### WASHINGTON COLUMN

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Montana Senator James E. Murray's highly controversial "ever-normal economy" bill, officially titled "The Full Employment Bill of 1945," has just been introduced in the new Congress after a complete job of overhauling and rewriting.

When Senators Murray, Truman and Revercomb put the idea for this bill in a report submitted to Congress last December, their purpose was merely to stimulate discussion of their original concept of preparing an annual budget for the entire national economy, private as well as public, and then trying to do something about it.

Discussion developed immediately and in quantity, hot and cold. From all the criticisms material was obtained for redrafting the bill in the form in which it is now before Congress. In the redrafting, Senators Robert F. Wagner of New York, Albert D. Thomas of Utah and Joseph C. O'Mahoney of Wyoming played important parts and the bill as introduced with the backing of these three as well as Senator Murray. Backed by this important Senatorial quartet the bill easily becomes one of the major objectives of the new Congress and as such it is worth some careful study.

The statement of purpose of the original bill was "to establish a national policy and program for assuring continuing full employment." The purpose of the revised bill is stated by adding to the above "in a free competitive economy, through the concerted efforts of industry, agriculture, labor, state and local governments and the federal government." This important difference is made to calm the fears of businessmen who got the idea that Congress was about to embark on some radical social reform in which it would guarantee jobs to everyone, come happiness or hard times.

In discussing the revised Full Employment Bill, Senator Murray quotes from and endorses Governor Dewey's San Francisco campaign speech of last September in which the Republican presidential candidate stated that the government's first job is to create job opportunities when there are not enough private jobs to go around.

SENATOR MURRAY makes clear that his bill is no "job budget" bill as it was originally misunderstood to be in much of the press comment, and as Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio criticized it as being in his recent New York speech.

The Murray-Wagner-Thomas-O'Mahoney bill, as it must now be identified, would provide for a far-reaching and fundamental reform of Congress through its proposal to create a joint committee of 15 Senators and 15 Representatives to receive from the President his annual estimates on the national economy. This joint committee would be required to present to the Congress an annual bill which would in effect add up all sectors of the national economy, private as well as governmental, and recommend a national policy for dealing with the country's financial and employment well-being. This would insure an annual or even more frequent debate in Congress on national economic policy and it is intended to lead to the adoption of a fiscal policy which would seek to prevent inflation as well as depression, thus contributing to the maintenance of a national "ever-normal economy."

COACHES thought basketball had evils only in the zone defense and lowering goal-tenders when the Brooklyn College scandal gave them something really worth thinking about.

Morris Raskin was one of the few speaking against Howard A. Hobson's proposals to:

1. Enlarge the three-second area to form a rectangle 12 feet wide.
2. Award three points for baskets scored from outside of a 21-foot arc.

"That would make a lot of coaches feel that there was no use in teaching players how to work the ball up to the forecourt when a successful long shot counted an extra point," quipped Tubby Raskin of Brooklyn College. "In my opinion it should be tried for four or five years before being put into effect."

THERE is some merit in Howard Hobson's suggestions nevertheless, and it wouldn't be at all surprising if they were incorporated in the code.

Hobson, former Oregon coach preparing for his doctorate at Columbia Teachers College, would widen the foul lane from six feet to 12, the three-second rule applying to the entire area.

With the restricted area doubled, the effectiveness of sky-scrapers who now plant themselves just outside the lane would be cut in half. The three-second rule on the part of seven-foot Footballers Kurland would be minimized. Shorter athletes would have a better chance at the ball following a missed free throw.

Three points for a goal scored from outside of an arc with a radius of 21 feet from the hoop would draw zone defenders out. A clever zone defense bores you to death.

To determine what changes to make, Hobson, about to go overseas for Army coaching duties, kept records of 23 games played at Madison Square Garden this season.

HIS figures show that 186 out of 1000 shots taken from beyond 21 feet and 294 out of 1000 of those from inside clicked. The percentage of accuracy outside the 21-foot mark was 18.6, inside 29.4. Hence he figures the longer shot should be worth 30 per cent more than the regulation two points.

While the plan would put a premium on long shots, Hobson doubts that it would hurt a driving team, and certainly it would help a trailing team in the dying seconds. It would give the game added thrills, make more possible something like a home run in the ninth.

### Bob Hope Sails The Spaish Main In Samuel Goldwyn's Comedy Riot

Samuel Goldwyn's production, "The Princess and the Pirate" coming to the Arcadia Sunday and Monday is a Technicolor comedy starring Bob Hope. The supporting cast is headed by Virginia Mayo, and includes Walter Slezak, Walter Brennan, Victor McLaglen, Hugo Haas and Marc Lawrence.

David Butler directed the picture from an original screen play by Don Hartman, who is also the associate producer, Melville Shavelson and Everett Freeman.

