## Forts Attack Amagasaki, Jap Oil Center

### COUNTY TAX RATE REDUCED TO .90 CENTS

County Judge P. L. Crossley has filed with the County Clerk a tentative budget showing the Income and Expenditures of the County for the calendar year 1946. A tax rate of .90 on the \$100.00 of taxable value was proposed in this budget. Since then the Commissioner's Court has completed its work as a board of equalization, and it is estimated the taxable values of the County for the tax paying year 1945-1946 will be slightly under \$19,000,000.00.

In view of this and the unprecedented collection of delinquent taxes for this year it has been determined that the Tax Rate for the 1945-1946 tax paying year will be set at 90 cents on the 100.00 of taxable value. This is a reduction of 10 cents in the rate proposed in the budget and a reduction of 26 cents in the rate of last year, which is \$1.16 on the \$100 valuation. This will be the lowest tax rate Eastland County has had in approximately 30 years. Which will mean a saving to the tax payers of Eastland County during the coming tax paying year of approximately \$50,000.00.

The Commissioners' Court has had many compliments from all over the County lauding their efforts to collect delinquent taxes, because it is generally known that our tax rate has been double the amount it would have been if the taxes had been collected in prior years.

A public hearing will be held on the County Budget in the Commissioners' Court room, at the Court House, Monday, August 20th, at 2 p. m. The entire budget will be discussed at this meeting and the public is earnestly and cordially invited to attend.

### BOBBY SOXERS ROLLER SKATE TO PASS TIME

CHICAGO (UP)—The Bobby Soxers have invaded the roller skating rink.

They have their own equipment, clothes, fashions, dances and code of behavior. Into Chicago's 11 big rinks and scores of smaller ones, they pour in for Sunday matinee skating by the thousands. More than 70 per cent of high school students skate regularly.

Young people have always done some skating, according to Lois Hoffman, 16, pert high school student who hasn't missed more than half a dozen Sunday sessions in the three years she has been skating.

But the war has given the sport a new popularity. The shortage of men has hit the upper high school age brackets and so the girls go skating.

Besides, except for the cost of the skates, it's an inexpensive recreation. And there is a chance to meet a few young men.

The Soxers observe some interesting customs about their boy friends.

"We don't care for the boys from our own classes," Lois says, "and vice versa. We like to meet other boys."

They meet them at the rinks. It's all right to accept a skating invitation from a stranger, but absolutely taboo to ask a boy to skate.

The code of behavior dictates that a girl may not accept a date from a boy she has met at the rinks. When Lois likes them, she brings them home to have dinner with the family.

Standard equipment is a pair of high-top white leather laced shoes with skates attached. These sell from \$16.50 a pair up to special jobs existing as much as \$50.

The girls usually carry a rattan comb tucked into the top of the right shoe. Some carry a handkerchief and a few park their small change and lipstick in the top of one of their shoes.

A blouse and a short colored skirt is the usual ensemble. A few girls wear slacks. Shorts are not permitted in most rinks.

Brightly colored satchels, about the size of a small trunk, are used to carry skates, compacts, wallets and other personal items. The outside of the satchel is plastered with various insignia, such as colored paper pennants from an all-boys school. The male skaters paste pinup girl pictures on the inside covers of their satchels.

The Soxers have clubs with caste lines based on skating ability. Clubs in school may belong to a club such as the Tiger Rollers, a high school club to which Lois belongs. She doesn't skate well enough to belong to the outside clubs whose members are expert.

Most of the rinks sponsor skating lessons including the fox trot, waltz and what are known as international dances. These are standard throughout the country.

Appointments are for six year terms.

The Brazos River Conservation and Reclamation District extends from the New Mexico State line to the Gulf of Mexico and takes in the water shed drained by the Brazos river and its tributaries, which includes Eastland County.

Mrs. Sparks is survived by her husband, one daughter, and four sons, Frank of Eastland; Edgar of Melrose, New Mexico; Lige of Fort Sumner, New Mexico and Crockett of Portales, New Mexico, and sixteen grandchildren.

