# New Tokyo Command Formed For Invasion

## MAJOR ANGUS TELLS SOME OF WAR ACTION

Maj. Hershel E. Angus, back from almost two years service in the European theatre of operations modestly denies ownership of any decorations but the story of his part in combat is packed full of medal deserving activities. He finally remembers that his unit does hold the presidential citation for bravery at Bastogne. An officer in the 101st Airborne Division, 327th Glider Infantry, he thinks that possible Bastogne was his most harrowing experience in the war. For days the forces held out there against great odds when the Germans cut them off in a counter-attack. Their supplies were dropped to them from the air and Major Angus said that he saw several of the supply planes shot down by the enemy. Because of a heavy fog which lasted for days, supplies were almost exhausted, when miraculously the fog lifted to grant a five day period of glorious sunshine during which supplies were dropped to them. D-Day was another nightmare to the major and his men. They were literally the life savers of companies found in tight spots and when a company reported that they were hemmed in, it was the major and his company that went to their relief and on D-Day alone they were attached to five different companies. During his service in Europe he was attached to every Army in the field and besides Normandy and Bastogne was in the battle for Holland, in Alsace, Arnhem, the battle of the Rhine crossing and last was in Berchtesgaden, where he saw the ruins of Hitler's mountain retreat. When he left the Bavarian Alps special detachments were still clearing out Hitler's tunnel. In Holland he said that for eight straight days they were attacked morning, noon and night by the Germans. These attacks were so timed that a watch could almost be set by them. It fell to the major on one occasion to set up military government in a town across the river from Dusseldorf and this he found a rather easy task as the Germans were very cooperative. He explained that as the Germans deserted a town certain citizens were named to assist in establishing the military government and that in his case at least they were pleasant to work with. Germany, he thinks, is the most beautiful country of all those he entered and he found there green fields well kept and food supplies that should be adequate for the German people. Major Angus wears the Pearl Harbor and Victory ribbons, the American Theatre Ribbon and the European Theatre ribbon with four stars for Normandy, Ardennes, Northern France and the Rhineland.

## Former Cisco Man Made Red Cross Field Supervisor

ST. LOUIS—Horse Carmichael former president of the Cisco Junior Chamber of Commerce, has been appointed a field supervisor for American Red Cross military and naval welfare service in Texas, according to a recent announcement from Red Cross midwestern headquarters here. In his new assignment he will supervise the work of Red Cross field directors at military and naval installations in Texas. Carmichael returned to this country May 25, after ten months service as a Red Cross field director in the Marianas. He served the 21st Bomber Command, whose B-29s have been delivering knock out blows at the heart of Japan. Carmichael joined the Red Cross National staff in April 1943, and served as field director at Camp Maxey, Paris, Texas for more than a year before receiving his overseas assignment. Before joining the Red Cross national staff he was a field worker for the Texas state department of public welfare. In addition to being president of the Junior Chamber of Commerce here, Carmichael was director of the United Charities in 1937 and 1938. A native of Hillsboro, Texas, he attended Stanton Military Academy, Cornwall New York and the University of Texas.

## Lt. Spears Gets News Of Father's Death At Landing

CISCO, June 26 — Lieut. Charles Spears of the U. S. Navy arrived in Cisco yesterday on a leave of thirty days. He came by plane from San Francisco and was met in Fort Worth by his sisters, Mrs. Sterling Drenwright and Miss Lillian Spears. When the young man's father, Alex Spears, esteemed citizen and president of the First National bank, passed away suddenly in the evening of June 7, every effort was made to locate the lieutenant, but without avail. He was somewhere at sea and word of his father's death did not reach him until his arrival in San Francisco from Pearl Harbor on June 25, and even then only through a chance meeting with his friend Leonard King, also of Cisco, who was preparing to embark for the Pacific area. The two young men, by the way, have long been friends and left Cisco together when they entered the navy. When asked as to his future plans in regard to the First National Bank, where he was employed before entering the service, and in which he personally is a stockholder, Lieutenant Spears replied that he expected to request inactive duty on the grounds of 36 months naval service, 28 of which have been spent overseas, and also because he considers his services are needed at the bank.

