Mrs. B. H. Kleman Passed Away At Family Home, 4th

Mrs. B. H. Kleman passed away at her home in Nazareth, Texas, Friday morning, May 4, following an illness of six months at the age of 76 years.

Anna Stetschulte was born Oct. 19, 1858, at Glandorf, Ohio. She was united in marriage to Henry Helmer in 1881. Their union three children were born, of which Mrs. Ed Kleman of Nazareth survives. In 1889 her husband passed away and she married B. H. Kleman, which union three children were born: Mrs. J. B. Gurgemos of Arthur and Harry L. Kleman of Nazareth, Texas. All deceased.

In 1907 the family moved to Texas, on a farm near Nazareth, and in 1922 moved to their present home in the town of Nazareth.

Besides her husband and four children she is survived by five grandchildren: Mrs. Anna Maag of Glandorf, Ohio, Mrs. Carolina Wurth of Columbus Grove, Ohio, Mrs. Paulina Schulte of Wallock, Minnesota, Edward of Nazareth, Texas and Charles of California.

She also leaves to mourn her family three sisters and five brothers all residing in Ohio and forty grandchildren.

Mrs. Kleman was a devout Catholic and a member of the Christian Mothers' Society. She possessed a genial disposition, thereby making and keeping many friends. She enjoyed the company of her family and grandchildren. She was a mother in every sense of the word and with her husband and family made her home life beautiful.

Monday morning funeral services were held at the Holy Family Church, the attendance being large and the floral expressions of sympathy many and beautiful. Rev. Alphonse S. B. officiated at the mass at 9 o'clock and preached a very fitting funeral discourse, the contents of which, if pondered over would be of great help to all.

That effervescent (French word meaning effervescent) smile that Edwin "Goose" Ramey is wearing these days is occasioned by the fact that 5 Canadian wild goose eggs were hatched at his place early this week. The goslings are doing fine according to Mr. Ramey.

So far as is known Mr. Ramey is the only person in this country that has domesticated this particular fowl.

An unusual circumstance connected with his geese is the fact that one gander is mated with two geese. As a general rule they mate in pairs only and for life. The "Brigham Young" gander is a proud papa these days, Ramey claims. Another interesting fact about the hatching of the eggs was that immediately upon completion of the hatching, the other spouse jumped upon the nest and laid an egg.

These geese build their nests right out in the sun and do their incubating there, regardless of the clemencies of the weather.

Mr. Ramey has little trouble keeping the geese at home except in the fall when he catches them and puts them up.

County Cotton Farmers Will Get \$21,000

Final tabulation on cotton reduction contracts has been forwarded to the State Board of Review at College Station, Texas for final approval. As soon as this approval is received contracts, which have already been signed and all adjustments made will be forwarded to Washington for payment. Ninety-nine producers have signed contracts to reduce their cotton 2,700 acres and will be paid approximately \$16,724.00 in rentals on the reduced acres and \$5,016.00 in guaranteed parity payments, a total of \$21,740.00. Approval from the college is expected within a week or ten days.

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Early Start of Highway 143 Discussed At Meeting Mon.

A resolve to push to an early beginning Highway 143 from Vega to Levelland was manifested at a meeting of the Panhandle North and South Highway Association at Dimmitt Monday. The meeting was held in connection with the Lions club weekly luncheon.

Representatives were present from Oldham, Deaf Smith, Castro, Lamb and Hockley counties in response to a call for the organization to make a serious effort at the present time to secure the building of the designated highway with moneys appropriated for drought relief in this western tier of counties.

After the usual luncheon hour of the Lions Club, Boss Lion Chas. H. Dean surrendered the meeting to T. A. Singer, who acted as chairman of the meeting. Talks were made by each representative present, the theme of each of them being the urgency of action in asking for the highway at the present time since Federal money is now available for this purpose and will be turned loose at an early date.

At the climax of the meeting, J. W. Hale, chamber of commerce secretary of Littlefield made a motion that the standing committee of the Association be instructed to go to Austin at the earliest feasible date, taking with them their respective county judges and commissioners, as many as will go, and present the claims and desires of these counties for Highway No. 143, north and south from Vega to Levelland.

The committee is composed of the following: W. E. Dameron chairman of Deaf Smith county; T. A. Singer, Castro county; C. J. Rhea of Hockley and Art Cheser, Lamb county.

To Extend Period On Crop Loans To May 15th

The period in which applications for emergency crop loans may be received has been extended to the close of business May 15, according to a statement issued here April 26 from the Production Credit Division of the Farm Credit Administration.

All applications in all states must be received not later than May 15. Loans which are approved will be paid out as soon as possible, either before or after May 15, but no new applications will be received after that date.

The extension in the time limit has been granted, due primarily to the late season in many parts of the United States this year.

Loans from the emergency crop loan fund of \$40,000,000 appropriated by the Congress for the present season, are made only to applicants who are unable to obtain credit from other sources, who do not have a means of livelihood other than farming and who are otherwise eligible. The minimum amount of an emergency crop loan is \$10, the maximum \$250.

"I found when I placed food on shelves that I had some three dozen more containers of food than I thought I had," said Mrs. Bagwell.

Mrs. Bagwell has also transplanted asparagus crowns and grapes and small berries.

One of Mrs. Bagwell's recipes for serving pork is: Remove roast from can and slice. Heat gravy in iron skillet and heat meat in same. When heated well remove and brown pineapple rings in hot gravy. When rings are browned, make more gravy by adding pineapple juice, serve with baked potatoes and cucumber salad.
