SGT. TARRANT RECOMMENDED FOR AN AWARD

Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Tarrant have received a letter from Brig. Gen. Manford MacNider, commanding officer of their son, Sgt. James L. Tarrant, in which it is stated that the Ranger soldier has been recommended for the award of the Bronze Star for "gallantry in action."

The letter says in part, "Your son is a first class fighting man and a credit to his organization and to the Army. You can be very proud of him as are all of us who are associated with him in this command."

Sgt. Tarrant is serving with the 158th Regimental Combat Team, a unit that has received a number of commendations for performances in various campaigns in the Pacific.

Veteran of a number of Pacific campaigns he has twice been wounded in action, first in New Guinea on May 28, 1944 and on August 19, 1944. He had returned to duty on August 1 after recovering from the first wounds.

A brother, Cpl. Charles N. Tarrant is now on M. P. duty with the Armed Forces in Germany.

Sergeant Gets Fourth Cluster To The Air Medal

An Eighth Air Force Bomber Station, England — Staff Sergeant Lannie C. Adams, 19 year old B-17 Flying Fortress ball turret gunner from Ranger, Tex. has recently been awarded the fourth Oak Leaf Cluster to the Air Medal for "meritorious achievement" while participating in Eighth Air Force attacks on vital industrial targets and enemy held installations in Germany, which helped cause the final collapse of the German war machine.

The official citation accompanying the award commented on the "courage, coolness and skill displayed by Sgt. Adams on all occasions," as reflecting "great credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of the United States." The presentation was made by his group commander, Lieutenant Colonel Louis G. Thorup of Salt Lake City, Utah.

Sgt. Adams is a member of the 447th Bomb. Group, which is a unit of the Third Air Division, the division which holds the Distinguished Unit Citation for its role in the historic England-Africa shuttle bombing attack on the Messerschmitt factories in Regensburg, Germany.

The son of Mrs. Annie Adams of Ranger, Sgt. Adams, before entering the Army Air Forces in December, 1943 was engaged in the parking business in Ranger. He married his gunner's wings in May, 1944, at Kingman, Ariz.

INFANTRY DAY TO BE HELD AT CAMP WOLTERS

CAMP WOLTERS, Texas — In an attempt to present the role of the American Infantryman to the public, a complete Infantry Display at this Infantry Replacement Training Center will be open to the public Friday, June 15, when day is being celebrated throughout the world as "Infantry Day."

The display of weapons and equipment will be open to the public from 4 to 6 p. m., followed by a retreat parade at which time the Congressional Medal of Honor will be awarded posthumously to Lt. Jack L. Knight, who was east of camp prior to his entry into the Army in 1943. Lt. Knight was killed in Burma last February, and the medal, which is the nation's highest award, will be presented to Lt. Knight's father, Mr. Roy Knight, Major General Bruce Magruder, Commanding General of this IRTC, will make the presentation.

The display of weapons and equipment will be in the Sports Arena, and will include a display of captured Japanese weapons. Flame throwers and various pyrotechnics can be seen at the display, and visitors will be able to talk over the well known "Handy-Talky" radio and special field telephones.

The Training Aids Reproduction Shops, popularly known as "TARS," will exhibit some of its training aids, and one motor vehicle of each type will be on display. There will also be at least one tank on exhibit.

How the soldier eats in battle will be shown, as a Field Kitchen will be set up, and the many types of rations, including "C," "D," "E," and "G-in-1," will be on display. A full field pack will be shown, including all the many items an Infantry soldier carries on his back. Captured enemy clothing will also be shown, along with organizational equipment of the U. S. Army.

American mines, demolitions and booby traps will be shown at the display, along with a display of the Combat Infantryman foxholes, including the one man foxhole, the two man foxhole, the slit trench, observation post, and mortar and machine gun emplacements.

A Battalion Aid Station will be established to show medical attention is given wounded soldiers right at the front lines. There will also be a Chaplain's display, as well as an Information and Education exhibit. The film library will have a continuous showing of moving pictures on a "daylight" screen, and finally there will be displays to show the conservation and cleaning of equipment as practiced by the soldier, including the cleaning of weapons, care of shoes and clothing, and the salvage of materials.

