

PEARL HARBOR (UP)- Japanese forces on Okinawa-what there was left of them -faced slaughter, suicide or surrender today as the campaign entered its closing hours.

Scores of enemy soldiers leaped into the sea from the cliffs on the island's southern tip. Many surrendered, more than ever before in the Pacific war. The rest waited in their foxholes and caves until Americans fell upon them and killed them. There were few left and


