## WTCC STARTS POSTWAR JOBS INVESTIGATION

A postwar jobs survey, both rural and urban, throughout its territory is being launched by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, under its inter-county agricultural and livestock contest and in collaboration with the state Committee for Economic Development, the WTCC has announced.

The contest was launched in January this year for two years of competitive effort in strengthening West Texas' farm and ranch economy through soil conservation, increased production and improvement in quality of crops, herds, and flocks. Recently, at the regional chamber's referendum assembly, held Nov. 8, the directors voted to add postwar jobs as a contest objective; to broaden this to include jobs surveys in the towns as well as on the farms and ranches; and to merge this phase with the similar aims of the Committee for Economic Development.

G. H. McKinney, Fort Worth chairman of the WTCC's Postwar Economy and Planning Commission which is conducting the \$1,000 contest, also is chairman of the CED's District 5 covering most of West Texas. McKinney and E. W. Hardin, regional chamber president, are announcing that all West Texas county planning boards organized and functioning under the inter-county contest also are being designated as county committees of the CED. The jobs survey will get under way at once.

## GI Calls For Scotch Goad The Irish Distillers

BELFAST (UP)—GIs who have been calling for "Scotch" in pubs and bars all over Northern Ireland when they meant "whiskey" have set Irish distillers to thinking.

And they've decided that the high-powered salesmanship that has made "Scotch" synonymous with "whiskey" in most parts of the United States will have to be offset if they're going to capture their share of the American liquor market after the war.

They are planning an extensive publicity campaign to boost Irish whiskey in the United States after the war, shrewdly calculating that the thousands of American soldiers who have become acquainted with their product while in Ulster will be a ready-made nucleus of a market.

In response to the expressed preference—frequently very loud by expression—of the GI's the distillers also are planning a milder brand of traditional Irish with a little less of the traditional sharpness and a full measure of the traditional "kick."

One expert discussing the post-war prospects of the industry said that he believed the "Commercial Age" had killed the individuality of Highland distillers still or as he said "there were still two or three real craftsmen left."

"In my opinion," he continued, "and I think some of the American whom we've been hoists to in Ireland will agree, Irish whiskey is the best in the world, even though it is limited in range. It is distilled to a strict standard of purity is matured under the best warehouse conditions. It is seldom or never blended. You can't hold a good thing down forever and there are now signs that our Irish whiskey is regaining some of its original popularity in England and America."

## United Nations Flag In Schools On V-Day Urged

WASHINGTON (UP)—Youthful Betsy Rosses in schools throughout the country are being urged to stitch United Nations Honor Flag for special classroom ceremonies when Germany falls.

Display of this flag, along with the American flag, is one of the many V-Day exercises recommended by the National Education Assn. Emphasis will be on United Nations unity.

The honor flag is designed to mark the joint victory of the 44 united and associated nations. Rectangular in shape, it bears four upright red bars—symbolic of the Four Freedoms—emblazoned on a white background. It is about half the size of the American flag and is displayed beneath it.

The NEA has distributed special pamphlets to schools with instructions for putting the flag together. School children will use materials supplied in classrooms.

Display of the flag would be accompanied by the recitation of a special pledge which is to be repeated following the pledge of allegiance to the U. S.

"And I display the United Nations Honor Flag in appreciation of all those who are my country's friends and allies, and who are dedicated with her to the common ends of peace, freedom and humanity."

The honor flag was first raised to the top of a flagpole at Dumbarton Oaks on June 20, 1943. Since then it has been reported flying in many places throughout the world. On Memorial Day, 1944 it was displayed at the tomb of the unknown soldier to pay honor to those who have given their lives in common cause with Americans.

Representatives of the United Nations feel that the meaning of the flag will be greatly enhanced if it is displayed by the people themselves instead of the government instituting its use.

"Of all the groups throughout the world it would seem that the schools can best lead in this glorious and wholesome project. Students have most to gain by winning and maintaining the peace. By enthusiastically promoting the meaning of the flag, the world and thereby the future of humanity," the NEA said.

## Texas' Opinion Low of Army's Street Naming

CAMP MAXEY, Tex. (UP)—Texas has a bone to pick with the Army's topographical-historical-cymological department of camp street christening.