Civilians desiring to attend the Infantry Day Display and the Retreat Ceremony at which the Medal of Honor will be presented may take a bus to Camp Wolters from Mineral Wells, or may drive their own cars. Plenty of parking space has been provided, and Military Police will be on hand to help in any way possible.

Says Filipinos Think Texans Are Very Bad Men

First Lt. Eugene E. Kribbs who is stationed in the Philippines with the Transportation Corps of the Army has written the Times telling of some of his experiences in the islands.

Lt. Kribbs stated that the completeness of destruction there is hard to comprehend without actually seeing it, but for the most part buildings are piles of useless rubble.

Some of the natives, he explained, are interesting conversationalists and can tell blood curdling stories of their experiences with the Japs.

Through the influence of western type movies and Japanese propaganda most Filipinos have the impression that all Texans are "bad" men. During the Jap occupation of the islands the westerners were shown with a Jap intoning the bad qualities of the Texans. Filipinos were taught to believe that those who looted and robbed during the Jap occupation were Texans.

Approached one day by a Filipino lad, Lt. Kribbs was asked from what part of the States he hailed. When he replied "Texas" the boy remarked, "Oh, Texans verree bad men."

Lt. Kribbs closed his letter with the remark that servicemen like nothing better than mail from home.

Brady, Eastern Texas Damaged In Heavy Storms

Destructive winds, rain and hail, which swept across the eastern portion of Texas during the past 24 hours, left one dead, several injured and hundreds of thousands of dollars in damages to offset the beneficial relief it brought to wind-dried crop lands.

An early morning windstorm at Brady, in McCulloch county, caused an undetermined amount of damage and killed a military policeman when a portion of the bus station collapsed and fell on him. Two other soldiers and two civilians also were injured in the storm.

Oklahoma Floods Cause Damage

OKLAHOMA CITY (UP) — Flood waters of eastern Oklahoma streams, swollen by rains ranging up to 20 inches since Saturday moved slowly into Ark today leaving extensive crop damage and a number of roads blocked in the eastern area of the state.

TWO RELEASED WAR PRISONERS ARRIVE HOME

Among the first Ranger men who were prisoners of the Germans to return to the States are Flight Officer Robert A. Palmer, son of Mrs. W. C. Palmer and Lt. Frank Hatten, son of Mrs. G. L. Hatten of Eastland and husband of the former Miss Fanny Doll Swaney. Both men are here for 60-day stays.

The two were held in the same German camps, at Sagan, Moosberg, and Weidberg. Palmer was also held at Elmberg and Hatten at Frankfurt where he was interrogated.

Lt. Hatten pilot of a B-17 Flying Fortress was in a crash landing in enemy-occupied territory in Europe on May 24, 1944. His only injury in the crash was a cut over the left eye but stated that he received rather rough treatment from the German-doctor who took care of him after the crash.

Flight Officer Palmer, a glider pilot was taken prisoner by the Germans on September 23, 1944 when his glider went down in territory held by the Germans. He was liberated May 8 by Patton's Army and landed in the States on June 3 as did Lt. Hatten.

Both men hold the Air Medal and citations, and Palmer's unit was given the presidential citation for action in Normandy. Both men have high praise "for the Red Cross for the aid given them while in the German camps. Palmer stated that they would have starved to death if it had not been for the Red Cross food and added, "They can have my dollar any time they want it."

Though they were not in the horror camps, they suffered hardships from the cold, lack of food and the long marches from one camp to another. On these marches it was related that many men fell out through exhaustion and on one occasion a small group of them was left by the German guard at a farm home until they could recover. Frozen hands and feet were often among a lot of the men.

In speaking of his return to the States, Palmer said, "You have no idea how good it feels and how fine it is to see the clean cities and towns after being in the fifth of Europe."

Also in the same camps with the two officers were Capt. W. T. Rucker of Strawn and Lt. Odum of Cisco.

LONDON PAYS TRIBUTE TO EISENHOWER

LONDON (UP) — Britain paid tribute today to Gen. Eisenhower as London trotted all the splendor of her ancient ceremonies out to welcome the Kansas farm boy who made good.

