CLEVELAND (UP) The nation's hemistry laboratories will be a woman's workshop for the next ve years, according to Dr. Marion Cleaveland, assistant chemis-ry professor at Western Reserve

University here.

Dr. Cleaveland emphasized that he men who normally would be in raining for chemitsry careers are ow in the armed forces and it will e five years before enough men an be trained to replace women who have stepped into their places incet he war started.

The field of patent research is the widest now open to women chemistry majors, Dr. Cleaveland said and she urged women stu-dents to consider this type of work eriously because this field is apt o remain open to women for a onger period of time.



Edson of Census figures are available—was 50,120,000. This is lower than total employment in the U.S. has been at any time since February, 1942, three months after Pearl Harbor. It is nearly five million less workers than were employed at the peak in July, 1943, from which date employment has been steadily declining.

MOST people, reading the news from both Pacific and European fronts, are blinded by the news on the front page and never get back into the paper to the home front news where it tells about the battle of production.

battle of production.

When more curious souls start looking for reasons why the number of working people has declined in the past year and a half, they find some strange things going on.

The number of people employed in munitions industries has also declined by 1,200,000 workers, according to Bureau of Labor Statistics figurea. Requirements are still rated by the War Manpower Commission as 600,000 workers needed for munitions industries by July 1.

Right alongside the requirements figure it should be noted that unemployment has gone up. Laugh that one off. From the wartime low of 630,000 in August, 1944, total unemployment today is estimated at 840,000, a rise of 210,000. If the unemployed could be shifted to take the 600,000 jobs in war industries that are now going begging, every-thing would be dandy.

THE armed services say they still need 900,000 men—600,000 for the Army and 300,000 for the Navy. What isn't fully appreciated about this demand is that it is not entirely to increase the size of the Army and Navy, but to replace casualities and discharges so, as to keep the services built up to their authorized strength.




