## Munich, Last Nazi Stronghold, Revolts

### PETER EDSON REPORTS ON CONFERENCE

SAN FRANCISCO, April 27—At nearly every press conference held thus far in connection with this United Nations love feast, some screwball pops up with a track question that near weeks the proceedings.

Of course these press conferences aren't like any press conferences that were ever held before. In addition to a couple hundred honest to gosh working news people, an equal number of lobbyists add the idle curious drift in, making the whole affair a fantastic mob scene from some bad dream.

At Foreign Secretary V. M. Molotov's first interview in San Francisco, one of the few he has ever given, a Broadway smart aleck columnist bobbed up to ask the distinguished leader of the Soviet delegation whether he pronounced it "wodka" or "wodka".

Now this would undoubtedly rate as a cute trick in a night club in New York or Hollywood, but at a United Nations conference the gag fell flat as one of the corniest cracks ever uttered. Obviously annoyed, Molotov broke off the interview, with a number of other more important questions left unasked.

Kind of monkey business the American press and the silly questions come from this country. It was a Canadian, an ex-member of Parliament named G. J. Carriek, of Ottawa, who threw the monkey wrench at the British deputy prime minister, Clement Attlee's, press conference earlier in the week. Noting a line in a biographical sketch put out by the British Ministry of Information, stating that Attlee had been influenced by the views of John Ruskin, this Carriek got up and asked Attlee his present opinion of a quote from Ruskin which began, "When I tell you that war is the foundation of all arts, I mean also it is the foundation of all the high virtues."

MAGDEBURG (UP)—Adolf Hitler will kill himself or be killed in Berlin within a few hours or days and the war will end, Lt. Gen. Kurt Dittmar, German high command spokesman, said in his final war commentary.

### Pressure On OPA

WASHINGTON (UP)—A group of Senators cracked the whip over OPA again today. They demanded ever more subsidies for the meat industry.

Chairman Elmer Thomas, D., Oklahoma of the Senate food investigating com., threatened to seek amendments to the price control extension bill if OPA does not act immediately. Thomas said he might even go after a few OPA heads.

### RANGER MARINE DEFIES FIRE TO SAVE BUDDY

IWO JIMA (Delayed)—Marine Private First Class Charles Jones 20, of Ranger, Texas, was wounded as he defied enemy fire to rescue a companion who had fallen in an enemy machine gun fire trap.

Jones was a member of a machine gun platoon which was supporting a company drive through a shallow ravine on the left flank of the island. Marine tanks moved with the infantry and blasted the strong enemy pillboxes which dotted the sides of the ravine. The Japs soon stopped the Marine advance with an intense mortar barrage.

Members of the Marine machine gun section, however, crept up the side of the draw to give the company flanking fire protection in case of an enemy counter-attack. During the movement, Jones' group leader was caught in an enemy fire path and fell wounded. Enemy bullets were flying over his head, and Jones waited until the Jap stopped firing then dashed into the lane to remove his companion. Another machine gun burst caught Jones, but he moved from the danger zone before he fell.

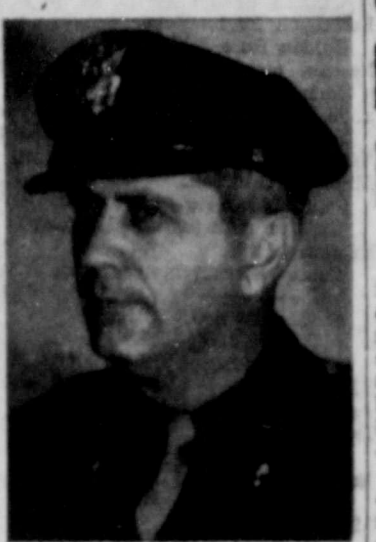
### Rumor About 4th Year English Is Denied By Supt.

### CAPTIVE NAVY MAN RELEASED BY AMERICANS

The anxiety which Mr. and Mrs. Railey E. Miller of Route 3, Ranger have felt for almost three years for their son, Lloyd Edgar Miller, seaman second class, was eased Saturday when they were notified by the war department that he has been liberated by the American forces in Germany.

Late in 1942 Seaman Miller was captured by the crew of a German submarine after the ship on which he was serving was sunk. About two months after his capture they received a letter from him telling them of his needs which were mostly clothing and toilet articles and asking that everyone write to him as he could only "write two letters and two postcards each month but I can sure read", he wrote.

The telegram Saturday stated that the seaman was in good physical condition and it was expected that he would communicate with his parents in the very near future.

Last rites for Mrs. Minnie Ann High were said Saturday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock at the First Christian Church with Rev. H. B. Johnson, assisted by Rev. Otha Anderson, in charge of the services. Interment was in the Evergreen cemetery with Morris Furgal Home in charge of arrangements.

Mrs. High who died Thursday evening at her home had been a resident of Ranger for the past 25 years. She was born at Myrtle Springs on March 29, 1872 and had been a member of the Church of Christ there.

### GERMANS MAKE LAST STAND FOR BERLIN; FLEE RUSSIANS

Revolt broke out in the chief remaining Nazi stronghold of Munich today as Russian troops stormed into the Tiergarten, last ditch stand of thralldom Germans in Berlin.

The German high command admitted today that Russian siege forces had slashed to the Harndenburg Gate and Alexanderplatz in the heart of Berlin.

Moscow dispatches said the suicide garrison of the raised capital virtually had been wiped out with the killing or capture of 13,500 Nazi troops yesterday. Only relatively small units of fanatical Elite Guards and Volksturm were said to have remained to fight the last hours of the nearly ended battle.

American forces closing in on Munich heard an appeal from the city's radio station for quick help to overcome the Nazi command in and around the city. The London Radio said Nazi authorities in Bavaria admitted the uprising but claimed it had been put down.

The Defense of the Nazi southern rebout in Bavaria, Austria and Italy was falling completely apart. The American Third and Seventh armies converging on Munich took an estimated 55,000 first line enemy troops yesterday and swarms of two others were scattering in confusion into the Bavarian mountains.

### San Francisco Conference Work Is Speeded Up

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—The United Nations conference, now directed officially by a super council of Big Four foreign ministers speeded up its schedule today with two plenary sessions, morning and afternoon.

The question of inviting Argentina to the conference was believed to dominate close discussions between Russian and Latin American delegates here.

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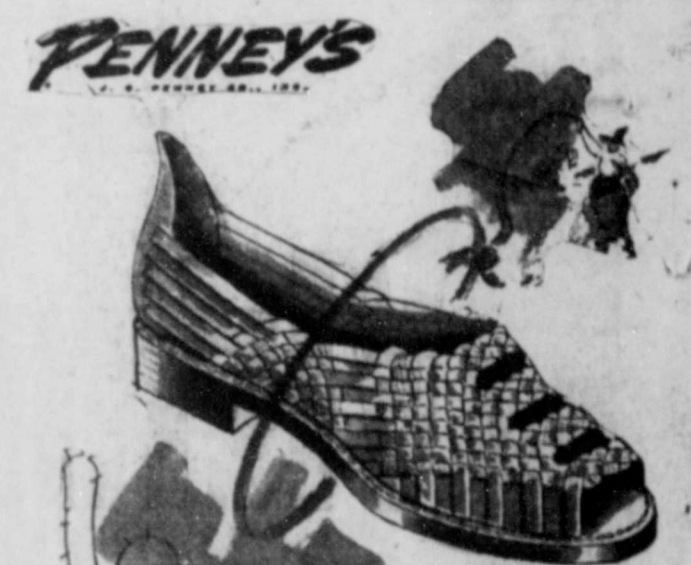
