

Roping Contest At Arena Sunday

A Sunday afternoon of calf roping will be held October 8th at Dimmitt Rodeo Arena, sponsored by the Dimmitt Rodeo Association. This is a unique type of competition, just being adopted by amateur rodeo circles in the south west. While fairly common among some professional rodeo circuits, this is the first such competition in the High Plains area.

The show is strictly roping and tying. In the individual contest, each man is allowed to rope four calves and his four-calf average is considered with other contestants in selecting the winner. In team roping, the lead rider ropes the steer around the neck and his partner has the job of roping the steer's hind legs. Winner is selected on the basis of four-steer average times.

The show begins at 2 p. m. and will last two or three hours, according to Rodeo Association president Herb Mayfield. Admission to the public will be \$1.00 for adults and 50 cents for children.

Jack Howell is expected to do the announcing and the stock is furnished by Ratjen Bros. of Happy.

The flames were contained mostly in the rear of the shop but all merchandise in the front was heavily smoke damaged. Raney is currently conducting a fire sale.

Large Crowds Expected for High School Homecoming

Between three and four hundred people have indicated their intention to attend the annual Ex-Student's Association reunion this weekend at Dimmitt High School, according to a statement by Mrs. Declmae Cluck, secretary.

"We have been pleasantly surprised by the fine response we have had," she said. "We will apparently have people here from Oklahoma, Illinois, Missouri and other far-off states, not to mention all parts of Texas."

Considering the effort that has gone into this homecoming, it will probably be one of the largest ever held.

The pep rally and school activities which were to tie to the homecoming have been cancelled due to the death Wednesday night of Harold Golden, a junior student. However the homecoming activities Saturday will go on as planned, Mrs. Cluck emphasized.

Awards have been arranged to be presented as part of the simple program Saturday morning. There will be recognition of the person traveling the greatest distance, the earliest graduate present, the parents having the most students graduate from Dimmitt High School and the person who taught the earliest of those present.

Honor classes for this year will be 1931, 1941, and 1951.

Probably the biggest change in this year's homecoming will be its sponsorship by the brand new Dimmitt Ex-Students Association. Instead of Friday being the big day as in the past, Saturday, registration of ex-students will be held in the Grade School Cafeteria and at 12:30 a barbecue lunch will be served. At 2 p. m. there will be the special recognition of guests and a business meeting including organizational reports and an election of officers for 1962. Following this there will be a general get-together for the individual graduating classes. Tickets for the barbecue may be purchased at the time of registration and a nursery will be provided for a small fee.

Harold Henry Golden, 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Ward Golden of Dimmitt, died instantly at about 11:30 Wednesday night when the car he was driving struck a concrete culvert just west of the Swisher County line.

Investigating officers at the scene of the accident were unable Wednesday night to determine exactly what happened next, but the car apparently rolled and slid before coming to a halt on down the road in a ditch and pointed back toward Tulla.

Chuck Youts, son of Mrs. Glen Youts, escaped serious injury in the accident. He was riding with young Golden on the right side of the car and later told friends he did not remember anything that happened during the accident, only that he found himself standing beside the wreck when it was over.

From indications at the scene Harold was thrown through the windshield and over a fence. The engine of the brand new Chevrolet automobile was lying close by. It was his first day of ownership of the new car and it had only eighty eight miles on the odometer. Why the car got out of control and left the pavement is speculative. He had pulled over into the left lane to pass another car carrying some friends when the accident occurred. Services will be conducted by Rev. M. A. Eligible voters of the Dimmitt Independent School District will go to the polls in the Home Economics Room of the High School here Saturday to decide whether or not a new High School building will be constructed.

Voting time is from 8 a. m. to 7 p. m.

This is the biggest bond election to ever face the voters of the District. The \$1,200,000 election is proposed to pay for rebuilding of the present high school, purchase of additional land and construction of the new high school building.

Here is a sample of the ballot to be used:

Obviously this ballot needs a little explaining. It tells the voter little or nothing about what he is voting on.

To begin with, to approve the bond issue, the "against" portions of both propositions must be scratched out.

The first proposition, concerning the maintenance tax, is as important as the actual issue proposition. This actually means a different breakdown of the tax dollar so more of it can be spent on bond retirement. At present property can be taxed \$1.50 per \$100 assessed evaluation. Of this \$1.50, \$1.00 is used by schools for maintenance and other operational purposes and 50 cents may go to retire bonds. These figures are set by law. Since for all practical purposes, only one third of tax revenues can go to retire bonded indebtedness, if taxes were increased enough to pay for new construction a vast amount of maintenance money would be brought in—much more, in fact, than is needed consequently, by revising the way the tax dollar is cut loans can be obtained for shorter periods, thereby cutting interest costs and permitting the school business agencies to operate on a more realistic basis. This, then, is the decision to be made in the first proposition. Whether or not to break up the tax dollar in a more realistic manner.