## 15 DIVISIONS FREED TO AID OPERATIONS; OTHERS COMING

PEARL HARBOR (UP) — Japan today announced the creation of a Tokyo defense command "in anticipation of invasion" as American strength grew for the showdown battle. The finish of the savage Luzon campaign was expected to free the biggest part of five divisions for new action under Gen. MacArthur, in the big operations to come. Seven other divisions which fought on Okinawa would be available after a rest, as would the three which won Iwo Jima, and to add to Japan's invasion fear, 50,000 men or more a month were being redeployed from Europe. The Tokyo defense command was part of the Japanese plan for regional defenses to combat invasion. So far nine regional defenses have been created. To help the heavy aerial assaults on the homeland, American troops made six west-pocket invasions in the Marianas to hunt additional planes where Superforts could get down on the trip home when necessary. They found no Japanese on the islands, which stretch 349 miles north of Saipan. The B-29s meanwhile mined waters on Hombu's northwest coast last night. Tokyo reported bombers also mined Osaka Bay. After a study of reconnaissance photographs, it was estimated 1-15 square miles of Japanese cities were now being laid waste in the shattering raids. Far Eastern Air Force Bombers made two more raids on Balikpapan, dropping 220 tons of explosives on the town and the nearby Manggar airdrome. The liberation of Luzon was announced in Manila by MacArthur five months and 19 days after American troops went ashore at Lingayen. QUICK WORK KILGORE, Tex., (UP) — A troop train pulled into Kilgore and a soldier hopped from the engine. He saw a woman and some children waiting at the station; he grabbed one and kissed them all. No words were spoken, there wasn't time. He then hopped the caboose as the train pulled slowly away.

## LT. HARRIS BACK HOME FROM EUROPE

Friends have received word that Lt. Bruce Harris has returned from service in the European theatre of operations and is now at Ft. Sam Houston where he will be a few days before being granted leave. Lt. Harris, who served as senior aide to his general, was sent to foreign service in December, 1943 and was stationed in England prior to the invasion of France. While crossing the channel on June 29, 1944 his boat was struck by a mine or torpedoed and they suffered heavy casualties and were forced to return to England. He finally landed in Normandy on July third with his general and eight other officers. He was in the siege of St. Malo and Brest which were taken after six weeks. He was at Bastogne and once when sent on a mission was cut off from his unit by the counter-attack of the Germans and was several days returning to headquarters. In a recent letter he stated that he got a break in March, when he spent seven days on the Riviera with his general and another officer. Lt. Harris expects to visit Ranger friends as soon as his leave is granted.

## Willis H. Clarke With Air Force Gets Promotion

An Air Service Command Depot, England — The promotion of Willis H. Clarke from Private to Private First Class was announced today in England, by Brig. Gen. Morris Bergman, commanding general Base Air Depot A-6, Air Service Command. Pfc. Clarke is serving as an aircraft mechanic with the Air Service Command, the organization that backs the air war in Europe by readying new front-line planes for action, speeding them to supplies to forward air bases, delivering bombs and ammunition to combat stations and repairing battle-damaged aircraft. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Clarke of 507 Elm Street, Ranger, Texas. Before entering the army in April 1943, he was attending the University of Texas.

## CONNALLY ASKS HURRIED OK FOR CHARTER

WASHINGTON (UP) — The Senate received an impassioned plea today to speed ratification of the United Nations security charter as a spur to its acceptance by the rest of the world. Chairman Tom Connally, D. Tex., of the Senate foreign relations committee, a delegate to the San Francisco conference which drafted the charter, opened one of the most momentous debates in U. S. history with a report on the success of his mission. He pleaded for approval of the charter with the argument that "the fate of world peace may depend upon our decision." He said the charter could not succeed without this nation's participation. President Truman is scheduled to transmit the charter to the Senate next Monday. Connally's speech opened an administration campaign to get it ratified by mid-August, possibly making this nation the first in the world to formally approve the charter.