The streets at Camp Maxey—all but one—are properly named for Texas heroes and towns. But right smack among such fine streets as Austin Road, Crockett Road and Milam Road is Santa Anna Road. And that's what Texas is sore about.

For the benefit of citizens of the other 47 states it should be noted that Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna was president of Mexico when the stalwart sons of Texas decided to set up their own republic. Every mention of the name of Santa Anna usually evokes in Texas the sort of comments generally reserved for Hitler. Even the fact that Sam Houston outsmarted Santa Anna at San Jacinto and won Texas independence doesn't make the man any more popular in the Lone Star State.

And that's why Texas doesn't think so much of the Army's department of street naming.

## World War II Heroes Coming With GI Jamboree

Staff Sergeant Herman P. Ehrhardt, 21 year old till gunner with a bronze medal as well as his own native Tennessee, put in more than 500 combat hours against the Japanese before bomber crash injuries returned him to the United States for medical treatment.

He was a member of a fighter squadron operating from bases on Guadalcanal, then was transferred to a heavy bomber outfit. During his two years in the Southwest Pacific, Sergeant Oster went on bombing missions to Buna, New Guinea, and islands of the New Georgia group. He participated in the first raids to clear the way for ground forces following the Japanese. Sgt. Oster took part, too, in thunderous air operations, including the never to be forgotten Coral Sea battle.

On returning from a mission over Bougainville, Sgt. Oster's bomber crashed on Guadalcanal. He was flown to a hospital in the New Hebrides for treatment, later sent to New Zealand where he boarded a hospital ship for the States. He was hospitalized at an Army General Hospital in San Francisco, and came to Sheppard Field for reassignment after a final physical checkup at Fort Sam Houston, Texas. He has been grounded permanently because of the crash injuries.

Sgt. Oster will appear in Ranger on Sunday, December 3 at the Arcadia Block as a member of the "G. I. Jamboree" war bond unit in the interest of the Smashing Sixth war loan campaign.

Born and educated in Birmingham, he spent a year as a pre-medical student at Birmingham Southern College before enlisting on February 2, 1942. After training which took him to Chanute field, Illinois, and to gunnery school at Woodhouse Field, Utah, he went overseas in April of 1943.

The fire was discovered by 14-year old Earl Harris, who immediately saved his mother, Mrs. Marie Neighbors, by pushing her through a window.

Police Investigator W. J. Robitsch arrived at the scene of the blaze to find the boy holding his badly burned mother to prevent her from reentering the house to rescue her mother, Mrs. McBurney.

Robitsch said he saw Mrs. McBurney sitting up in bed, screaming and trying to beat out the flames with her hands. He attempted to reach her, but failed.

## BOY'S EGG HATCHING TEST BEARS FRUIT

PERIA, Ill. (UP)—When nine-year-old Bobby Hill learned from his school teacher that heat was the most important factor in egg-hatching an idea flashed into his mind. He decided he would perform an experiment on his own.

So Bobby, whose life's ambition is to be a scientist, picked out a white, country-fresh egg from the kitchen and placed it in an "incubator" made from two sauce dishes placed one over the other and lined with cotton.

He set the nest on top of the refrigerator near the ceiling where the air was warm. Faithfully tending his egg, he sealed the height of the sink and refrigerator each day to "turn" his potential chick.

"I didn't mind climbing up," said Bobby, "even though I did kind of smash my head against the ceiling."

A few weeks later his efforts bore fruit. When he looked into the "nest" one morning the egg was cracked and a tiny yellow chick was peeping its way into the world.

## Gives New Slant To Bible Placing

## LINDERN AND WELZ CAPTURED, THIRD ARMY CONVERGING ON MERZIG IN THE SAAR BASIN

Americans Wreck Another Japanese Convoy Bound For Leyte, Sinking Four Transports And Setting Fire To Two Others

The American Ninth Army extended its hold on the west bank of the Roer river today, capturing Lindern and Welz, and storming into the outskirts of Flussdorf as the Germans under heavy pressure pulled in their defenses closer to the Cologne plain stronghold of Linlich.

The Third Army converged on the industrial center of Merzig in the Saar Basin, forcing the Germans back along an eight mile front inside Germany.

