WASHINGTON, D. C.—When American, British, French and Russian supreme commanders in the Allied Control Council get to work in Berlin, one of their first concerns will be to round up and wipe out the German General Staff.



This highly specialized job will consist of settling the fate of what's left of a select corps estimated at 2200 to 2500 officers, most of whom are believed to be still alive.
In the World War I period they would all have come from the old German Junkers officer class.

Weak spot in the German General Staff set-up, according to U. S. military authorities, was that it was never able to keep ahead of Hitler. The German General Staff took Hitler to its bosom when he became political leader of the Reich, but thereafter it was never able to keep him in control.

TO find where the once-proud wearers of the red-striped pants are now will take some searching. Some are in Russian, British and French hands. Those taken prisoner by the U. S. are kept segregated in Germany, can easily be tried and treated as they deserve.

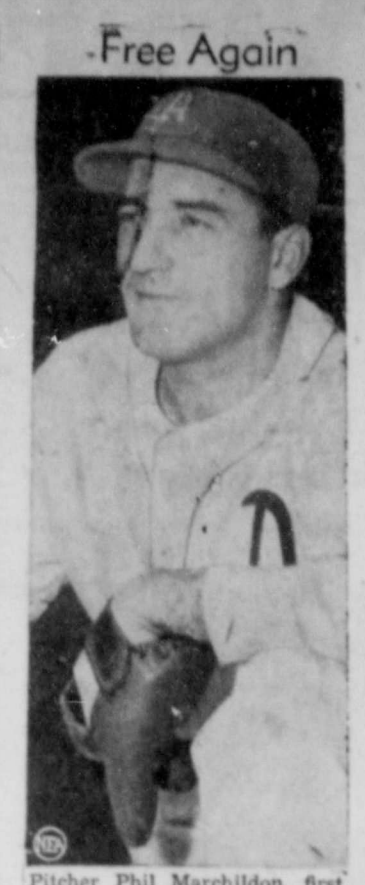
New War Ration Book To Appear In December

For Farm Slaughter
A ceiling price has been established for the grading of beef, veal, lamb or mutton by commercial freezer or locker plants for farm slaughterers, OPA announced, the ceiling, effective July 30, 1945 is 12 1/2 cents per hundred pounds of meat graded, computed to the next highest multiple of five cents.

Quotas Of Civilian Tires Set For August
August quotas of 2,500,000 passenger car tires and 386,562 small truck tires for civilian motorists, exactly the same as for July, and a reduced quota of large truck tires were announced by WPB and OPA.

Special gasoline rations for moving trailers used by workers who move from job to job will be issued hereafter only if the workers are employed at essential establishments or construction projects, OPA says. Previously, gasoline rations could be issued for moving a house trailer to be used as housing for a person in connection with his occupation, without regard to the kind of work performed.

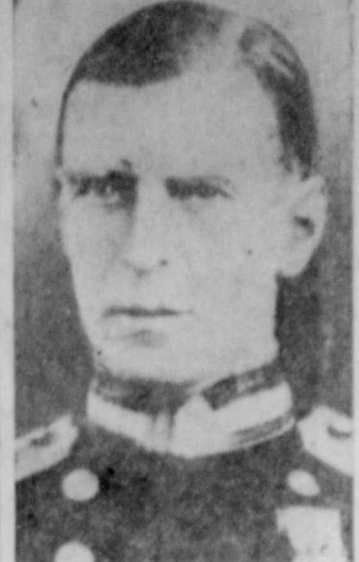

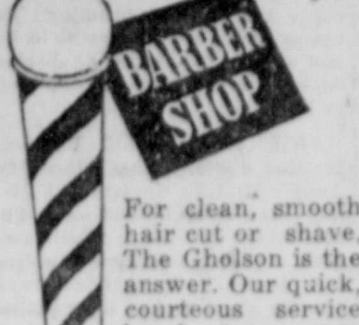

AMG LOCATES ITALIAN HOMES FOR ANIMALS

ROME (UP) — AMG thinks of everything. With the same dispatch exercised in handling the camps for displaced persons in the rest of Europe, camps for displaced animals have been established in Italy.

Fifth Army's Public Relations Division disclosed that the Fifth Army's Military Government Division has "interviewed" some 20,000 horses and mules which were used as "slave laborers" by German Army and have started repatriating them to the little Italian farms, where they already are re-living again and women who have been holding down their jobs.

In an official announcement, the Public Relations Office said AMG had worked out a sort of "point system" for displaced horses and asses, "based on how many dependents the horse has at home, of course." Then A M G started a huge roundup in the Po Valley. All the horses were herded into their own "DP" camp and branded with a large "CA" meaning "captured animal".

Lt. Col. Stanley Andrews of Little Rock, Ark., agricultural officer for the Fifth Army, is trying to get 18,000 more horses back from Austria to Italy.

In addition, AMG is dealing in sheep, cattle and goats bleating, mooing and bawling along the Austrian border.

Aside from their racket, which must be terrific, there's the clamor raised by currently unemployed shepherds and cowhands, who want to get these animals out of AMG compounds into their home ranges, and AMG is hopeful of arranging some sort of international passport for the beasts under the displaced animals program.

The Patterson Cannery at Cooper, Texas, processes boned chicken for the Army.

Since Pearl Harbor, Texas has produced 25,510 planes, second only to Kansas which made 31,071.
