and those who can aid in the drive are asked to be at the Legion hall at 1 p. m. Sunday. Trucks and pick ups will be needed for the drive and all who can contribute one for the drive are also urged to report to the Legion hall.

Companies have been contracted to take both the waste paper and the used fats and will be picked up by these companies just as soon as they are collected Sunday afternoon.

Paper and magazines should be tied in secure and separate bundles and placed at curb. Used fats should be placed in secure containers and placed beside the paper bundles.

More and more emphasis is being placed on the fact that both of these materials are essential for the war effort and practically every community in the country is making an effort to gather them. The agencies conducting the drive in Ranger have urged the cooperation of every citizen.

Proceeds from the drive will be turned over to the two Boy Scout troops in Ranger and will be used to carry on their work.

SAN ANTONIO AVIATION SAN ANTONIO AVIATION CADET CENTER, Tex. — At the San Antonio Aviation Cadet Center, potential pilots, bombardiers and navigators are receiving preflight training to prepare them for aerial instruction and duties as aircrew members in the Army Air Forces. Among those in the class is Ross Hodges, son of Dr. and Mrs. R. H. Hodges, Ranger.

The future fliers are subject to a rigorous 10-week program of instruction covering physical, academic and military training. At the cadet training center a unit of the AAF training command, they study maps and charts, aircraft study maps, charts and other subjects while being conditioned physically for the long training period ahead. Bombardiers, navigators and pilots receive the first five weeks of preflight instruction as a group, then are separated for specialized training.

Big Pecan Crop Estimated For Texas Growers

A great many inquiries have come in lately concerning pecans, says Myra Tankersley, county home demonstration agent. A big pecan crop estimate for Texas is 43 millions pounds—plenty for everybody.

It doesn't hurt the trees if the nuts are knocked off with cane poles if the twigs and branches are not damaged in the process. A canvas cover or wagon sheet spread over the ground before threshing is begun will enable those doing the harvesting to get pecans up more quickly.

Pecans are often harvested and placed in storage before the pecans are thoroughly dried. Heating and mulling of the meats may result. If pecans are harvested in large quantities and piled in bins, ample ventilation should be provided. It is better to keep the pecans in sacks for 10 to 15 days where air can circulate freely over and around them.

Pecans can be kept in storage for two or three years in good condition if properly handled. In freezer lockers shelled meats will keep satisfactorily for three years, place the shelled meats in tin cans or any other tight container and place in storage in December. Pecans in the shell may be placed in cold storage before any deterioration in the meat begins.

Do not delay putting in storage if best quality is to be maintained over a long period.

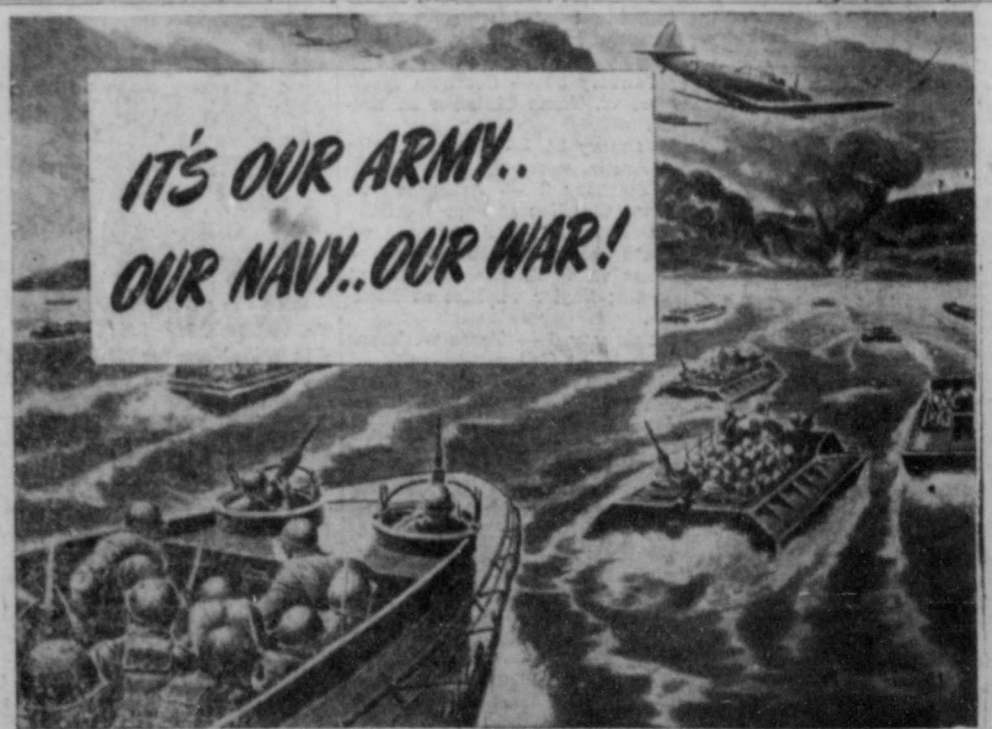

ies E, F, and G and Savings Notes of Series C of which settlement is made at the Federal Reserve Banks or branches, or at the Treasury Department between November 31, 1944, will be counted in the drive figures; none of the other issues will be credited to the Sixth War Loan Drive after December 16, 1944. Your banker or Postmaster will gladly discuss with you all the details concerning each issue and will furnish you a folder that you can take home with you fully discussing each and all of the eight securities offered.

Credit for sales of Series F and G Savings Bonds will be given to the address shown in the inscription on the bond. Sales of Series E Bonds will be credited to the location of the issuing agent except in the case of payroll employee purchases which, if properly handled by the employer, will give credit to the county in which the purchasing employee lives. Direct sales of Series E Bonds by Federal Reserve Bank will be credited to the address shown in the inscription on the bond.

All banks in Eastland County are really increasing daily their deposits in unheard of amounts. We should move to this task and finish the 6th War Loan Drive at the earliest possible date. The money is needed and needed now to supply additional war materials to the fighting fronts as stated to us just this week by the Commander in Chief of the Allies, General Eisenhower. Our boys are now fighting the Germans on a burning front of 300 miles from the lowlands of Holland to the purple Swiss Alps, and in many areas are now stabbing deep on German soil. In the Southwest Pacific they have invaded the Philippines and in Asia they are attacking the Japanese enemy from the land, sea and air. 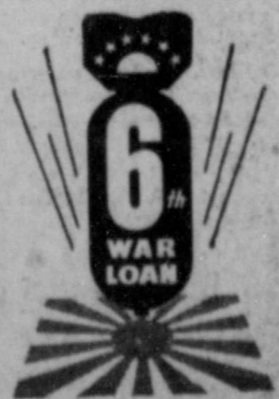

Suggestions For Raising Pullets Given By Agent

Laying flocks made up entirely of good healthy pullets are most likely to live and lay best, provided they are raised on clean ground and kept entirely away from older poultry.

Loma Faye Hearn, Assistant County Home Demonstration Agent, says that a well-managed, all pullet flock has many advantages.

For instance, a flock can readily be established by the purchase, early in the spring, of healthy, bred-to-lay chicks from a reliable hatchery. Serious diseases are less likely to affect pullets than mixed flocks of pullets and hens. . . . And pullets lay more eggs than hens of the same breeding. Poultry diseases and parasites usually spread from older poultry to younger stock by contact, or through droppings or equipment. Starting with a new flock each year largely offsets this danger. . . . Another advantage is that early hatched pullets will lay in the fall months when egg prices are relatively higher because at that time most hens are molting and laying very little. Partly for this reason the average pullets generally lay more eggs than a yearling or older hen of the same breeding.