After receiving the freedom of the city from London's Lord Mayor at ancient Guildhall, Eisenhower said that one of the passions of his life was to promote "real and practical" cooperation between America and Britain.

The supreme commander was decorated with the Legion of Merit, an award held only by 24 Britishers, in a ceremony at Buckingham palace.

Syrians, French Clash Monday

BEYROUTH (UP) — Fighting again broke out in Syria yesterday when 30 were wounded in a clash between Syrians and native troops under the French, dispatches from Damascus said today.

The brief battle at Jisr el-Juhayr ended when two British tanks intervened, the dispatches said.

INVASION BEACHES BARE OF ENEMY; MARINES ON OKINAWA MEETING BITTER RESISTANCE

Australian troops advanced into British North Borneo today as smoothly as on maneuvers, but on Okinawa the Japanese ignored a surrender demand and continued their last ditch stand.

On Borneo, the Australian Ninth Division drove rapidly toward Brunai, capital of the little sultanate of the same name, after landing on beaches bare of the enemy.

But on Okinawa, the Marines and Army troops had to fight for almost every rock as they battled slowly onto the Yaeju-Dake escarpment. Two footholds have been won on the steep sided plateau.

In the air war, forty P-47 Thunderbolts and other fighters attacked airfields on Kyushu this morning, according to Tokyo, while 40 Superforts laid mines off the island. Tokyo also reported 30 Superforts dropped mines in Wakana Bay on Honshu's west coast just before midnight. Two B-24 Liberators, apparently reconnoitering, appeared over eastern Kyushu — the first reported over Japan proper.

In China, the Japanese bounced back from a long series of recent Chinese victories and launched strong counter attacks. The enemy recaptured Jehan, 43 miles west of Luchow, which the Chinese had taken just two days ago. The Chinese also were driven from Chungchingfu, on the Indo-China border.

In the Philippines, troops of the 11th Corps captured Santa Ines, 24 miles northeast of Manila in the Marikina watershed. In northern Luzon, the Cagayan valley stalled temporarily.

WASHINGTON COLUMN

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif.—Full import of the Soviet government's action in holding under arrest 15 Polish political leaders and one military leader can be understood only after examining the personal records of these key men in the underground movement. What this magnificently conceived and beautifully executed doublecross amounts to is the capture of four cabinet members and the leaders of five major political parties—Peasant, Socialist, Christian Labor, Nationalist and Democratic—which functioned as a coalition council of national unity, or underground parliament, all through the war.

At the head of this underground movement in Poland was a chief delegate who also ranked as Vice-Premier of the London Polish Government in Exile. This was Jan Jankowski who, next to the military leader and the only non-political leader, Gen. Leopold Okulicki, was perhaps the biggest catch in the Russian 16-man bag.

JANKOWSKI was a labor leader, a lifelong member of the Christian Labor Party. After the Pilsudski coup in 1926, Jankowski withdrew from politics and devoted all his efforts to labor union organization. During the Warsaw uprising last fall, Jankowski was awarded the highest Polish military decoration for conspicuous gallantry, though he was not a soldier.

To charge a man with such a record as being pro-German seems fantastic. This is equally true of Kazmier Puzak, perhaps the third most important personality detained by the Russians. Puzak's record shows that in 1905 he was arrested and sentenced to death for leading an uprising against the Czar. His sentence was commuted to imprisonment, but he was liberated by the Bolshevik revolution in 1917. He returned to Poland, entered politics, became secretary general of the Socialist Party, was a founder of the underground, and escaped detection all through the war.

INCLUDED are national party leaders Tadyszak Kobylanski, publisher and editor; Zbigniew Stypulowski, lawyer and student leader; Stanislaw Jankiewicz, cabinet member and doctor of economic science.

When, March 30, three days after their disappearance, a full report of the incident was sent to Washington and London, few people believed it. The treachery of forcibly detaining plenipotentiaries for whom safe conduct had been arranged, was so great that only the Poles gave it credence till it was confirmed by Foreign Commissioner V. M. Malotki in San Francisco.

