BOYS 4H CLUB PROGRAM
The 150 4-H Club boys who are enrolled in Castro county for 1945-46 have a wide variety of demonstrations which include feeding for show as well as production on a commercial basis.
A check on demonstrations by the County Agent during the past month show the following number of boys are carrying a large number of demonstrations.
42 boys feeding 120 beef calves. Many of the calves are being pastured now and also fed and will be shown at various shows next spring.
Six boys, John Gilbreath, Jimmy and Junior Cluck, Buddy, Billy Joe and Bobby Glen Hill are feeding 10 calves each. Charles Frye is feeding 14 head and the other boys are feeding from one to five calves.
31 boys feeding 101 pigs.
Approximately 76 of the pigs are on feed for shows at Amarillo, Ft. Worth, Plainview and Lubbock. This includes 3 litters and pens of 3 in 5 different breeds, 17 boys in 5 clubs are feeding these pigs.
10 boys planning to have 527 baby chicks.
3 boys are feeding 20 lambs.
These boys are Cecil Ray Jones, with 10 lambs Julian Huseman with 5, and Joe Percy Hart with 5.
7 boys with 60 rabbits
12 boys with 250 acres of crops.
These crop demonstrations include wheat sudan and combine milo. Carl Brugel of the Dimmitt Jr. 4-H Club has the largest acreage with 120 acres.
30 boys with 34 breeding hogs.
Most of the hogs are registered and a large per cent have descended from the Sears Program in the County.
6 boys with 6 beef females
6 boys with 156 hens for egg production.
35 boys with 43 dairy cows and heifers.
Approximately 15 of these animals are registered and some of them will be shown at the Plainview dairy show next spring.
Floyd and Kenneth Acker of the Nazareth Club recently purchased a registered heifer and a registered Jersey Bull to start a dairy herd.
9 boys have 10 dual purpose females.
4 boys are planning to have gardens.

Plains Memorial Hospital To Open Monday, Dec. 17
BOYS IS INJURED AS TRAIN HITE CAR NEAR CANYON
(From Amarillo Daily News)
Two persons were killed and a 3 year old boy seriously injured yesterday afternoon at a grade crossing four miles south of Canyon when a southbound train hit the pickup truck in which they were riding. The accident occurred about 4:30 P.M.
J.M. Durham and Mrs. H. Durham, his sister-in-law, are dead, and her son Clinton was in critical condition last night at a local hospital.
Mr. Durham and his sister-in-law were on their way back from Amarillo to their homes on adjacent farms near Hart. They had just turned off U.S. Highway 87 to cross the railroad tracks when the southbound Santa Fe passenger train crashed broadside into their 1942 Ford pickup. Mrs. Durham and her son were thrown clear by the impact, but Mr. Durham was pinned under the wreckage.
The truck totally demolished before the train could stop, was carried 150 feet, according to investigating state highway patrolman. At the scene of the accident, the highway turns parallel to Santa Fe's tracks, and the old unpaved road to Happy angles off from the main route, crossing the railroad at an angle of 45 degrees.
The Durhams had approached the grade crossing with their backs to the oncoming train, according to the highway patrol, and were apparently hit when almost exactly halfway across.
Driven by engineer R.W. Maupin 1006 Lincoln, the train left Amarillo at approximately 3:45 o'clock. The train on this southbound run to Lubbock and Sweetwater is made up in Amarillo to make connections with the westbound out of Chicago which is due in at about 1:45 o'clock according to Santa Fe dispatchers. Yesterday the train to Lubbock left Amarillo one hour and 45 minutes behind schedule.
First person to arrive at the accident was C.H. Lowe who was truck and saw the collision. He and several men off the train stopped a passing automobile to bring aid. An ambulance from Grigg Warren Funeral Home in Canyon answered the call and took the victims back to Canyon. Clinton Durham, injured infant, received emergency care in Canyon hospital before he was brought to Amarillo.
The Durham farmland, located 13 miles southwest of Hart in Castro county have been operate for several years by two brothers, J.M. and H.C. Durham. Neighbors last night estimated the age of both victims at between 35 and 40 years.

BOYS IS INJURED AS TRAIN HITE CAR NEAR CANYON

(From Amarillo Daily News)

Two persons were killed and a 3 year old boy seriously injured yesterday afternoon at a grade crossing four miles south of Canyon when a southbound train hit the pickup truck in which they were riding. The accident occurred about 4:30 P.M.

J.M. Durham and Mrs. H. Durham, his sister-in-law, are dead, and her son Clinton was in critical condition last night at a local hospital.

Mr. Durham and his sister-in-law were on their way back from Amarillo to their homes on adjacent farms near Hart. They had just turned off U.S. Highway 87 to cross the railroad tracks when the southbound Santa Fe passenger train crashed broadside into their 1942 Ford pickup. Mrs. Durham and her son were thrown clear by the impact, but Mr. Durham was pinned under the wreckage.

The truck totally demolished before the train could stop, was carried 150 feet, according to investigating state highway patrolman.

At the scene of the accident, the highway turns parallel to Santa Fe's tracks, and the old unpaved road to Happy angles off from the main route, crossing the railroad at an angle of 45 degrees.

The Durhams had approached the grade crossing with their backs to the oncoming train, according to the highway patrol, and were apparently hit when almost exactly halfway across.

Driven by engineer R.W. Maupin 1006 Lincoln, the train left Amarillo at approximately 3:45 o'clock. The train on this southbound run to Lubbock and Sweetwater is made up in Amarillo to make connections with the westbound out of Chicago which is due in at about 1:45 o'clock according to Santa Fe dispatchers. Yesterday the train to Lubbock left Amarillo one hour and 45 minutes behind schedule.

First person to arrive at the accident was C.H. Lowe who was truck and saw the collision. He and several men off the train stopped a passing automobile to bring aid. An ambulance from Grigg Warren Funeral Home in Canyon answered the call and took the victims back to Canyon. Clinton Durham, injured infant, received emergency care in Canyon hospital before he was brought to Amarillo.

The Durham farmland, located 13 miles southwest of Hart in Castro county have been operate for several years by two brothers, J.M. and H.C. Durham. Neighbors last night estimated the age of both victims at between 35 and 40 years.
