Flame-Throwers Kill Hundreds Of Japs

JUDGE, TWO LEGISLATORS ARE HONORED

Judge J. E. Hickman, member of the State Supreme court commission of appeals, L. R. Pearson, Floridian Representative in the State Legislature from Eastland and Callahan counties, and R. N. Grisham, Eastland county representative in the Legislature were honor guests at a banquet at Eastland Friday night, which was attended by some 100 representative citizens of Eastland and Callahan counties. Pat Bullock of Colorado City, State senator, was unable to be present.

Judge Virgil T. Seaberry of Eastland presided as toastmaster and introduced the honored guest who responded with short talks. Judge Pearson, first speaker, gave a brief review of his work in the recently adjourned legislature of which he was a new member, and stated that notwithstanding the fact that much of the press of the State had been criticizing the Legislature as a "spending legislature," the Legislature actually passed not more than 60 bills and levied no new taxes.

Judge Grisham explained his activities in connection with the proposed amendment for increasing the number of the members of the State supreme court from three to nine, and recommended that the amendment, which is to be voted on August 25, be passed by the voters of the State. Judge Hickman, member of the commission, explained the need for the increased number in the membership of the supreme court and advocated that the amendment be voted.

Judge Cyrus B. Frost of Eastland offered the following resolution which was voted unanimously by the meeting: "We favor adoption of the Constitutional Amendment on August 25, increasing our Texas Supreme court from three to nine members. We urge the citizen to vote for the amendment."

Quartermaster Corps To Observe 170th Birthday

CAMP WOLTERS, Tex., Saturday June 16, marks the 170th birthday of the Quartermaster Corps of the United States Army. At Camp Wolters, the Quartermaster personnel will mark the day with redoubled efforts to serve the Infantry Replacement Training Center until final victory.

In training, as in combat, the Quartermaster Corps functions as a vital component of the Army. It is the function of the Corps here to anticipate the needs of troops training as Infantry Replacements, and to obtain subsistence, clothing and equipment and the thousands of other necessary items occasioned by the war situation. Lt. Col. John W. Long, Camp Quartermaster, declared: "We shall do all that we can to uphold the traditions of the Quartermaster Corps. Our job must continue to be done efficiently, and well."

An example of the magnitude of the Quartermaster job at this Army camp is the fact that each month over half a million separate items of clothing must be examined and processed for repair or salvage. When it comes to subsistence, the Corps at Camp Wolters must order over half a million dollars worth of food-stuffs each month, often long in advance of actual needs, in order to feed the thousands of troops in training. "Feeding and equipping troops is a continuing job, and the Quartermaster Corps is proud of its record in the 170 years of service," said Col. Long.

SOLDIER TELLS EXPERIENCES DURING WAR

Mrs. Mary J. Wheat has received a letter from her son, Cpl. Lee E. Wheat who is with the Army stationed now in Mannheim, Germany, in which the corporal tells of extensive travels over Europe in connection with his work in the supply branch of the service.

In part the letter reads, "I left New Jersey on Easter Sunday April 9, 1944 and went overseas on the Queen Marie. We were about five days getting to Scotland where we boarded a train and went to southern England. I was in England about two months and on July 9th we landed on Uta beach while German planes were overhead bombing us. But we had so many planes in the air that the Germans had to stay as high they couldn't bomb any certain target. We took our trucks with us and slept in fox-holes every night that we were not driving. We drove in black-outs and several times we found that our roads had been bombed out."

In carrying supplies and mail from one place to another, he stated that he was in Cherbourg, Lannau, Orleans, Reames, Paris, Rouen and on one trip went as far south as Marseille. On one assignment he drove from Cherbourg to Holland, 975 miles, to carry a load of steel bridges.

He was in Belgium where, he said, the buzz bombs came over every 20 minutes. He recalled an incident when an officer and some of the men went to Leige to get some trucks and while the men were having lunch a bomb hit the trucks completely destroying them. On another occasion a bomb went through the truck driven by one of his buddies going through both doors and tearing the stock from his gun without giving him a scratch.

Four other sons of Mrs. Wheat are in the service, Cpl. Finis G. Wheat, somewhere in Australia, Staff Sgt. Garland D. Wheat who has been in the European theatre for the past 26 months and who is expected home at any time and Pvt. Johnnie D. Wheat who is stationed with the Air Forces at Scott Field, Ill. The other son in the service is Royce L. Wheat.

Pfc. Brown In Third Battle Against Japanese

With the XXIV Corps on Okinawa, June 17 — A veteran of campaigns on Kiska in the Aleutians, and Leyte in the Philippines, Pfc. Raymond O. Brown, Ranger, Texas, is fighting the Japs in his third Pacific operation on this home island of Japan. Pfc. Brown, member of a combat engineer battalion, won a commendation from his commanding officer for setting up signal equipment during the battle for Leyte island.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Samuel G. Brown, Ranger, Pfc. Brown was inducted into the service in September, 1942.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS ARE LISTED

Dr. G. C. Boswell, superintendent of the local schools announced today that the following courses will be required for graduation from the high school: English three units, that is first, second and third years 2 years of mathematics but general mathematics will not meet the requirement 2 years of social science, including American History or American Civics, and only one year in natural science.

