Hart Man Hurt In Farm Mishap

Lawrence McLain, 33-year-old Hart farmer, remained in critical condition in a Lubbock hospital late Wednesday as the result of injuries suffered in a truck accident Tuesday night on the Murrell Pickrell farm, five and one-half miles north of Hart.

A report Wednesday evening revealed that McLain is in danger of hemorrhaging after suffering a broken pelvis and other internal injuries. He has been given emergency treatment and remains under close medical attention.

McLain was injured at about 7 p.m. when the right rear wheel of a truck loaded with 1,600 pounds of milo rolled over his body. The victim was in a truck driven by Pickrell just before the accident occurred. The truck licks failed and McLain, thinking the truck had come to a stop, stepped out and was pinned underneath the right rear wheel.

Pickrell stopped immediately, got his station wagon and took McLain to an Olton hospital. He was later taken to Lubbock by ambulance.

Grain Storage Shortage Eased by 50 More Cars

The arrival of 50 rail cars in Dimmitt Monday assured county elevator operators of relief from the present grain storage overload and solved the car shortage at least until the latter part of this week when more cars are due in.

Local depot agent Al Williams indicated that present available

cars will hold operators until more arrive this weekend. Williams said sufficient cars will be brought in this time to supply needs.

To date 230 carloads of milo have been shipped out and 800 more carloads are piled on the ground awaiting shipment. Williams believes that 1,800 carloads will be shipped by the end of harvest.

A check with the local ASC office shows that just over 400 grain sorghum loans had been processed as of Wednesday. ASC Secretary Doyle Thomas says between 3,000 and 4,000 loans will be written out this year compared to 2,600 last year.

The cotton picture in Castro

county changed again this week, too, with the disclosure that total bales are now listed at 4,360. This figure is based on a check with gin as of Wednesday afternoon.

Sufficient pullers are available to cotton growers. However, a housing shortage exists for workers and must be solved before

more pullers can be recruited. Mechanical boll pullers will be put in operation within two weeks to step up production and in order that fields might be stripped.

Cotton and grain market prices remained the same this week—32 cents per pound on cotton and \$1.45 per cwt.

Fire Destroys Feed Bundles

Some 1,000 bundles of feed on the Bob Ott farm, four and one-half miles north of Dimmitt, were destroyed by fire just before noon Friday, according to a report from local Fire Department Chief J. B. Moore.

Moore said his crew answered the call about 11:30 a.m. and with the aid of water pumped from a nearby irrigation ditch managed to extinguish the fire before all of the feed was destroyed. The job of getting the fire out required about two and one-half hours.

Exact origin of the fire was not known. However, Moore said the feed had been stacked recently and that sun bearing down on the moist feed likely caused it to ignite.

Another fire Wednesday night, Oct. 19, damaged the roof and kitchen of Mrs. A. L. Aven's newly-built home in Hart. This fire started in a clothes dryer in the utility room of the house and was caused by a faulty vent that failed to extend all the way through the roof of the home.

Moore said the Aven fire was the third such fire this year and could be directly traced to faulty vents. He urges all dryer owners to check their vents and make sure they extend through the roof instead of just into the attic. This is a fire menace that can be avoided, Moore points out.

150 Inspect New Telephone Plant

Some 150 persons turned out for the open house observance dedicating the new telephone company building and facilities here Tuesday night.

The event was termed a big success and was especially gratifying to the owner, T. A. Singer and his staff.

Mrs. Grace Radloff, chief operator, directed visitors through the switchboard room and explained the workings of this department. Elton and Robert Singer, sons of the owner, explained the inside plant to visitors, demonstrating and pointing out the various functions and operation of equipment.

The new plant, completed only recently, is one of the most modern and up to date in the Fandhandle.

Several persons were proud recipients of valuable prizes given away at the event.

Uranium Strike Stirs Interest

What appears to be a definite uranium strike may prove to be a bonanza for John E. Lilley, Hart farmer, and his cousin, Jack Franks, New Mexico rancher.

Lilley, an amateur geologist, visited the News office this week to tell an unusual and interesting story—a story unlike the old prospector who spent most of his life in a desperate and futile search for gold but rather one of sudden good fortune.

Lilley made a trip to his cousin's ranch a year ago to buy a horse. He not only got the horse he was looking for, but he also discovered uranium. The Hart farmer noticed a number of green-looking rocks and with his limited knowledge of geology set to work to determine whether or not uranium was on the ranch. He tested with a model 111B scintillator, discovered a granitic formation and staked four 20.6 acre claims on a 20,000 acre spread in the Lake Valley mining district. The claim tests about .45 of one percent uranium.