### WPB GETS ORDER

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Truman today ordered the War Production Board to emphasize a five-point program to pave the way for "an orderly transition from war production to civilian production."

### S. D. PRESLAR IS PROMOTED TO LT. COL.

Mrs. Sanford D. Preslar received a cablegram from her husband Wednesday informing her that he has been promoted to lieutenant colonel. The message arrived on the couple's wedding anniversary.

Lt. Col. Preslar is now stationed with the Armed Forces in Marseilles, France and was recently awarded the Bronze Star for accomplishments in connection with the civilian project of which he has charge.

He has been in the service since September 1940 and has been in foreign service since early in 1943. He has been stationed in North Africa before being sent to France.

### Quick Action Saves Trio From Sudden Death

McCluskey General Hospital, Temple, Texas - Death was cheated by S-Sgt. Arthur E. Burch of Ranger, Texas and two other GIs when they threw a red hot "screaming mimi" shell out of their foxhole before it had time to explode.

"It was during the battle for Cassino," declared Sergeant Burch, "and three of us were out in when this 'screaming mimi' rolled over the bank down into our foxhole. It landed on my helmet but it didn't explode. The shell was red hot, so my two buddies took a shelter half and threw it out. It rolled down the rocky hillside and exploded when it reached the bottom. We were just lucky."

Burch served with Texas' own 36th Division for three years. He spent 15 months overseas. He was wounded near Cassino in the left arm by shrapnel.

Sergeant Burch is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Burch of Ranger, Texas. His wife, Lucile, also resides here.

### Russia, Allies Coordinate Drive

CHUNGKING (UP)—Lt. Gen. Albert C. Wedemeyer disclosed today the Russian offensive in Manchuria has been closely coordinated with Allied operations in China and the Pacific.

He announced that American-trained Chinese parachute troops have gone into action against the Japanese for the first time.

### W. P. Bradford Dies; Funeral Held Thursday

Funeral services for William Payne Bradford of Route 3, Ranger, were conducted Thursday afternoon at the Mount Zion church at 4 o'clock with Rev. A. B. Armstrong of Millspic in charge of the services. Interment was in the Yeale cemetery and arrangements were by Morris Funeral Home of Ranger.

Mr. Bradford died at his home Wednesday, August 8. He was born February 20, 1857 in Tennessee and had resided in or near Ranger for the past 52 years. He was a member of the Methodist church.

Survivors include three sons, B. T. Bradford, R. E. Bradford and A. N. Bradford of Ranger, a daughter, Mrs. Lillie A. Houston, Ranger and nine grandchildren, and six great grand children.

### Egypt Calls Out Its Army To Repel Locusts

CAIRO (UP)—Four hundred Egyptian Army units have been called out to fight off the greatest locust threat in Egypt's history and are employing both modern and ancient methods in their war against the hoppers.

Under the supervision of Department of Agriculture experts, servicemen are using poison gas, poisoned bait, and the ancient but effective method of digging trenches into which insects are driven, then buried.

The locusts at present are marching their "invasion" forces out in the wide expanse of the Sinai and Eastern deserts, and have found an ally in the recent storm which drenched the sands, leaving a carpet of greenery. On these "field rations" the locusts are feeding and growing, gaining strength for their devastating drive on local crops, which is expected some time this month unless counter-measures prove successful.

### Testifies Petain Favored German Collaboration

PARIS (UP)—Fernand De Brinon, former Vichy ambassador to German-occupied Paris, testified in the French high court today that Marshal Henri Philippe Petain always favored collaboration with Germany.

De Brinon was put on the witness stand by the court over the protest of the prosecution, yet his testimony was regarded by some observers as some of the most damaging to the defense which has yet been presented in the treason trial of Petain.

### CHOW FOLLOWS BOMBING RUN OVER TOKYO

CLEVELAND, O. (UP)—The most important thing to the crew of a B-29 after it returns from a 3500-mile run over Tokyo, is "chow."

