COUNTY GOES OVER TOP IN BOND DRIVE

Eastland County went over the top in the current Red Cross War Fund drive Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock, just eight days after the opening of the drive. Homer Smith, county chairman had set ten days as the goal for completion of the drive in the county. Ranger was leading the county in the amount collected with a total of \$4,208.25 having been reported by committees. All media had been reported as being over the quota though the exact amount had not been named.

Funeral Services For W. F. Pace Are Held On Friday

Funeral services for William F. Pace were conducted Friday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock at the Morris Funeral Home in Ranger with Mr. O. G. Lanier in charge of the services. Interment was in the Evergreen cemetery. Mr. Pace died March 8 in Wichita Falls and the body was brought overland by Morris Funeral Home. The deceased was born in Mississippi, Sept. 15, 1867 and had made his home in Ranger for 40 years. He was a member of the Church of Christ. Survivors include the widow, Mrs. Ida Pace, four daughters, Mrs. Harbey Quinn and Mrs. Orb Lambert of Ranger, Mrs. C. W. Harmon of Berkeley, California, Mrs. Anna Lowe of Cruthers, California and two brothers Hugh Allison and William Allison of Hico.

People Urged To Buy Car License Before Last Day

C. E. May, whose insurance office each year handles the sales of car licenses in Ranger as a courtesy to the people today issued an appeal for persons who intend to buy licenses to do so now and not wait until the last day and hour to do so. May stated that they hoped to avoid the last minute rush such as they had last year and that if people want to avoid standing in line to get the plates, they should attend to the matter now. He also said that the office will handle passenger, commercial and farm licenses and all that is necessary in the way of papers to secure the 1945 license, is last year's receipt.

PLAN NOW FOR POSTWAR DAYS SAYS MARRS

Opening his talk with the statement that "now is the time to be planning for post war days," W. E. Marrs who spoke before a group of citizens at the Ranger Chamber of Commerce Thursday night at 8:00 o'clock, urged the citizens to get underway plans that will help to take care of returning war veterans and war plant workers after the war is over. He said that the job of taking care of Ranger's workers and veterans rest squarely on the shoulders of the people of Ranger. He estimated that Eastland county has lost 7,257 people since the war started and that many of those people are coming back home when the war is over. Emphasizing the necessity of unity among the citizens for what ever plans may be developed, he pointed out accomplishments that have been achieved by other small towns in Texas who have already developed projects that will aid in taking care of the returning people.

ORIGINAL BRIDGEHEAD'S SIZE DOUBLED AS GUARDED REPORTS SAID MANY TOWNS CAPTURED

The American First Army hurled powerful forces through a solid bridgehead extending more than four miles beyond the Rhine into the German hinterland today and Berlin admitted the Americans had captured intact the vital Ludendorff bridge at Remagen. The Nazis reported that the Americans had reached the town of Linz on the east bank two miles from Remagen, between Cologne and Coblenz. Front dispatches indicated that they were meeting only extremely light resistance from the Germans. Heavily censored field dispatches revealed that the original size of the bridgehead had been doubled and that numerous German towns and villages had been captured. A Nazi broadcast admitted that the Ludendorff bridge had been left undestroyed "accidentally." The Third Army was pushing steadily northward along the Rhine toward a junction with First Army troops at Bonn. A German military spokesman said that Patton's troops were already storming the Rhine stronghold of Coblenz. Powerful units of the Third Army were loose on the west bank of the Rhine only 10 miles south of Linz and it was indicated that old "blood and guts" would not be far behind the First Army. In the north, the German pocket on the west bank of the Rhine was slowly caving in under pressure of the American Ninth and Canadian First Armies. On the eastern front, Nazi broadcasts reported that the Russians were fighting in the streets of Kussurin and had spearheaded three miles west of the Oder to Rathenow. The broadcasts said the Russians had been forced back from Seelow, 10 miles beyond the Oder. In Pomerania, the Red Army was reported to have captured Lubchin, six miles northeast of Stettin and Kolow seven miles to the southeast. In the Pacific, the Japanese reported today that a big American invasion fleet was off Zamboanga and had attempted a landing. The attempted landing, it was claimed, "had failed."

Demonstration On Orchards To Be On March 16

On March 16, at 10 o'clock at Doss Alexander's place located on the Rising Star-Pioneer Highway an orchard demonstration will be held. C. E. Heaton, horticulturist of A and M College and Paul Gregg, entomologist, will be present to discuss orchard program in general with interested orchardists. Orchard pruning and spraying will be demonstrated. Those attending will have an opportunity to observe a cover crop of hairy vetch and rye, one part of which has been fertilized with superphosphate and the other unfertilized. This should be helpful to all interested in orchards.

Bread Upon Water Cast In Form Of Free Meals, Cigs

DALLAS, Tex. (UP)—Charlie Mitchell is a firm believer in the Christian principle that bread cast upon the waters will return. And the doesn't care whether it's returned in this life or the next. He read Charlie is casting up on the water takes the form of free meals and free cigarettes to transient servicemen who wander into his tiny Underpass Cafe near Dallas' Union Terminal. A sign in the cafe window reads thusly: "If you are short of change, come in and eat. If you are short of face, Charlie will give it to you. On duty 7 a. m. to 7 p. m. Memories will never die." The sign may be taken at its face value, for since the war began Mitchell and his wife have fed more than 175,000 soldiers, sailors and Marines and have given away some 11,000 New Testaments. On last Christmas Eve and Christmas Day he fed 225 turkey dinners and passed out 24 cartons of cigarettes, carefully hoarded out of his small supply. Part of the bread has already been returned and Charlie says that's enough even if he never gets any more. More than 15,000 letters have been received from servicemen he has befriended and those are treasured as the "return." Many of his civilian friends, and servicemen, too, ask how he can afford to do it, and stay in business. To that, Charlie answers: "I'm not after money. Long as I pay my bills I'm satisfied. I still can pay the bills, and my business, it's good."

When he called to appear for work, H. S. Packwood and Raymond West went to the home to see what the trouble was and it was they who discovered what had happened. Doctors estimated that he had died about 10:00 o'clock last night. Mr. Hooks had been employed by the Lone Star Gas company for several years and had made his home in Ranger. The body is at Killingsworth's Funeral Home pending completion of plans for services.

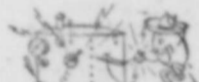
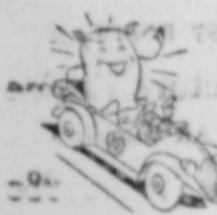
