WASHINGTON COLUMN

SAN FRANCISCO.—Looking under the bed to see who might be hiding there to disturb the sweet dreams of peace being envisaged for San Francisco, the first thing that greets the eye is a scary specter so frightening it makes you want to dive for the pillows and pull the covers up over your head light. It is the prospect of representatives from 42 U. S. clubs, societies and pressure groups who have been invited by the State Department to send to San Francisco a speaker who will serve as a consultant to the eight-member official U. S. delegation.

The 42 United Nations may have their difficulties in agreeing how they will live in the same bed of security. But their peaceful slumbers will not be disturbed nearly so much by a Soviet Russian with a secret vote plan, a temperamental De Gaulle Frenchman with a collection of trick amendments, two quarreling Polish factions, nor a half-dozen British dominions scheming slyly to rule the world, as they may be bothered by this range of 42 lobbyists. Included in the 42 are four big business groups, two associations of lawyers, three labor organizations, four veterans' organizations, four farm groups, five women's societies, two Catholic, two Jewish and two Protestant auxiliaries, six peace societies, four businessmen's luncheon clubs, three educational societies and the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

It is the object of San Francisco is to establish peace and keep the peace, why don't a lot of these people stay home? The fact that more than one "he" each of the pressure groups are invited to San Francisco is in itself evidence that in normal times they can't agree with each other of the same thing.

MOVING this country and not wishing any other, it is possible to enjoy the corny result of high noon knife-and-fork deliberations of Lions, Rotarians and Kiwanis, to view with contempt the hickeries of A. F. of L., C. I. O. and N. A. M., to argue religious differences with tolerance, and to get some genuinely hearty laughs every now and then out of the women, God bless 'em, who will join clubs. All these things are as Anglican as apple pie and ice cream and we understand them.

As a dominant affair of American public opinion expressing itself by insisting that the 42 get together and form an organization that will stop war this 42-act greater combined lobby of counselors can exert a wholesome influence. But if the boys and girls get the idea that they are going to San Francisco to out over pot smokers, to insist on patented patents of their own preparation, to stage dramatic stunts and rule hold hold if their private, egomaniacal perfectionism is not followed to the last detail.

In the name of peace, sweet peace, they ought to stay home.

NEW YORK.—Like other sports, soccer has its outstanding star—Big Bill Gonsalves, who plays inside right for the Brooklyn Hispanos.

Gonsalves, who confers to 37 years, stands at five feet, weighs 185 pounds. The father of several children, Gonsalves works in a war plant at Kearny, N. J. Of Portuguese descent, Gonsalves began playing as a kid in Fall River, Mass., a hotbed of the international game. At 16 he was playing big-time soccer, remains at his best after 12 years in it.

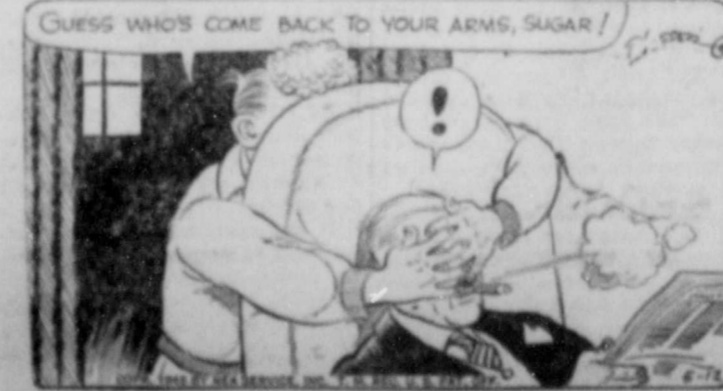

Safety Emphasis Aids Meat Jobs

WASHINGTON (UP)—A Safety drive carried on in the meat industry the last six months of 1944 reduced on-the-job accidents by almost 2,000 and saved 34,000 man days of production, the Department of Labor has announced.
Whereas accidents the last six months of 1943 totaled 9,000 disabling injuries, this figure was reduced to 7,300 injuries in the last six months of 1944.
Savings to the industry and workers were \$2,456,000, the Department of Labor spent \$50,000 on the safety drive sponsoring safety training classes through the country.