Soviet forces driving beyond the Danube below Budapest towards the Austrian frontier extended their front to more than 100 miles and spread along an 18 mile stretch of the north bank of the Drava river. The second Ukrainian army was encircling the strong point of Miskole after the capture of Eger and Salts and Salts.

## OPPOSES STAND TAKEN BY U. T. EX-STUDENTS

HOUSTON, Tex. (UP)—Circuit Judge Joseph C. Hutcheson, Jr., a member of the executive council of the University of Texas Ex-Students Association, declared today that he is opposed to the stand the association has taken in requesting the reinstatement of Dr. Homer P. Rainey and the resignation of remainder regents.

Hutcheson, in a letter to John A. McCurdy, executive secretary of the association, said he was opposed to the council taking a stand for or against Dr. Rainey.

The council yesterday adopted resolutions calling for the reinstatement of Dr. Rainey and for the resignations of remaining members of the board of regents—excepting Mr. I. D. Fairchild of Lufkin, one of two regents who voted against Rainey's discharge.

In Austin, McCurdy said a copy of the minutes of Thursday's council meeting and a copy of Judge Hutcheson's letter will be mailed to all members of the council.

"We are interested in the welfare of the University, not personalities," McCurdy said.

## STATE SENDS BUDDY BAGS TO BATTLESHIP

TRENTON, N. J. (UP)—The crew of the battleship New Jersey, wherever they are from, will receive Merry Christmas presents from the state for which their ship is named.

"Buddy bags," for each officer and man are on their way to the Pacific from the state society for the battleship New Jersey, and the Navy has promised that they'll be on board for Christmas morning.

Cigarettes, candy, playing cards, a Bible, shaving materials, tooth brushes and paste, shoe shining shoe strings, handkerchiefs, and writing materials are included in each bag, collected in a drive headed by Mrs. Beatrice Compton, assistant secretary of state and the widow of former assistant secretary of the Navy Louis Compton.

## Seven Killed In Plane Accident

LOS ANGELES—A Transcontinental and Western Airlines plane bound for New York plunged to earth today as it glided in for a landing at the Burbank airport, killing seven of its 23 passengers and seven of its crew.

The twin motored ship crashed in a muddy field only a few blocks from its scheduled landing place. Ambulance attendants said the deep mud may have accounted for the fact that 16 persons came out alive.

## Bombs Explosion Is Investigated

TOLAR, N. M. (UP)—Railroad officials investigated an explosion of a carload of bombs on a Santa Fe freight train which killed Jesse Brown, who was standing in front of his home here when the blast occurred.

Reports indicated that Brown was the sole victim of the blast which occurred yesterday. Several buildings were demolished.

## U. S. Hospital Fleet Can Care For 22 Thousand

NEW YORK (UP)—The American armed services now possess a fleet of 36 new hospital ships which offer facilities for approximately 22,000 patients. Converted luxury liners, Liberty ships, and former troop transports are included in the fleet.

The ships were made available to the Army and Navy by the Merchant Marine.

In speaking of the Merchant Marine's part in building up the hospital fleet, Frank J. Taylor, president of the American Merchant Marine Institute, pointed out that in 1939 only one hospital ship was in service, and that it was fortunate that the vessels could be made available by the Nation's shipping.

The average hospital ship has about 600 beds and is the equivalent of a seven to nine story hospital covering a small city block.

Leading the fleet are three former world cruise liners the President Madison the President Buchanan, and the President Fillmore.

**CPL. BILLY CONN** strikes the British Fancy's fancy, and word from there is that a lot of observers would like the Pittsburgh Collier Ad in an encore with Sgt. Joe Louis. Obviously Corporal Conn has retained his speed while acquiring weight and strength. He would have to be given a chance, but the same old guy who has licked every real heavyweight champion, Father Time, will also account for Sergeant Louis.

From John Lawrence Sullivan on down the line history reveals that no human opponent ever defeated the heavyweight champion while the latter was in his heyday.

**SULLIVAN** had been "licking any man in the house," had not been out in nearly four years, had participated in only three engagements during the previous six, was 34 when James J. Corbett ran him down.

Jim Corbett tackled Jim Jeffries twice after Bob Fitzsimmons popularized the solar plexus punch—came close the first time—but Jeff was too much, especially with the old bloke with the scythe on his side.