"The Princess and the Pirate" is a salty story of pirate days on the bounding main when men were men and pirates cut their throats. It abounds with bloody sea fights between buccannors and honest seamen sailing under the King's flag, is replete with weird yarns about buried treasure and features some of the ugliest, toughest men and sweetest, most beautiful girls that ever graced a pirate's hang-out.

Hope is seen as a wandering actor—not good but loud, which was the fashion for actors in that day—who sails aboard a merchant man for Jamaica. Hope, in the roll of Sylvester the Great, the Man of Seven Faces, meets a beautiful young maid, played by Virginia Mayo, aboard ship and makes a strong play for her affections. He is unaware that Virginia is really the King's daughter.

Enroute the merchantman is attacked by pirates, a rugged bunch of killers led by The Hook Victor McLaglen. The princess is kidnapped and Sylvester saves his life only by masquerading as an old Gypsy woman, one of his "seven faces."

From then on the life of Sylvester and the Princess Margaret is hectic, adventurous and hilarious.

They escape from the pirate ship, make their way to the mythical town of Casarogue, where it is unlawful to kill a man without a permit, are kidnapped by another band of killers and finally are saved when Sylvester unexpectedly finds himself the leader of the pirates.

Miss Mayo, who has the feminine lead opposite Hope, has her second film role in "The Princess and the Pirate" as one of Goldwyn's "Up In Arms" as one of the Goldwyn Girls, and was immediately spotted for the Hope film. Virginia was discovered by Goldwyn at Billy Rose's Diamond Horseshoe in New York where she was the ringmistress in an act with "Pansy, the Horse." She has been in Hollywood about a year and has been groomed carefully and intensively for her big chance.

"The Princess and the Pirate" marks the first picture in which Hope departs from his modern characterizations. The script, however, presents rather faithfully the Bob Hope of 1944 transposed to a setting of the 1640's.

From a production standpoint, "The Princess and the Pirate" is one of the truly big productions of the year. It is an RKO Radio release.

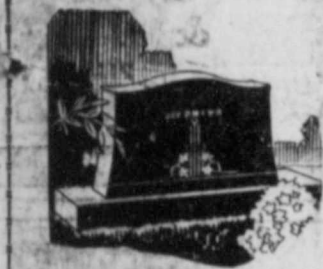

**65 Per Cent Of Soldiers Get First Train Ride**

COLORADO SPRINGS, Col. (UP) — Fighter pilots training for combat service at the 72nd fighter wing base in the Second Air Force are becoming thoroughly familiar with pneumatic pants, which prevent blacking-out in aerial maneuvers.

German capture of 8th and 9th Air Force pilots in combat has made further security measures unnecessary, so that now the nation may know all about the magic G-Suit ("G" for gravity.)

Looking like nothing more than tight, high-waisted pants with built-in suspenders and girdle, the pants are plugged into the air line just before the pilot takes off. Then pressure is applied automatically to the abdomen and legs during a pullout or turn.

The effect of the pressure is to prevent blood from pooling in the lower extremities as a result of the influence of gravity in making a sharp turn, thus aiding the heart in maintaining circulation to the brain, according to Lt. Col. Rulon P. Howe, assistant surgeon of the 2nd Air Force.

Explained in the language of the laymen, the suit has the same effect as in that time-tried method of swinging a bucket of water in a circle without spilling any of it, so the weight of blood is thrown from head to feet when a pilot makes a turn or pull-up at high speed. Against forces which may amount to three or as much as nine times

that of gravity, his heart is unable to pump sufficient blood to the brain. This might result in dimming or blackout of vision because of lack of oxygen.

Fighter pilots report that they are unable to blackout while wearing the G-suit, and an unexpected result is a great reduction in the fatigue commonly experienced after combat maneuvers.

Use of the pneumatic pants is under close watch in the 2nd Air Force, with a view to possible improvement.

**Senate Committee May Draft Own Manpower Bill**

WASHINGTON (UP)—Chairman Elbert D. Thomas, D., Utah, said today the Senate military affairs committee may throw out all pending manpower legislation and write a new bill of its own.

The committee now has two major proposals under consideration. One, passed by the House, would make all men from 18 to 45 subject to draft for wartime essential jobs. The other would seek to guarantee a full labor market by giving legal force to war manpower commission rulings on industrial hiring.

**Connally Says Basis for Treaty Is Fair Dealing**

WASHINGTON (UP)—Chairman Tom Connally of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said today that the basis of the U. S. - Mexican water treaty is "fair dealing" and not "to grab all the water we can."

"It is a matter of fair dealing as opposed to the attitude of 'you're weak, we're strong' and you go to —," he commented during a hearing before his committee on the treaty.