In the field of natural science one of the following may be taken to meet the requirement for graduation; chemistry, biology, physics, general science, and girls may use home making courses to meet the local requirement and in many colleges and universities home making courses may be used for entrance but the college she expects to attend will accept home making for entrance. Colleges and universities are requiring only one year in natural science to enter.

The high school expects to offer a course in journalism another year. Also debating will be stressed and a credit will be given for the work. It is the desire of the board to get back into the course of study. There may be other courses offered which should be of special interest to students.

Junior and senior students will not be allowed to take general science or any other courses which belong to the first year of high school. A large high school enrollment is expected and all new students should get their work or courses outlined before school begins in order to get the most from the course of study.

Strike Protests President's Order

CHICAGO (UP) — Ten thousand truck drivers went on strike today in defiance of an order from President Truman seizing control of Chicago's truck lines. As the strike spread, troops moved into Chicago to enforce the Presidential order placing the lines under control of the ODT.

Divers Hunt For Bodies of Fliers

CORPUS CHRISTI (UP) — Navy divers groped through the depths of Corpus Christi Bay today for the bodies of seven airmen missing after their Navy patrol bomber struck a channel marker and crashed into the bay.

A liquor still was seized in Cheyenne, Wyo., recently. It was the first still discovered in the state's capital for more than four years.

Wants Peacetime Training For Men

WASHINGTON (UP) — Secretary of Navy Forrestal urged adoption of compulsory peacetime training today as a warning "to anyone who may be dreaming of world dominion."

Testifying before the House postwar military policy committee, Forrestal said those who favor a peacetime training program frequently are asked "whom are we preparing to fight."

"Quite simply, we are going to fight an international ruffian who attempts to impose his will on the world by force," he said.

Kansas, Missouri Threatened Again With Bad Floods

KANSAS CITY (UP) — Rains of near-deluge proportions which washed over already-soaked earth into the streams of eastern Kansas and western Missouri, sent rivers of the area raging to bankful today.

Government hydrographers predicted that low lands along their route were due for another overflow as bad or worse than those of last April, when thousands of acres were inundated.

Blackmarket Ring In Sugar Broken By OPA Officials

DALLAS (UP) — A black market ring extending from New Orleans to Atlanta, Ga., had been broken up today by OPA officials who yesterday arrested a truck driver at New Orleans who had transported more than a quarter of a million pounds of sugar to a Georgia bootlegger.

The OPA picked up the trail of the large black market sugar ring at Dallas where it was discovered that the nation coupon verification center was being flooded with some 49,000 counterfeit sugar coupons.

The coupons were traced to a single wholesale company at New Orleans.

Federal Control Of Gas Threatens Its Production

OKLAHOMA CITY (UP) — Federal Power Commission control of the nation's natural gas industry threatens to discourage large producers and distributors from maintaining reserves needed to insure adequate supplies in the future, interstate oil compact commissioners were told today.

The warning against alleged federal intervention in state rights relating to gas production was delivered by Carl I. Wheat, Washington attorney for the Independent Natural Gas Association of America.

Cotton Exports Thru Galveston To Be Very High

GALVESTON (UP) — U. S. lend-lease cotton shipments to European countries through the port of Galveston probably will reach 500,000 bales this summer, shipping officials predicted today.

Government-owned cotton cargoes are being shipped out of the Galveston port for delivery in France, Greece, Poland and Czech.

Expect Release Of Lt. Herzog

WASHINGTON (UP) — President Truman was expected to request the Navy Department today to release Lt. Paul M. Herzog of its labor relations department by June 30 so that he can become chairman of the NLRB.

Herzog, former chairman of the New York State Labor Relations Board, was confirmed in the new post unanimously by the Senate yesterday.

No Trace of 12 Cows

CRANSTON, R. I. (UP) — Somebody isn't worrying about the meat shortage. Twelve cows disappeared from a pasture recently, and despite a thorough search, never were found.

BREAK OKINAWA RESISTANCE; NEW LANDINGS BELIEVED NEAR

GUAM (UP) — American artillery and flame-throwing tanks annihilated hundreds of Japanese in a 10 square mile dead end pocket of Southern Okinawa today as Tokyo reported U. S. forces appeared to be preparing for possible new landings in the Ryukyus.

Enemy troops acknowledged defeat with sporadic suicidal charges into withering fire from 10th Army troops.