## L. R. Pearson Is Speaker At Meet Of Rotary Club

L. R. Pearson, representative of the 107th legislative district, was speaker at the meeting of the Rotary club held Wednesday at noon at the Gholson hotel. Pearson gave a detailed explanation of the four amendments which are proposed for the Texas constitution. In a business session, members gave a vote of thanks and appreciation to C. E. May, retiring president. He will be succeeded by Dr. G. C. Russell who takes office at the meeting next week.

## Italy Occupation To Terminate By The Year's End

WASHINGTON (UP) — U. S. occupation of Italy will be terminated by the end of this year except for some small forces. Gen. Joseph T. McNarney declared today. The commander of the U. S. forces in the Mediterranean, back in Washington for a brief visit, said also that Gen. Mark W. Clark will head U. S. occupation forces in Austria, with headquarters at Vienna.

## PRESIDENT TO NOMINATE NEW SEC. MONDAY

KANSAS CITY, Mo., (UP) — President Truman will send his nomination for the new secretary of state to the Senate on Monday, Charles G. Ross, Presidential press secretary, announced today. Ross said that Edward E. Stettinius, Jr., whose resignation as secretary of state President Truman accepted yesterday, will have an office in the White House. Stettinius was named by the president as the American representative to the United Nations organization when it is formed. Ross also revealed Mr. Truman had received the resignation of Lewis Schwellenbach as federal district judge in the state of Washington, who will become the new secretary of labor.

This was Kansas City Day in the homecoming welcome for the president. He was to go to the campus of the University of Kansas City for a picnic lunch after spending the morning at his federal building office. Before tonight's festivities, he said he planned to get some rest at his independence home. The president goes back to Washington Sunday. He will send the United Nations charter to the Senate on Monday and probably will nominate his old friend James F. Byrnes as the new secretary of state on Tuesday.

## Civilians To Get More Meat

WASHINGTON (UP) — Civilians will get five per cent more meat in July than in June, the Office of Price Administration disclosed today. But during the newly July 1-28 rationing period they must pay more points for margarine and canned fish. OPA raised points on margarine from 12 to 14 per pound and on canned fish, currently worth from four to nine points, by two and three points.

## GI's Ingenuity Produces Vital Therapy Machine

HQS. SERVICES OF SUPPLY, Kunning, China (UP) — American ingenuity scored again and a station hospital here has a short-wave diathermy machine. Need for the apparatus became urgent when a soldier arrived at the hospital with a partially paralyzed nerve in his left foot. Doctors said short wave diathermy would make the difference between paralysis and complete recovery. But the hospital had no equipment for this type of treatment. Pfc. Jack S. Castiglia, son of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Castiglia (21-21 Sheffield Ave.), Chicago, whose hobby in civilian life had been building things from scrapped or junked metal, got to work on the machine. Without plans or previous knowledge of the intricate mechanism, Castiglia consulted with Lt. Joan Landers, (82 Collins Rd.) Waban, Mass, head physical therapist at the hospital and produced the machine—using junked airplane parts. Not only did it cure the patient for whom it was originally built, but also is now serving as part of the regular medical equipment of the station hospital. The hospital is under the command of Col. Aleksai A. Leonidoff of Poughkeepsie, N. Y.