To pay for the new facilities, school tax evaluation would have to be raised from the present \$18 million to about 25 million. Without the passage of the first proposition, the evaluation would have to be raised even higher, bringing in more money than the school can use for maintenance but just barely enough to cover interest and principal payments.

More than 80 percent of the schools in Texas have adopted SB 116, since its enactment by the State Legislature in 1955. The following neighboring schools have voted for its adoption: Hereford, Canyon, Amarillo, Plainview, Muleshoe, Olton, Abernathy and Bovina.

The second proposition, although it won't say so on the ballot, is one concerning the new school building.

In brief, the new high school building would be located in West Dimmitt on Circle Drive just south of the new Presbyterian manse. It would contain 76,000 feet and the building and equipment would cost an estimated \$700,000 to \$800,000, subject to bids. To be paid for with twenty-year bonds, the school would house an auditorium, gymnasium, business offices, vocational shop, classrooms, band, science, homemaking, and commercial departments, library, cafeteria, and administrative offices. School officials have pointed to the growing enrollment, crowded conditions and deterioration of some campus buildings as the paramount reasons for calling the election. A full reprint of a recent statement of the board is on page -- of this issue.

Grand Jury Indicts Man For Assault

Laurence Calfy, 19, was indicted Monday at a grand jury hearing for rape.

He was identified by a Dimmitt farm wife as the man who stopped her on a lonely farm road just a short way from her home on the night of September 11th, and robbed and criminally assaulted her.

According to Sheriff Jack Cartwright, Calfy and a companion, 16-year-old Larry Loyd saw her pull into a local service station for gasoline, presumed from the bowling shirt hanging in the back of the car that she was a transient, and followed her with robbery as the motive. However, when she turned off the highway they continued following her and although she speeded up somewhat they passed her and blocked the road. When she was forced to stop Calfy reportedly managed to run his hand through the small opening at the top of her car window and grab her by the hair, jerking her head against the door and stunning her. He then allegedly managed to open the car door and robbed and assaulted her over the protests of Loyd. Loyd had reportedly agreed to the robbery but not to the assault.

The woman, who has been under sedative much of the time since then, was returning home after an evening of bowling here.

Calfy, who is a native of Oklahoma but is presently from Friona, reportedly tried to make two women from Clovis stop between Hereford and Canyon later that night. They reported him and he was caught later returning from Amarillo.

Dimmitt School System has Half a Century of Growth

The following history of the first school in Dimmitt from 1910-1920 has been furnished by Mrs. Ester Noble with the help of some of the older settlers.

The J. W. Carter family was the first in Castro County, coming here about 1884. Followed by the J. E. Turner family, W. B. Beach, the Dyers and W. A. Tate families, coming from 1890 to 1892. These came others very soon, but these families were the very earliest that still have members living in or near Dimmitt.

The first school they tell me was a private school the Carters had for their children. The next schools were subscription schools before the county was organized in 1892 and public schools were started. Up until the year 1904 only eight grades were taught. In 1905 the 9th was added. Then there were no graduation exercises as we have them today, but some of the old settlers tell me, they at least finished all that was offered in the eighth or ninth grade. Each year a "Close of school program" was given by the whole school consisting of plays, dialogues, songs recitations and etc. and usually a picnic, fish fry or some form of entertainment.

Some of the pupils of the first school still living are: Mrs. Jennie Carter Tate, now of Thermopolis,

Wyo., Mrs. Maggie Turner Gollehon, Dimmitt, Mrs. Stella Turner Burch, Dimmitt, Mr. Tom Tate of Dimmitt, Mr. Pres Dyer of Dimmitt.

Also Mrs. Ida Beach Bennett, of Hereford, Mr. Malcom Beach of Hereford, Mrs. Willie Dyer Gilliland, Hereford, and John Flanagan, Ft. Worth.

In 1910 the 10th grade was added, and the first graduation exercise on the same order as we have today was held in May of 1910 with four graduates. These were Roy Shepherd, Dora Shepherd, John Turner, Ralph Stapleton.

Saturday is the big day for citizens interested in the coming school bond election. It is our hope that many are interested and will not out to vote.

No one ever thanks the school board for the work they do or the possibilities they assume. Sometimes it can be the most unpopular service post a man can hold. I school board members are always cognizant of the feeling of the payers. Whether they recognize or not, the board members face certain amount of public opinion any time they take a position. There are always people to whom the school board can explain their situation.

For these and other reasons, we see a large turnout of voters will be Saturday. The board would undoubtedly appreciate a vote of confidence by a large percentage of voters. It would make their work easier if the issuance is approved by fifty or seventy percent of the voters instead of five or ten percent.