Radio Tokyo said American Naval units have extended Patrols 110 miles northeast of Okinawa to Amami island, only 185 miles south of Japan proper, in preparation for possible fresh operations against the "Japanese homeland."

Japanese resistance on Okinawa was reported broken Saturday and Lt. Gen. Simon Bolivar Buckner, Tenth Army commander, predicted that the few thousand enemy troops trapped on the southern tip of the island would be mopped up within a week.

The complete end of organized Japanese resistance after a bloody seventy-seven day struggle, appeared only a matter of hours away as the Americans knifed through the last few miles toward the tip of the doorstep island to Japan.

Buckner revealed that only a handful of the original Japanese garrison that once numbered 85,000 men remained in the shell battered death trap atop Yasuda-Dake Plateau and they were being killed or captured rapidly by victory flushed men of two Army and one Marine divisions.

Governor Signs Aeronautics Bill And 13 Others

AUSTIN (UP) — Gov. Stevenson today signed the bill of the recent legislative session creating a three-member state aeronautics commission.

Also among the 13 bills and resolutions signed was a measure requiring that poll tax exemption certificates for persons over 30 be secured annually.

JOHN M. SPELLMAN DIES
DALLAS (UP) — John M. Spellman, prominent Mason and past president of the Sons of the Republic of Texas, died today at his home here.

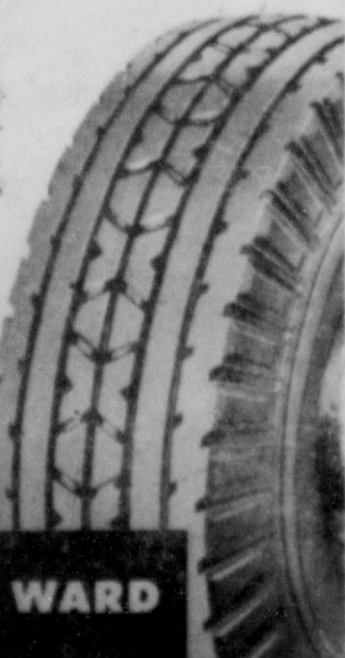

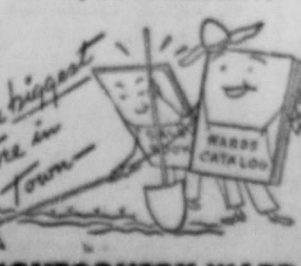

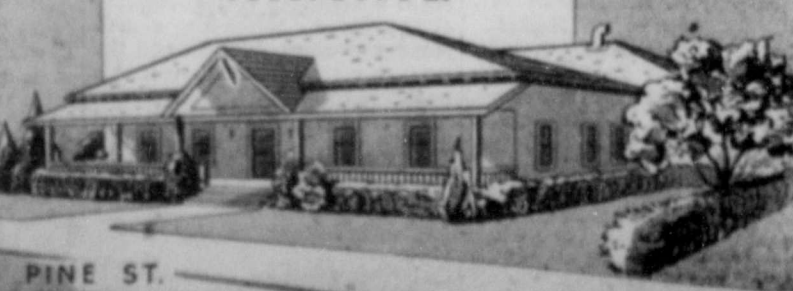

U.S. Seaman's Service Is Saga Of Global War

FARRAGUT, Ida. (UP) World War II has really been a global war for Willey T. Edwards, 23-year-old seaman 1-c of Roanoke Rapids, N. C. Edwards is a patient at Farragut Naval Hospital for treatment of a fractured skull, shrapnel wounds in the legs and back, and burns received aboard ship during the invasion of Okinawa.

Edwards has seen plenty of action since joining the Navy Sept. 7, 1942. Serving aboard a destroyer, he participated in invasions of Casablanca, Sicily, Italy and Normandy. Shifted to the Pacific he was in three landings in the Philippines, was with a protective force at Iwo Jima, with a task force whose planes bombed Tokyo and then Osnawa.

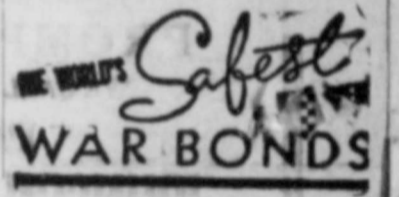

He spent nearly three hours in the water before rescue, when his destroyer was sunk in October, 1943, while escorting a convoy in the Mediterranean after the invasion of Italy. Fragments got him in the leg when a shell hit his destroyer in a sea battle off Cherbourg. He escaped unhurt when his ship was damaged in the Philippines.

The Casablanca invasion was the worst, Edwards said, because it was necessary to knock out so many big ships in the harbor before landings could be made. "I didn't get at all scared during any of the invasions," he said "But as soon as it was all over, I'd suddenly find myself scared to death and I'd have the shakes."

Edwards would like to stay in the Navy, but would prefer a little shore duty for the present. There's still a lot more to be done in this war, he said.
