

500 SUPERFORTS MAKE SECOND ATTACK IN THREE DAYS; FORTS STRIKE FUJISAWA NEAR TOKYO

Smoke and flames visible 150 miles at sea rose today from Nagoya, Japan's third largest city, as the bloody battle of Okinawa to the south roared closer to a climax.

The great industrial center of Nagova was hit for the second time in three days by a force of 500 American superforts. A Japanese broadcast said also that 40 Mustang fighters from Iwo Jima and two Superforts attacked he Fujisawa district near Tokyo.

In other far-flung operations against Japan, radio Tokyo said a British Naval task force had entered Malacca Strait between Malaya and Sumatra for the first time in nearly three years and engaged Japanese warships, presumably based on Singapore. American forces in the Philppines made further gains on Mindanao and Luzon. Troops of the 31st Division advanced five miles to within eight miles of Valenzia, the last Japanese-held air base on Mindanao.

Only four senators have thus far come out in open opposition to the Dumbarton Oaks proposals. A majority of the senators have reserved their opinions. The 16 freshman senators in a letter to President Roosevelt last January gave their full support.

CENATOR TOM CONNALLY of Texas, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and a delegate to San Francisco proposes creation of an Interim Council-a temporary organization to take the responsibility of adjusting international problems.

Perhaps the most constructive and carefully thought out propos for amending the Dumbarton Oaks proposals have come from Senator Arthur Vandenberg of Michigan, also a delegate to San Francisco. In brief, Vandenberg's nine proposed amendments would include: A firmer declaration in the preamble to establish justice and promote respect for human rights; inclusion of the principles of the Atlantic Charter as objectives of the United Nations Organization; revision of treaties which work injustices on any people; greater responsibility for the Security Council.

COMMANDER HAROLD E. STASSEN, another of the delegates to San Francisco, is on record as favoring the world peace force idea. John Foster Dulles, however, has cautioned against appraising the Dumbarton Oaks proposals solely on the basis of its use of while ignoring the constructive opportunities for non-military enforce ment of peace through the World Court.

Ex-President Herbert Hoover, in a six-point criticism, has put forward the treaty revision suggested by Vandenberg and in addition has called for absolute disarmament of the Axis.