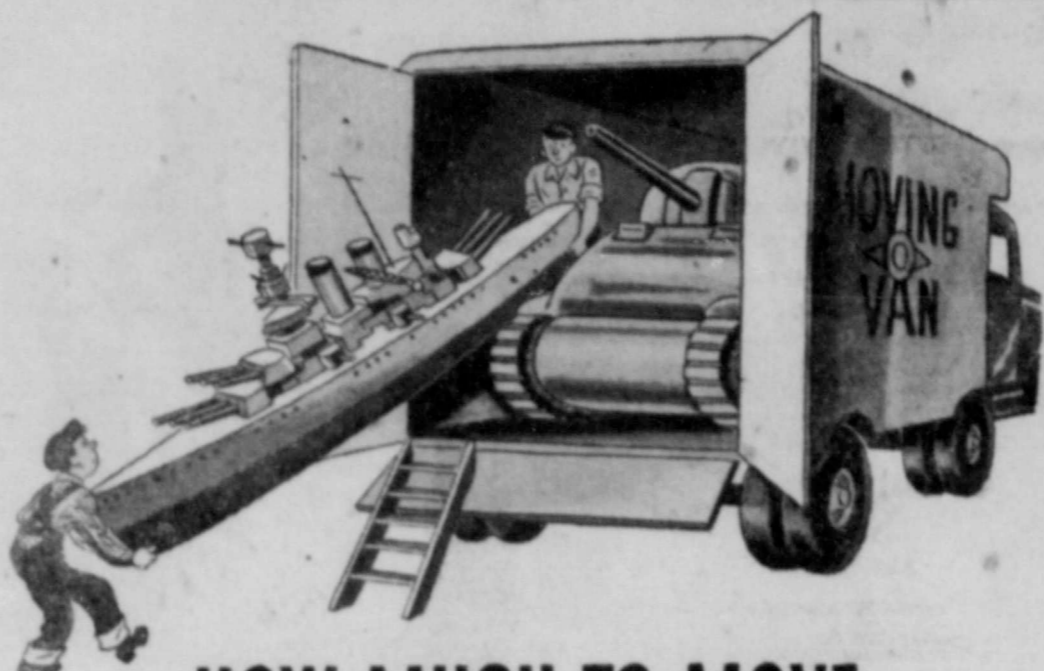

about two inches thick, for if it is spread on in too deep a coating, it may defeat its purpose by absorbing water from any light rain and keeping it from the soil.

Besides conserving moisture and holding down weeds, it keeps the soil cool and under 90 degrees, thus promoting growth of feeder roots. Mulch is also valuable around tomato plants that aren't staked, around cucumbers and bush squash plants. It holds the fruit off the ground, keeps it clean and free of certain rots carried in the soil.

Sometimes before your garden soil dries out, take the advice of the agent and mulch and save.

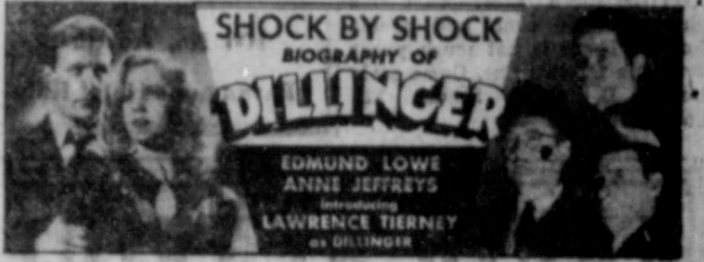

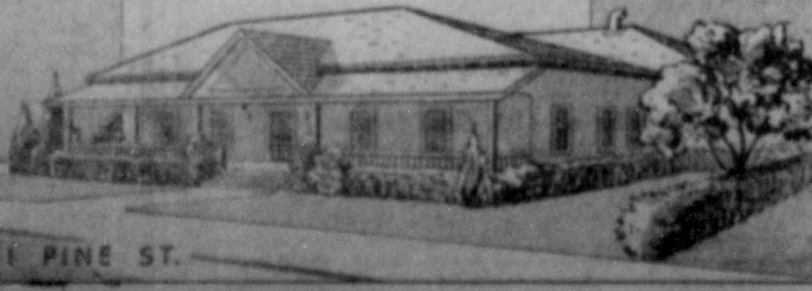