Lilley said Tuesday that "we are going to core drill to determine the extent of the formation. The formation is of the pitchblende and quartz type."

Of course it's too early to determine the true value of the discovery, but Lilley thinks "if our luck is good, it will be a welcome change."

Hart To Clash With Whitharral

Coach Paul Boswell's Hart Longhorns, showing decided improvement, mustered their best scoring punch to date as they registered two touchdowns against the Bovina Mustangs Friday night. It wasn't enough, though, as the Bovina eleven went on to win 33-12.

The Mustangs scored twice in the first, once in the second and twice in the third. The Longhorns racked up touchdowns in the third when Johnny Hindman went around end for six points and Elliott scoring for the evening when Quarterback Eddie Savage made a brilliant 33-yard run for another six points. Both Hart conversions failed while Bovina made good three of its five tries for extra points.

The loss marked Hart's fourth conference setback. They play Whitharral Friday night on the home field in another District 3-B encounter. The Panthers' biggest threat is in the person of C. Stephenson, fastest player in the backfield. Despite their loss to Plains last Friday night (55-26), Stephenson sprinted 82 yards for a score and is a fast breakaway runner.

The contest will be played on Longhorn field starting at 8 p.m.

Bobcats Prep For Littlefield After Being Upset By Lockney Club 21-20

In what must rank as a major upset in schoolboy football over the weekend, the surprising Lockney Longhorns downed the Dimmitt Bobcats by the slim margin of an extra point, the final count being 21-20. The difference in the score came in the final quarter after the Longhorns had scored to tie the game up and Halfback Weldon Jones covered the ball in the end zone when Freshman Fullback Kenneth Calloway fumbled the ball on the try for extra point.

Although the District 2-AA opener backfired for Coach Leo Fildes' favored Bobcats, they have a good chance of evening the record up this Friday night when they journey to Littlefield to take on Coach Gene Mayfield's Wildcats. This game will probably be rated as a tossup. However, on the basis of the Wildcats' impressive 20-6 victory over winless Tulia coupled with the fact that they have won only two games this season, the Dimmitt eleven has an excellent chance to make their second conference encounter successful.

Mayfield has revamped his lineup in an effort to snap out of the doldrums. In the quarterback spot now is Wayne Wicker, who was converted to that position from an end post. Wicker, a 165-pound senior, runs the T-formation Wildcats smoothly on option plays. One of Littlefield's best ground gainers is an option play where Wicker pitches out to Halfback Mike Greer and Greer usually goes through the hole for five or six yards. Other backfield standouts are James Pressley, Jimmy McSehan and Max Morris. John Clayton is the Wildcat extra point specialist and will bear watching as this tilt could also be decided by the narrow margin of an extra point.

The Bobcats came out of the Lockney game bruised and shaken up but otherwise uninjured. Coaches Fildes and Fuquay have drilled the Dimmitt crew on favorite Wildcat plays and have also scouted the enemy. They

"East Texas is getting West Texas' cotton. Their method?—they've hollered a little longer and louder than us." This was the sum and substance of a talk given by Castro County Chamber of Commerce Manager Glen Youts at the address Dimmitt Lions at their regular weekly meeting Tuesday.

Youts pointed out that "they (state ASC committee) are taking 216,000 of our acres and are giving it to ten-acre East Texas farmers. Actually West Texas is losing 315,000 acres of cotton land."

Youts stated that West Texas Chamber of Commerce is leading a good fight to regain this acreage, but need help. He suggested that "we all should write our state committee and other high officials and openly protest this act." He singled out the fact that a number of East Texas counties will have more cotton acreage next year than they had in the last uncontrolled year—1953. On the other hand Castro county had 114,000 acres seeded to cotton in 1953 and next year will be cut to 51,000 acres. "We should pick up 6,400 acres according to the trend basis, but instead receive a cut," Youts exclaimed.

State Officer To Speak Here

State American Legion Commander Charles L. Downey of Pleasanton will be the featured speaker at a Legion dinner here Thursday night, November 3. The dinner will climax a membership drive by the local organization, which started in early October.

Downey will give his address immediately following the dinner to be served in the Dimmitt School cafeteria by the local Auxiliary at 8 p.m. He is described as a forceful and dynamic speaker and has been a Legionnaire for many years. Also making the visit here with Commander Downey is Dowe Stevens, 18th District Legion Commander.

The local Legion membership now is listed at 76 with a goal of 110.

Dimmitt is one of four North Texas cities on Commander Downey's four itinerary for this year.

