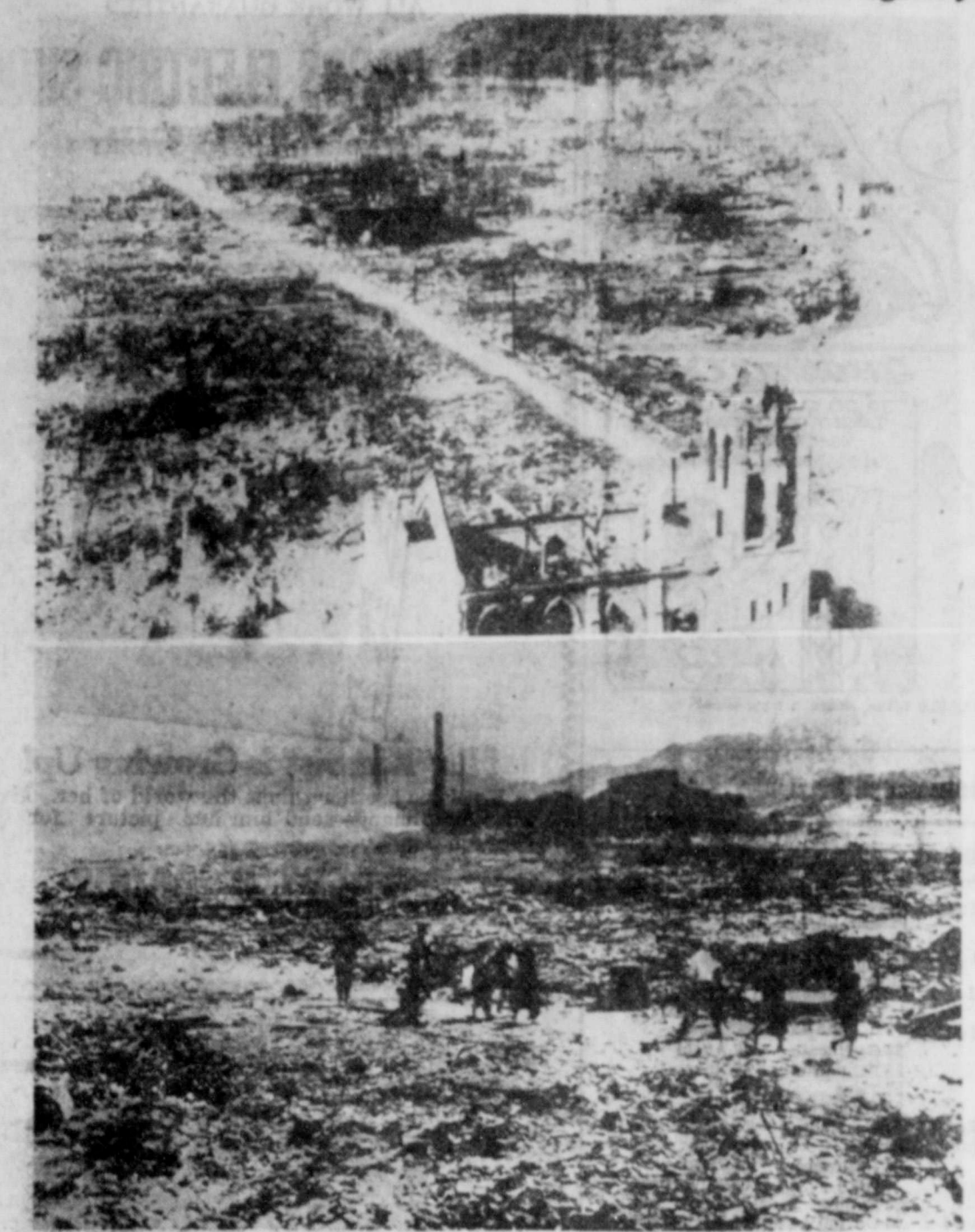

## Atomic Bomb Damage Pictures From Domei News Agency

## GI'S FLYING HOME GET BIG LIFT AT NATAL

PARNAMIRN FIELD, Natal, Brazil (UP) — This is where combat veterans from Europe and the Mediterranean — 22,000 of them a month — begin the ride they've been waiting for. Refreshed after eating hot meals and sleeping between clean white sheets, the first time in months for many of them, they take off for Miami in C-47 Skytrains which leave here every 38 minutes 'round the clock. Not long ago the Natal Base was the jumping off point for Europe and Africa. Today, with its personnel expanded 300 per cent since V-E day, it is the focal point of the "green project," the Air Transport Command's redeployment scheme under which veterans are flown home for furloughs or honorable discharges. The ribbon-bedecked troops, with 18 months to three years overseas service behind them, board the bucket-seat planes laden with famed Natal ration-free mosquito boots, silk stockings, alligator bags, perfumes and jewelry—and a goodly quantity of "cokes" under the belts—all purchased here in the Post Exchange. Perhaps a day or so before, they landed here in 40-passenger C-54s—fired, the lines in their faces betraying what they had done and what they had seen. Daily, 18 of these four-engine transports, like wise with bucket-seats, make the nine-hour flight from Dakar to Natal, bearing 720 troops. When the giant aircraft come to a stop on the mile-and-a-half runways, Brazilian army men go aboard immediately and spray the plane while American medical officers take the temperatures of the passengers to determine whether any has fever. While this goes on an officer "briefs" the men for their stay in Natal and, seven minutes after landing they are off the plane, heading for their barracks. These are homesick men. They have lived in foxholes, washed socks in their helmets, accustomed themselves to the blast of heavy guns and the screams of wounded men. More like than not they have been wounded at one time or another themselves. They aren't very talkative and their faces lack expression when they come off the plane. There is an impressive contrast between them and the outbound passengers who, after a day or two of rest in Natal, are embarking for Miami. Here they are free to come and go as they please within the limits of post regulations. They are given cigarette rations, have a 24-hour mess and 24-hour movies, may engage in athletic contests and may occupy their time a dozen other ways. For most of them, the routine immediately after landing is the same. They dump their baggage and head for the "coke" line. It is a familiar sight to see a Yank, three to six service stripes on his arm, with as many bottles of "cokes" in his hands, drinking them one after the other until he can hold no more. Next they enter Natal's fabulous Post Exchange, an