Ruby Robert gave the Old Man of the Hour the toughest battle of them all, yet lost the heavyweight crown to Jeff in his first attempt to defend it. He was 37 and his hands were brittle when he broke them to bits on the Boilermaker's granite jaw.

Willard settled into a state of innocuous desuetude after scaling the heights, essaying only one

battle, a 10-round no-decision affair with Frank Moran, in the four years that intervened before he dragged his pudgy hulk into the steaming battle pit in Toledo, July 4, 1919, to have Jack Dempsey put the period to old Daddy Time's erosive work.

**EVEN** the virtue Dempsey could not withstand the silent beating of the Old Man of the Hour-glass, and following a three-year sojourn down the velvet paths of luxury and inactivity, at 31 he too succumbed when the life went out of his tired legs against Gene Tunney in Philadelphia, Sept. 23, 1926.

For two years and eight months now the guy with the hourglass has been getting in whacks at the Brown Bomber past the guard thrown around him by Army discipline.

Jack Johnson is the only heavyweight champion who successfully defended the title after he was 30, and Lt. Arthur hardly had to do anything more than go through the motions until he ran out of gas against Jess Willard.

Today Joe Louis is a half a year older than 30, and there is no prospect of his fighting for months to come.

### Humble Company To Celebrate Production Mark

HOUSTON, Tex. —The distinction of being the first refinery in the nation to manufacture one billion gallons of finished 100 octane aviation gasoline will be won by Humble Oil & Refining Company's Baytown Plant on December 14, it was announced today by Humble officials.

On that day Baytown refinery will be the scene of a commemorative ceremony. The one-billionth gallon will be presented to a military representative by H. C. Wiles, Humble president, and 14,000 active employees and 3,000 in military uniforms will be honored for their contributions toward this war production record, as well as for their achievements in all phases of the Company's operations.

The all-day celebration, built around the formal presentation ceremony has the full endorsement and approval of the War and Navy departments. High ranking officers from all the services will be in attendance for the occasion, as will officials of many governmental agencies, and state and local leaders in both government and industry.

In connection with the event a number of exhibits have been prepared and will be on display from December 14 through December 17. One of the features will be the Army air force show, which will be brought to Baytown especially for this occasion. Making its twenty-third appearance, this exhibit has shown to capacity crowds in the principal industrial cities of the East and Mid-west. It consists of special booths, displays and moving pictures which tell a graphic story of war production. The Navy, likewise, will have striking exhibitions to demonstrate the strength of our country's naval power, and to illustrate the important part 100-octane aviation gasoline plays in its operations.

Also on display will be a large number of special exhibits depicting the operations of a great industrial organization, producing for war. These exhibits will be housed in special tents surrounding the Baytown community building. The formal ceremony will be held on a platform, erected adjacent to the main refinery office and inside the grounds, so that the greatest possible number of spectators might attend.

All exhibits will remain open for the four day period so that everyone who wishes to attend might do so. After viewing the exhibits and pictures, visitors will be conducted on special tours through the refinery and the associated war plants.

Baytown refinery's leadership in the manufacture of super aviation fuel dates back to pre-war days. Pioneer research work in the field of high octane gasoline was occupying considerable time in the Baytown laboratories in the late '30's. In 1937 Humble built a unique pipe line from the East Texas field to Baytown to bring natural gasoline and butane in large quantities for processing of the light fractions so essential to high quality gasoline. And in 1938 the Company built the world's first alkylation plant in Baytown.

The combination of these three factors enabled Humble to begin making 100 octane aviation gasoline early in the war and to produce it in greater volume than any other American refinery.

Since Pearl Harbor, Humble has greatly increased its capacity for manufacturing the essential wartime fuel at Baytown. Alkylation facilities were expanded; two giant fluid catalytic cracking units, a superfractionation unit and a hydrogenation plant were built; and several old units were converted to take a new place in the 100 octane gasoline program.

How much gasoline is a billion gallons? That is best understood when broken down in terms of actual consumption in sky fighting. For example, if 1,000 big bombers made a round trip between the British Isles and Berlin every day it would take them 400 days to burn up a billion gallons of 100 octane gasoline.