Tom Maloney, editor and publisher of "U. S. Camera," one of the first correspondents to fly a mission with the superfortresses over the enemy capital, said chow is almost essential after a mission's return.

Maloney made the flight over Tokyo last Easter Sunday from Guam. The "run" was made to photograph the damage done by the raiding B-29's a few hours before, but the thrill and excitement of a photographic mission is the same as being on a regular bombing run, he said.

Maloney said the crew and officers eat together: steaks, french fries, ice cream and a good two ounce shot of whisky. On the Tokohama Yu Yo—that's the fortress he flew in—officers have a further custom. Their drinks go to the crew, on the well known theory that the crew deserves the whisky.

The editor who is an executive in the Newell-Emmett Co., advertising agency, spent some time on two Jima and Okinawa and traveled 25,000 miles in the air on this latest Pacific mission. Previously he was in Europe and Greenland as a correspondent.

### Truman To Tell Background Of Russia's Move

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Truman's radio report to the nation at 9 o'clock tonight will reveal some of the background of Soviet Russia's agreement to join the Allies in the Pacific, White House Press Secretary Charles G. Ross said today.

The 30-minute address over all networks also will supply additional details of the Big Three conference, and will deal briefly with the atomic bomb. Ross said the speech would be about 3,600 words long.

### Jap Political Association Has Important Meet

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—The Japanese political association, called an "emergency meeting" Thursday afternoon and held an "important conference" relating to the rapidly changing war situation, Tokyo radio reported today in a broadcast recorded by United Press, San Francisco.

Gen. Jiro Misami, president of the association, requested an audience with government and military leaders at the residence of the Prime Minister Adm. Baron Katsuo Suzuki Thursday night, Tokyo said.

### Lt. Plumley Is Hospitalized In El Paso, Texas

Mrs. Frank Plumley and daughter left Wednesday for El Paso to be with First Lt. Plumley who has been hospitalized there.

Lt. Plumley has just returned from the Pacific theatre of operations where on June 15 he was wounded on Okinawa. He had written his family that he planted the first American flag to fly on Okinawa.

With the Infantry, Lt. Plumley is a veteran of the Marshall Islands campaign and of Leyte and for action in the latter campaign was awarded the Bronze Star.

### War Vehicles Leave Marks On Landscape

DETROIT (UP)—The war which has so devastated Europe has also left marks on the nation's automotive highways and landscaped hills.

Smooth pavements have been broken and rutted by heavy military vehicles and hills scarred with shell holes, a survey by the Automotive Council for War Production reveals.

However through the process of pounding the proving grounds and wearing out military vehicles under tests automotive engineers have found how to give American fighting men the best weapons possible.

On three representative proving grounds throughout the country, military vehicles have been put through rigorous road tests of nearly 2,500,000 miles in 36 months.

In some of the typical tests, tanks, trucks or auto cars roar over the highways, rip through axle - detour mudholes and climb hills. Sometimes the vehicles are sent up a 60 per cent grade, so steep a man is unable to walk it without rubber soled shoes.

For the final, vehicles are put through a 5,000 mile endurance trial over all the roads and obstacles provided by the proving ground.

After the test has been completed the vehicles are torn down and inspected for wear and tear.

### Jap Broadcast Message Coming Says Important

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—A Japanese Domei broadcast told the agency's clients today to watch for an "important announcement" to be carried in subsequent transmissions.

The broadcast said a special transmission would be made at or after 7:35 A. M. CWT but gave no clue to the nature of the announcement. FCC reported the broadcast.

Later Domei sent another message to its bureaus in the orient telling them to stand by for possible emergency transmissions during the 6 P. M. 9:30 P. M. and 11 P. M. transmissions tonight, Friday and Saturday.

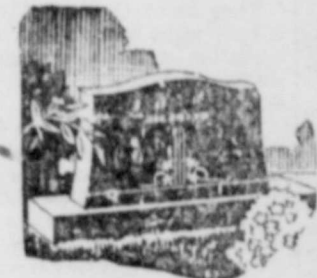