establishment that did \$600,000 worth of business in July alone. Almost to a man they stock up on Natal boots and then begin the collecting of gifts to take home. In one morning recently, the PEP sold 1,000 pairs of silk stockings. A land-office business is done in alligator bags which retail here at one-third to one-half the price in America. The men redeployed in the "green project" are mainly veterans who have been separated in one way or another from their units overseas. Every insignia in the army is seen here at one time or another. Most are not high-point men and, according to surface priority systems, might have been stranded in Europe for as many as 18 months if they had waited for ships. None, however, is ordered to fly, and one or two who have balked after getting this far have been taken to Recife, Brazil, and transported thence to the States by surface vessel. Soon after taking off here, 20 men to a plane, the veterans are over the Brazilian jungles, en route to Atkinson Field, British Guiana; Borinquen Field, Puerto Rico, and Miami.

## Boyce House Is For Legislative Special Session

FT. WORTH, Tex., Sept. 4 — A special session to pass legislation necessary to make effective the newly-adopted Constitutional amendment on old age assistance was urged by Boyce House, author and newspaper-radio columnist, in a letter to Governor Stevenson, made public today. The letter states: "An increase in amount of grants for old age assistance in Texas has been authorized by the voters of this State. As a citizen, I earnestly request that you convene the legislature in special session to pass the necessary legislation to make effective the amendment which the people of Texas have written into the Constitution. "The legislature should be convened to adopt the needed legislation, whether this amendment is permissive or mandatory. It is the Constitution now; let's live up to it."

## High School Sets Up Classes For Veterans

ROCHESTER, N. Y. (UP) — Returning GIs will be able to take advantage of a special program designed to enable servicemen to finish high school requirements. Private classrooms have been set apart in a local high school, where the keynote will be informality. Smoking is to be permitted in the semi-tutorial classes. The unit will be headed by Fred W. Myers, recently discharged Army captain and formerly high school instructor. In the Air Force he served as leader of an instruction program at ground school in Marfa, Texas. Individualized instruction will permit the discharged servicemen to complete their work at double the ordinary progress. In addition to the regular high school curriculum, classes will be conducted in radio-communications and vocational pursuits. The veterans will have access at all times to the gymnasium and swimming pool in the building. There will be no charge to veterans—even textbooks will be free.