In conclusion, Youts stated, "If we lose this cotton, we will lose part of our living. We are hurt and hurt bad and have got to try to do something about it."

DHIA Work Helps Improve Dairy Herds In Texas
COLLEGE STATION, Oct. 27. Dairy herd improvement associations have been operating in Texas since 1927 and have done much to improve both milk and butterfat production in the herds which have participated. R. E. Burleson and A. M. Meek, extension dairy husbandmen, recently released an 18-year summary which shows the progress made in Texas. In 1937, 2,171 cows were tested and the average production per cow was 2,529 pounds of milk and 267 pounds of butterfat. The 1954 figures show that 9,963 cows on test with production averages of 7,262 pounds of milk and 315 pounds of butterfat. An increase of 7,732 cows on test but more important was the increase of 1,751 pounds per cow in milk production and the 88 pound increase in butterfat. The average production for all cows milked in Texas stands at the low figure of 3,600 pounds of milk and 140 pounds of butterfat, say the dairymen. The oldest association from the standpoint of continuous operation is the Hopkins county group which was organized in October 1936. It has grown from 92 cows to 462 cows; milk production has increased 1,189 pounds per cow and butterfat by 67 pounds per cow.

OBSERVE YOUR LAYING FLOCK

Now that egg prices are higher, it is discouraging to wake up some morning and find that some disease has hit your laying flock. Several flock owners in the county are experiencing this discouraging situation. Fowl pox, blue comb and chronic respiratory disease seems to be making the rounds, so be on the alert and be ready to do something if one of these diseases hits your flock.

Mr. Bill Heston of Nazareth was in this week to pick up several sacks of Check-R-Aid to feed his flock. He stated they had a light cold and wanted to head off any serious trouble. Check-R-Aid is fortified with health-promoting vitamins and antibiotics and is a ready-to-feed flock conditioner. We also have Check-R-Mycin to put in the drinking water in case a respiratory disease hits your flock. We hope you don't have any trouble with your poultry, but if you do, we want to help in any way possible.

DOES FERTILIZER HELP COTTON?

A lot of various types of fertilizer were used on cotton this year and if the farmers that used this fertilizer would like to see some close checking, we can come to some conclusion to the best kind and amount of fertilizer that is practical to use. We know that basically we are fighting growing season instead of soil fertility. However, if phosphate plus a little nitrogen will hasten maturity then we may be on the right track by using common salt fertilizer on cotton.

If you fertilized cotton, please come by and let us know whether you used cotton chowder to make them a top laying ration. Three hundred pounds of your mix ground and mixed with 100 pounds of chowder will give you an 18 percent protein ration that will give good results. If you are not satisfied with your present ration, drop by and talk with us. We think we can save you some money.

SEEDING RATE

This is an usual time of year to be thinking about seeding rates of milo. However, in talking with farmers it seems that

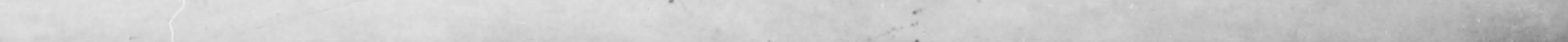

'56 Allotments And Quotas Proclaimed For Upland Cotton

COLLEGE STATION, Oct. 27.—A national marketing quota of 10 million bales and a national acreage allotment of 17,391,304 acres for the 1956 crop of upland cotton has been proclaimed by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson.

Announced at the same time was the date for a referendum, December 13, on cotton marketing quotas for both upland and extra long staple cotton. The quota for extra long staple cotton was set at 35,300 bales and the acreage allotment at 45,305 acres for the 1956 crop. At least two-thirds of the cotton farmers voting in the referendum must approve marketing quotas if they are to be effective. Last year 92 percent of the voting upland growers approved marketing quotas and 92.8 percent of the voting extra long staple growers favored quotas.

The marketing quotas and acreage allotments for both types of cotton are the minimum provided by law. The national acreage allotment is the acreage required, based on averages for the last

Highlights and Sidelights FROM Your State CAPITOL

Speculation is running high that both Gov. Allan Shivers and U. S. Senator Lyndon B. Johnson will have leading roles in the selection of the next Democratic presidential nominee.

Both have denied participation in any movement for a Southern coalition to block re-nomination of Adlai Stevenson.

Johnson denies that he is heading up a coalition. Nomination is up to the delegates, he said and he will support whoever wins out. And, he is not a "conservative," the senator stressed, but a "moderate."

