Clues Found To Battle Of Over 4,000 Years Ago

CAIRO, (UP)—The story of a battle that has baffled historians for centuries was about to be revealed today and a "security blackout" has been involved. More than 4,000 years ago, hundreds of Egyptian soldiers fell at the village of Kom el Houn in Beheba Province in a desperate attempt to halt a wave of aggression from Libya.

The soldiers presumably were buried where they fell, but historians were unsuccessful in their efforts to trace the details of the campaign.

Now workmen are uncovering the skeletons of some of these troops in a state of perfect preservation. In the grave of each of the 100 soldiers unearthed so far were found an axe, a dagger and a bronze mirror.

Abdel Hadi Hamada of the Egyptian Antiquities Department also found 200 beautifully worked solid gold necklaces, one of them more than six feet long.

Now excavations are being made over a large area where historians believe they will find clues to the missing facts of this early campaign.

At the request of King Farouk, some of the finds have been sent to the royal palace for inspection, and then to the Cairo Museum.

W. G. Vollmer To Head Texas And Pacific Railway

The board of directors of the Texas and Pacific Railway Company Wednesday re-elected J. L. Lancaster, Chairman of the Board, and elected W. G. Vollmer of St. Louis, senior vice-president of the Missouri Pacific Railroad Company, to the post of president, held by Mr. Lancaster since 1917. Mr. Lancaster has been with the Texas and Pacific for more than 30 years. He has been president since 1917, and board chairman since May 18, 1939.

During Mr. Lancaster's direction of the properties of the Texas and Pacific, their development and progress was the greatest in the history of that railroad. This was especially true of the prewar advancement.

He was persistent in improving the road bed and rolling stock to such a degree that the line was in a strong position to handle the



tremendous war traffic that is now being carried over it. Road beds were improved and heavier rails were put down on the main line so that now the speed of movement is higher than that of the average road in the United States.

Mr. Vollmer said his desire as he took over the Texas and Pacific presidency from Mr. Lancaster was to "be all the help I can in keeping the railroad up like Mr. Lancaster has done. I know the people of Texas and Louisiana want it kept up that way."

He said he was "coming in to make myself a T&P man. I want to get to know the men and work with them."

Mr. Lancaster entered the service of the Texas and Pacific in 1915 as assistant to the first vice president. He was made first vice president the following year, and was elected president in May 1917. From October 1916 to July 1918 he was receiver for the railroad. From July 1918 to December 1919, period of the first World War, he was federal manager of the Texas and Pacific, the IGN, the St. LSW of Texas, and several small lines in Texas. He was again named president of the T&P Dec. 1, 1919, and has served continuously in that capacity until Wednesday.

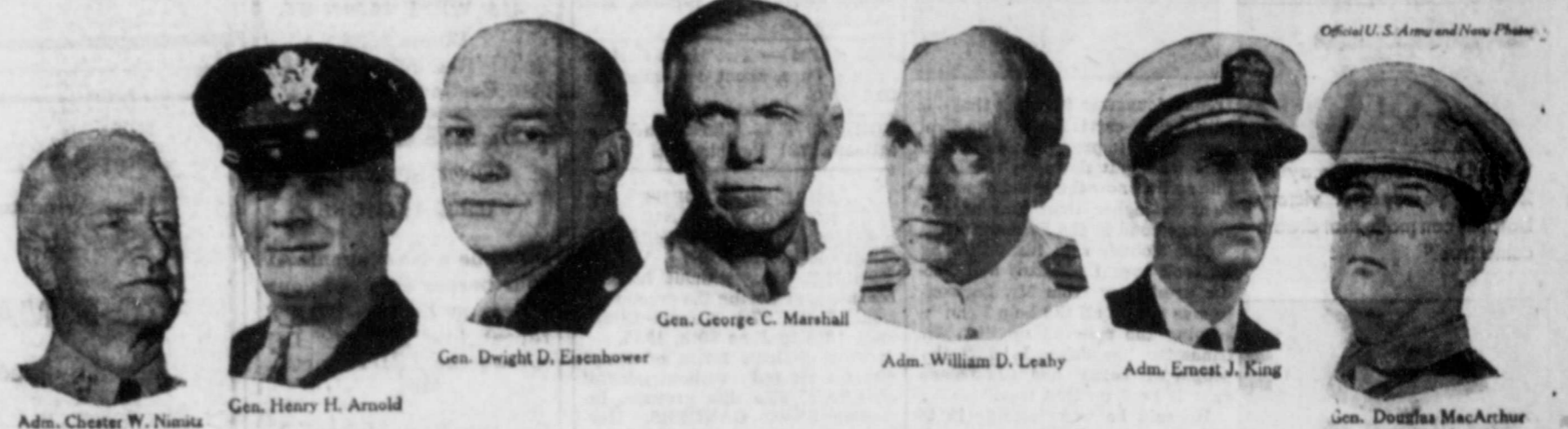
