WASHINGTON COLUMN

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif.—All the problems of the United Nations Conference, reduced to their simplest terms and to situations which anyone can understand, are to be found in San Francisco's Raphael Well public school. Here, under principal Edith Fifer, are grouped...

There are no American Indians, but sitting side by side in the same classrooms are youngsters of every complexion and many nationalities: tow-headed Nordic whites and swarthy Latin whites, Mexicans, Filipinos and Chinese. There used to be Japanese, before they were all moved into relocation centers after Pearl Harbor. American Negroes from the South and Southwest moved in where the Japs moved out, but soon some of the Japanese families may be coming back.

The question posed by this minute cross-section of humanity is why the people of the world—keeping their respectful distances from one another—can't get along with or without trusteeship systems, mandates and voting formulas if the children of the Raphael Well school can't get along in the same classrooms.

It is possible to talk about the Raphael Well school and its problems with considerable detachment and tolerance, and without upsetting any individual's pet racial or religious prejudices, because the situation is so universal and at the same time so representative of one of the things that ails the world today.

The first Chinese, a man and his wife, came into California less than 100 years ago. Then ship captains brought increasing numbers to supply the demand for cheap labor, and to build the first transcontinental railroad. When they became too numerous, the Exclusion Act was passed in 1882. During the next 25 years the Japanese came to supply farm labor. World War I brought a wave of Mexicans and Filipinos, again to meet a labor shortage. World War II has brought the Negroes—perhaps 150,000 of them as against the 130,000 Japanese, who were moved out. Negroes like it there. There are no Jim Crow laws. They want to stay.

SAN FRANCISCO civic groups have begun educational campaigns—the Commonwealth Club, a newly-formed Council for Civic Unity, and a Mayors' Committee. Back of them all is the realization that better housing for minority groups is essential and that segregation in Chinatown or similar racial concentrations where there are property ownership and residence restrictions, merely increase the problem. A racially mixed communist element, having an emotional and glandular reaction to everything, has been a major-disturbing factor.

THE sudden death of Lou Fink, veteran trainer who conditioned Gene Tunney and Tony Canzone, for their championship fights, came as a distinct shock to the cauliflower colony. Dutch, as he was popularly known in boxing circles, was the last guy anybody would expect to die of natural causes.

Lou Fink knew how to live right, maintain health and build the body into physical perfection. That was his life job, keeping men in good physical shape.

Fink served in the medical corps during the first World War, and did a special job of conditioning and reconditioning our doughboys. Tunney and Canzone gave Fink credit for the superb physical condition they maintained during their fighting careers.

FINK did not confine his activities to professional fighters, however. Like the late Jimmy De Forest, Lou numbered among his clients many men prominent in business, the arts and affairs of the nation. He kept their bodies in condition by visiting them in the morning, putting them through a course of exercises and rubbing the kinks out of their muscles.

Fink's real name was Louis Eberling. He was born in the heart of New York's west side in 1889, a year after the famous blizzard. Of medium size and muscular build, dark-haired and blue-eyed, he looked at least 10 years younger than his 56.

On one occasion Lou was engaged to train a heavyweight for an important fight. He got his charge in superb physical condition but the better went down to defeat in a few rounds. A technical knockout, the referee called it.

Whitey Binstein, one of the best seconds in the business, couldn't understand the fighter's defeat. "What was wrong with him?" he asked Lou Fink. "He looked in grand condition. He should have been able to take more punishment than he did. That other guy didn't hit him any real hard punches."

"There was nothing wrong with his condition," said Lou. "He just hasn't got any heart. That's one thing I can't give any man." Lou Fink dropped dead. It was his heart, the doctors said.

1. Sign up for at least one voyage on a merchant ship bringing soldiers home from Europe if you are a competent chef, butcher, or baker. Sea experience is unnecessary. Wire collect. Merchant Marine, Washington 25, D. C.
2. Use and put up all the fresh peaches you can. They may be the only plentiful fruit crop this summer, and commercially canned fruits will continue scarce next winter. However, ask for no more rations sugar than you will actually use. By taking only your fair share, you will help make the short supply go round.
3. Enlist your Shepherd, Schuauer, Pinscher, or farm Collie dog in the Army K-9 Corps. The need is urgent for scout dogs to spot Jap snipers and save American lives. Write or wire Quartermaster General, Washington, 25, D. C.

Aiming directly at the previously mentioned postwar competition the Texas and Pacific, together with the Missouri Pacific, is one of the surface carriers attempting to enter the aviation field with an extensive feeder line paralleling its ground route. T&P TO MEET CHALLENGE OF AIR TRAFFIC

Railroads can never compete with the cross-country schedules of the air lines on a time basis, but through improved service and equipment will try valiantly to meet post war competition from this source, W. G. Vollmer said Friday.

The dignified white-haired new president of the Texas and Pacific Railway, who says he has one hobby, "having good friends," sat in his office Friday morning and told of the T&P's postwar plans for purchase of lightweight, streamlined, luxury passenger equipment which he believes will go far toward making train travel a choice in many cases over the speedier airliners.

"Of course, we will not be able to compete in the case of the busy businessman who must get from coast to coast in a hurry," said Vollmer. "But always, for instance, for the family traveling on a vacation where time is no essence, factors such as spaciousness, beautifully equipped dining cars, sleeping accommodations and the like will be in our favor."

"I welcome the competition of the airlines. Like all competition, it is a good thing and results inevitably in better service for the public."

"I take exception only to the heavy subsidization of other forms of transportation with federal funds, while the user of these facilities provided by the taxpayers does not pay his full share of the cost."

Mr. Vollmer said he referred to both airports and highways. He said in his opinion municipalities might provide airports, but users of the ports should in turn be charged rental fees on a sound investment basis. The railroads, he claims, have paid back "many times over" the subsidization in the form of land grants, which originally enabled them to pioneer, by rate concessions to the federal government on the hauling of men and materials during the country's wars.

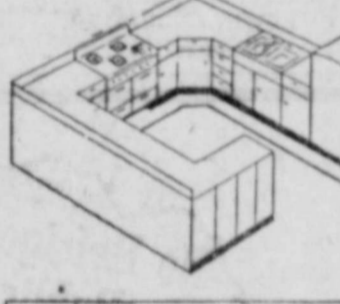
Another step toward meeting postwar conditions will be the establishment at once of a public relations department, Vollmer said. "We want people to understand the aims and activities of the T&P, the friendly spirit in which it expects to provide transportation."

Vollmer was the guest of honor Thursday noon at a luncheon given by Fred F. Florence at the Hotel Adolphus and attended by about 150 civic and business leaders. Welcome to the new chief, who began his career as a railroading man 43 years ago in Cincinnati, was extended by Florence, J. B. Adoue, Jr., and E. F. McLain.

At the luncheon Vollmer requested public understanding of the Bulwinkle bill which would clarify the position of all railroads in relation to the anti-trust laws. He pledged himself to assist in every way in the growth, betterment and development of the Southwest.

He predicts travel by train after the war will drop to about 1940 levels, with no tremendous influx of "hoarded vacations" jamming