Johnston, before his heart attack last summer, was considered a likely future contender for presidential nomination. Some believe, however, that his health sufficiently, he again will enter the picture.

Gov. Shivers, at the same time, took a slightly different approach. He said he will vote for the presidential candidate "I think is best suited for the future of my county, and I hope the Democrats can produce that man." He also said he knew nothing of a drive for Southern control.

DAC vs DSE

Texas has two Democratic organization drives, highly competitive, under way. Selection of Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey as a harmonious choice for Democratic State Committeeman has not reduced the competition.

Leaders of the Texas Democratic Advisory Council, set up by Speaker Sam Rayburn, say they plan to carry on organizational and money-raising efforts. This liberal group, organized to "carry on the functions of national committeemen" during the years Wright Morrow was barred from the seat, has raised more

the past four years for the national party. It now is busy organizing for control of presidential conventions next year.

On the other side of the picture is the Democratic State Executive Committee, conservative protection Shivers organization DSE also is carrying on organizational and money-raising efforts and has no intention of stopping, according to State Chairman George W. Sandlin.

A DAC meeting is scheduled for Nov. 4, to select a leader to replace Navarro County Judge Jim Sewell.

Outside observers have suggested a connection between the resignation of Sewell from the liberal group and the ousting by conservatives of Wright Morrow. It is part of an over-all effort, they hint, to rid both groups of extreme left and right-wingers and merge Democratic party factions for a strong voice in national affairs.

Third Shot Necessary

Officials of the State Health Department have declared that three Salk polio shots are necessary for maximum protection against crippling effects of polio.

Children who have had two shots should have the third "booster shot" early in the fall of 1956, the Department said.

In answer to a series of questions, the Health Department explained that it is not known at present exactly how long protection from three Salk shots will last. Experts now estimate protection at about two and one-half years. Perhaps after that time, booster shots again will be advised.

Persons who already have recovered from polio also should have the shots, the Department said. There are three types of polio. Having a case of one type will not set up immunity against the other two. The Salk vaccine is aimed at giving immunity to all three types.

Only nine Texas children have been stricken with paralytic polio despite Salk inoculations. Dr. Henry A. Holle, state health commissioner announced. The nine cases were among 473,830 vaccinated children.

UT Entrance Exam Approved
Beginning next fall the Uni-

versity of Texas will admit students on the basis of aptitude test scores.

Tests are to be given probably three times a year, without cost to the applicant, at centers throughout the state.

Rapidly increasing enrollment necessitated tests to eliminate students who will be unsuccessful, the Board of Regents stated.

Anti-Crime Strategy Outlined

A multi-fold educational program to reduce crime in Texas was proposed at an Austin conference of three law enforcement groups.

Suggestions included (1) greater publicity on the cost of crime, (2) establishment of a four-year college course in criminology, and (3) education of youngsters by a touring "crimobile" equipped with latest detection devices.

Participants were the Texas Law Enforcement Foundation, the Attorney General's Citizens Committee on Law Enforcement and the State Law Enforcement Advisory Council.

Booby Prize Stolen

Last year Austin received the "booby prize" in the Safe Driving Day Contest. Award was a dented fender which was displayed—but not proudly—on the city hall lawn.

Painted on the fender, in white, was "Awarded to Austin, Texas for Last Place in the First Annual Safety Bowl."

Theft of the "prize" was discovered last week when preliminary work began on the upcoming S-D Day. Nobody knows who took it, or when. "We never were too happy about getting that thing in the first place," said Captain Bob Miles of the Austin Police Department. "We didn't keep up with it very closely."

Debt Adjustment Pitfalls Scored By Texas CB Head

AUSTIN, Oct. 27—Possible pitfalls in doing business with debt adjustment agencies by persons who think they are "hopelessly" in debt were outlined this week by Charles T. Lux of Austin, executive vice-president of the Retail Merchants Association of Texas.

Lux said such agencies, sometimes called pro-raters or budget plan houses, were numerous in the East and California, but had only recently penetrated into Texas, thus far only in the largest cities.

These firms, operated by persons who pose as "professional budgeting experts," offer to "rehabilitate" people who have found their earning cannot meet payments for the debts they have incurred, Lux said.

"They propose to do this by setting up payment schedules for each debt, budgeting earnings and arranging with creditors to carry the account until the debt is paid off in full.

"This sounds attractive to a person so far in debt he cannot see how he will ever get out," Lux said.

"But what he doesn't realize is that for this advice and service he is charged a fee," he explained. "The fee sometimes ranges as high as 40 percent of his total indebtedness, and usually no less than 15 percent," he explained.