There has been virtually no opposition to the bond election come our attention, a situation for which we are thankful. We believe there has been a general recognition of the necessity for the new school building and it has been speeded. It is not our contention that the school board or any other service group should be given a blank check by the taxpayers but the voters should acquiesce because that's what the board is. But when an intelligent appraisal of the problem is made and public accepts this appraisal votes to take the proper steps, feel this is an example of where democratic process can really be its mark.

There was a time, right after World War II when the availability of surplus buildings looked like the temporary answer to all building problems. It had five or six years since any public buildings had been constructed and with the return of GI's their expanded families some problems developed here and there.

County and school officials hustled around buying old barracks and barracks and ends of army post dumps to take care of their temporary needs until something more permanent could be constructed.

Today—about fifteen years later—our school classes are in these wooden buildings and are using a hospital from the same era. At one time they looked like the perfect answer to the need for public space but now they are as immobile stumbling blocks to progress. It is possible without these buildings we'd already have a new high school and hospital. This is pure speculation, but it's not particularly far-fetched.

Someone who has not had a chance to make some coin to the relief of the victims may do during the Castro County campaign of the Salvation Army. 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Governor Says Drivers Training Reducing Accidents

Climaxing the third annual Texas School Traffic Safety Week, Governor Price Daniel said Friday that new figures from the Texas Department of Public Safety and the Texas Education Agency indicated "major progress in reducing involvement in fatal traffic crashes through the steady expansion of drivers education classes in Texas public schools."

The Governor said: "The Texas Education Agency reports that 184,937 Texas public school students passed driver education courses in the four years between 1957 and 1960. During that same period of time, the Department of Public Safety reports that 2,384 Texas drivers between the ages of 15 and 24, the high school and college age-group, were involved in fatal highway crashes.

"Since 1957, when our present Statewide traffic safety crusade began, a total of 285,028 students have completed full driver education courses, and increase of 80,951 or 41.3 per cent, over the preceding four-year period.

"During the last four years," the Governor continued, "the Department of Public Safety reports that 1,888 drivers between the ages of 15 and 24 have been involved in fatal highway crashes, a reduction of 49, or about 2.6 per cent, over the preceding four years. Thus as the number of high school students passing approved driver education courses increased, the number of 15 to 24 year old drivers involved in fatal crashes has come down.

"I stated another way," the Governor added, "we find that during the 1957-58 period, for every 1,000 students completing the approved driver education course, about 72 drivers in the 15-24 age-group were involved in fatal highway collisions. The Governor said that "driver education in the public schools has become the No. 1 priority in our Statewide traffic safety program for the past four years, and we have proposed only that the State provide at least part of the driver education instructors' salaries in order to help local school districts finance the cost of the program. This cost has been a deterrent to legislative approval, although it is really the same person's pocketbook. I proposed only \$80,000 for the first year and \$1,200,000 for the second year as a start. This money would be available only to those school districts which chose to offer driver education and which have reached a standard approval course."

The Governor concluded that "there have been those who questioned the ability of the Texas public schools to teach an adequate course in driver education, although many other States have been doing so for years. We now have some statistics which seem to offer definite basis for our belief that driver education courses make better drivers."

"These reports to be ample reason for retaining driver education in the No. 1 priority position in our Statewide traffic safety program," the Governor concluded. "Since nobody has suggested any better way for handling the annual influx of untrained, untrained and inexperienced young drivers into the Texas traffic stream. This statistical study seems to provide irrefutable evidence that trained young Texas drivers are safer drivers than those who know nothing of the art and skills of driving an automobile in today's Texas traffic stream. When our trained young drivers show a trend toward avoiding costly, wasteful and tragic highway crashes, it seems clear that they have also learned to be better and safer drivers."

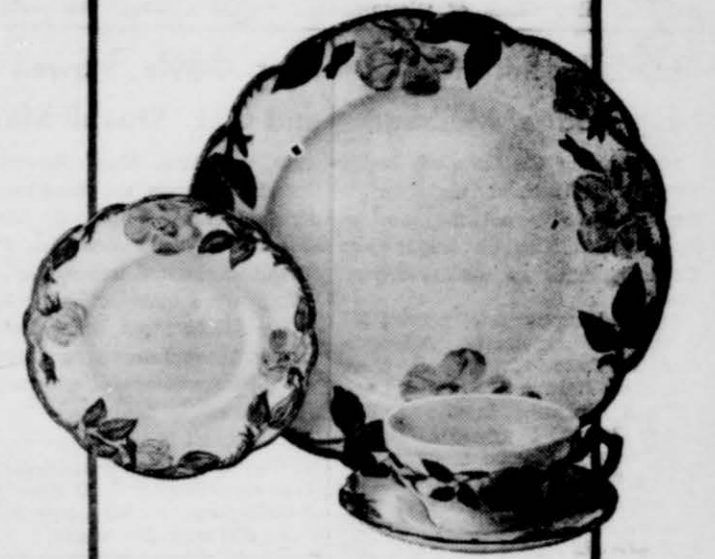