## World War Photo Done In Oils For Gen. Marshall

WASHINGTON (UP) — Gen. George C. Marshall's favorite photograph of the first World War has been reproduced in oils by an artist sergeant of this war and now hangs in the chief of staff's office at the War Department. The picture is the work of S. Sgt. Wallace E. Broden, who presented it to Gen. Marshall. It shows a group of soldiers singing in a church at Vaux, a few miles south of Sedan, where they stopped for a brief rest Nov. 5, 1918. Light filters through stained glass windows onto the drab khaki battle dress of the soldiers. One soldier is playing the organ. Some of his companions are singing. Others sit quietly, wrapped in thought, leaning against an ancient grained vase before the altar. The faces are solemn and inspired. The original photograph was taken by an Army photographer.

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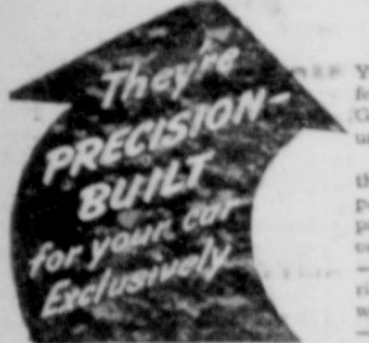


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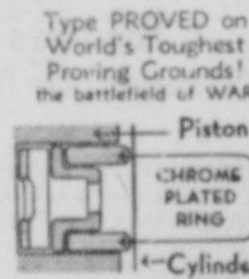
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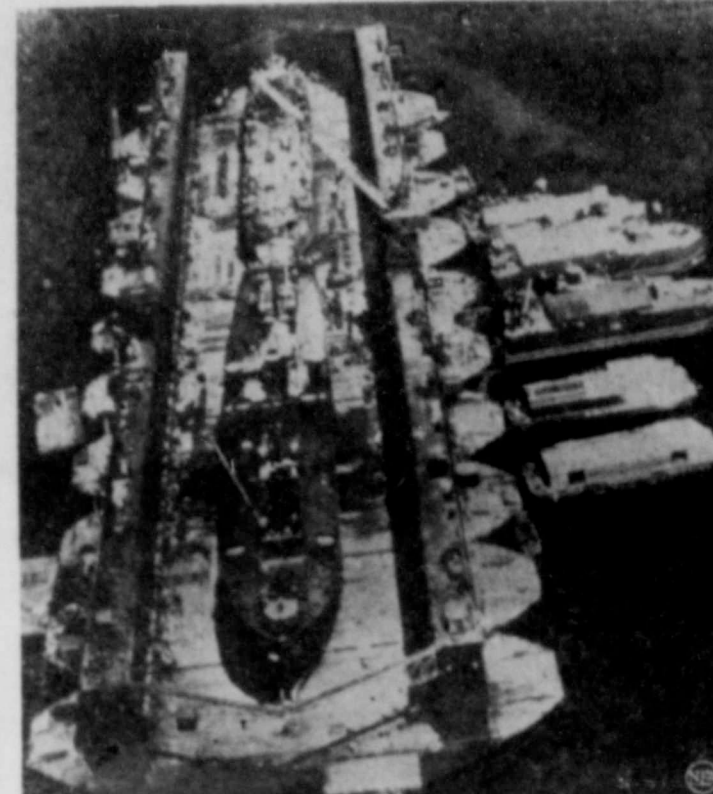
## Rodeo To Have Wartime Version

Camp Wolters, Texas - Major General Bruce Magrader, Commanding General of this Infantry Replacement Training Center and Colonel Earl C. Fiegel, Camp Commander were on hand in Weatherford, Texas, Wednesday, June 27, to welcome home the first Commanding General of Camp Wolters, Lt. Gen. William Hood Simpson, who commanded the American Ninth Army to victory in Europe.

In the Mighty Seventh War Loan currently under way, Camp Wolters has apparently surpassed the largest quota assigned to this camp, \$600,000 in war bond sales. Although final figures will not be available until the close of the drive July 7th, the present condition of sales to military and civilian personnel is well beyond comparative quotas set for this point in the drive.

The program is designed to acquaint the public with the Army Chaplains Corps, which carries the standards of God with America's fighting men to glory.