But 100 octane aviation gasoline is not all that Baytown refinery is producing for war. Other refinery units and adjacent war plants operated by Humble are turning out vast quantities of Toluene for explosives, synthetic rubber, aviation engine lubricants, 80 octane all purpose gasoline, heavy duty lubricants for military equipment, diesel fuels, solvents, and Navy fuel oil.

In addition to the Baytown plant's production, a sizeable quantity of war products comes from two other Humble refineries located at Ingleside and San Antonio.

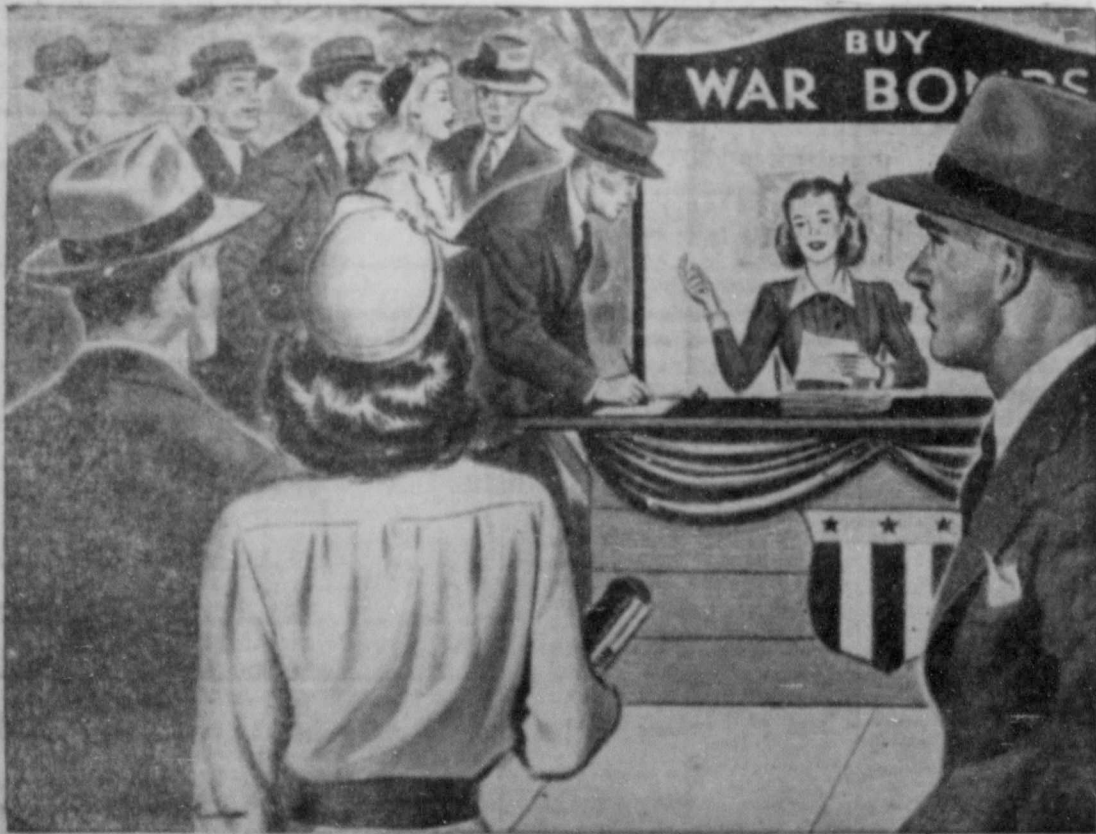

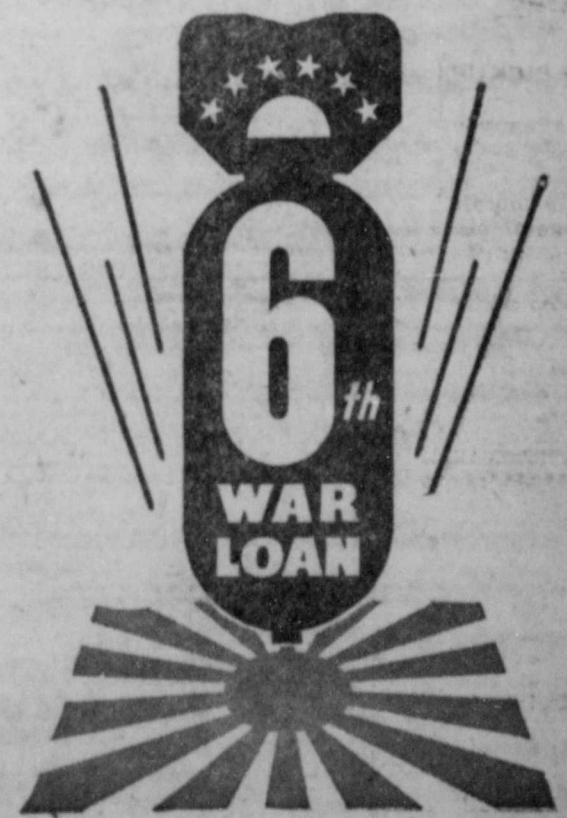

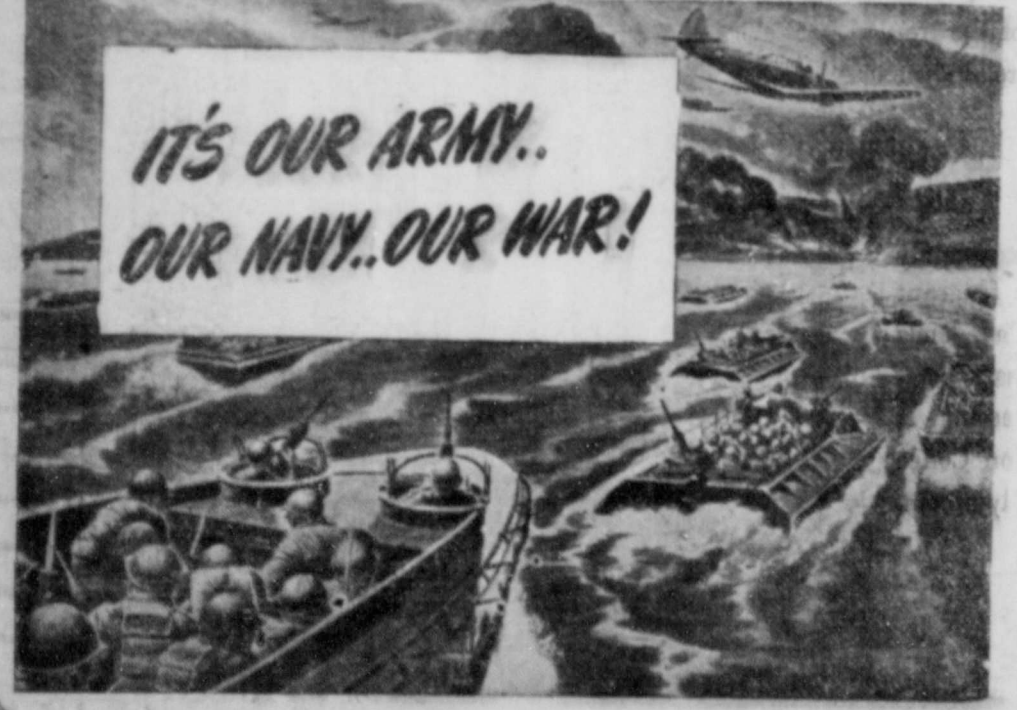

oil in the form of a good furniture polish or you can make a very good and inexpensive polish yourself. It's quite easy.

Simply mix one part turpentine with two parts of boiled linseed oil. You should use this oil at least twice a year on varnished or oiled furniture, it is advised. The turpentine will help remove the dirt which collects on furniture. This oil soaks into the wood and

keeps it in good condition. What's more, the polish keeps tiny cracks from showing and it clears up that dull look furniture often has.

Incidentally, be careful in handling that turpentine. It's highly inflammable. This turpentine and oil mixture should be applied with a clean soft cloth. . . then the excess should be wiped off with another clean cloth. Finally, rub the surface until the wood is entirely dry and your fingers will leave no prints.

If you have any small scratches on your furniture one good trick is to conceal them by rubbing each with a nut meat. The meat of walnuts or pecans will work very well for the oil of the nut penetrates the scratched surface. Or, if you have a waxed surface of wood that is spotted or scratched you'd better first wash it with turpentine . . . then re-wax the entire surface.
