Every town has citizens and characteristics that make it different from all other towns in the world.

For example, take Ranger — not during the great oil rush but years after the boom had ended.

Ranger was the home of Rural Murry, holder of the world's record for a mile on a motorcycle over a dirt track; and of a mayor renowned for his skill at barbecuing, especially the sauce made by his own secret formula; and of men who followed the dogs in a wolf-hunt, not on horseback but in an automobile, jolting across the rough and rugged terrain of the ranch country.

Also Ranger was the home town of Buster Mills, one of the all-time gridiron greats of the University of Oklahoma and the hero of an East-West game in San Francisco, his field goal being the only score of the afternoon.

It was while at Oklahoma U. that Mills performed a feat that outdid Frank Merriwell himself. A track meet and a baseball game were in progress simultaneously. Near the end of the meet, the coach saw that the Sooners could win if they could place in the javelin throw—but he had no javelin hurler. He hastened to the nearby diamond and, while Oklahoma was at bat, Mills went over and, in baseball tops, tossed the javelin far enough to win third place and the meet; then went back to the diamond and tripped with the bases full to win the ball game.

**Sgt. Bull Safe After Mid-Air Plane Collision**

**EASTLAND Tex., June 21**—Sgt. Joe Bull is safe after a hair-raising collision in mid-air. On Sgt. Bull's seventh mission over Germany, the plane in which he was a tail gunner was struck by another bomber in the same formation, which had been hit by flak and had gone out of control. All the crew was killed except the co-pilot and Joe, who was blown out of the tail at an altitude of 27,000 ft. After he had fallen to where he could breathe, Joe reached for his parachute and it was not in place. Looking up, he saw it overhead. He parachuted and landed in a field outside Leppin, Germany. He was in the act of being shot by German civilians when the Home Guard picked him up—and made him a P. O. W. He was then marched for nine days, despite injuries sustained in the blast and fed on black bread and water. The U. S. army averaged the area and he was liberated along with others by the 4th Army. He was taken to a hospital in France and later released to his home base in Eastland. He is now in the States and will return to Miami, Florida where he will be reassigned. Sgt. Bull was the guest Wednesday of his sister Mrs. Joe Stephen, enroute to Abilene.

Bull has been awarded the Air Medal, the Presidential Unit Citation, and the Purple Heart.

**"Sailor" Webb Is Killed At Sea, Wife Informed**

Mrs. Garland Webb, North American street, Eastland, received official information Tuesday that her husband, Chief Petty Officer, Garland (Sailor) George Webb, was killed in an accident on May 5, last, while serving with the United States Navy and that his body was interred at sea.