## Colonel's Son, 8 Made Three Striper For Day

SALT LAKE CITY (UP) — The Army's youngest "staff sergeant" was called up for active duty at Fort Douglas, Utah, and served the shortest "hitch" in military history. The young soldier offered his services to Capt. Charles Winkler post special services officer, to help lynch the Army's all-musical show "Egg in Your Beer," which was presented recently at the fort. He was accepted and placed on limited service duty. This dual distinction was held by eight-year old Tommy Cunningham, son of Lt. Col. and Mrs. T. J. Cunningham of Fort Douglas. Tommy was armed with handbills and the authority of a first "three grader." He recruited five youthful "private" for his detail and then visited the favorite haunts of the soldiers on the post. The result of Tommy's efforts was that not an individual—military or civilian—on the post was unaware of the production of the show. When he reported his "mission completed," Capt. Winkler recommended his "discharge" for meritorious and honorable duty with the Army of the United States.

## Alvin Johnson Now Stationed At Norfolk, Va.

NORFOLK, Va.—Alvin Willis Johnson, 21, gander's mate, first class, USNR, of Ranger, Tex., arrived at the Naval Training Station, Norfolk, Va., on August 5, to undergo training for duties aboard a new destroyer of the Atlantic Fleet. A veteran of 16 months of duty aboard the destroyer escort USS Robert L. Paine in the Atlantic, he wears the American Area Ribbon with one combat star. Johnson was graduated from Ranger high school. Before enlisting in the Navy, he was employed by Swain's Pharmacy. Son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert E. Johnson of 518 Alice street, Ranger, he has a brother, Robert Jr., 24, who is an aviation metal smith third class, in the Navy.

## Auto Industry Hit Hard By Wave of Strikes

DETROIT (UP) — Production hicups overspread the automobile industry today in a wave of strikes growing from three years accumulation of union grievances. More than 20,000 workers were idle as strikes stopped passenger output at 7 plants of the Erigg's Manufacturing Company and four divisions of the Hudson Motor Car Company. Ford Motor Company halted auto assembly in the huge River Rouge plant and at branch plants in Edgewater, N. J., Louisville, Ky., and Dallas. At Dallas, 700 men were idle.

## Britain Will Continue Draft

LONDON (UP) — Britain will continue indefinitely to draft all able-bodied men between 18 and 30 for her armed services. Prime Minister Attlee announced the government's decision in a radio "fireside chat" last night. Only key construction workers will be exempt.

## Hirohito Asks Diet To Build Peaceful State

TOKYO (UP) — Emperor Hirohito, dressed in the khaki uniform of a grand marshal of the Japanese army, today commanded the first postwar session of the Imperial Diet to build a peaceful state from the ashes of his shattered nation. Opening the 88th session of Japan's legislature, Hirohito read an imperial rescript to a joint session of the House of Peers and the House of Representatives in the lavishly decorated building which stands unmarked in the bomb-blasted heart of Tokyo. Hirohito was in full uniform and he traveled from the palace in a well worn Rolls Royce. "The Emperor said — 'It is our desire that our people will surmount the manifold hardships and trials attending termination of the war, make manifest the innate glory of Japan's national policy and win the confidence of the world.'"

## Congress Opens Tomorrow; Faces Many Problems

WASHINGTON (UP) — Congress meets tomorrow in emergency session to deal with domestic and international problems ranging from repeal of federal war time to disposition of our atomic bomb secrets. The overall challenge to Congress is the cutting of a pattern for reconversion and our postwar economy. Wartime will succumb to farm state protests. President Truman has promised to make some suggestions in a message soon about the future of atomic secrets. ## Gobs Rush For Civies As Ban On Them Lifted

WASHINGTON (UP) — The first postwar rush on clothing stores began today as the Navy authorized all its personnel without in the United States to wear civilian clothes when not on duty. Gobs and gal sailors greeted the new order with yells of delight. There was no hint as to whether the Army will follow suit. ## Take Over Kyushu's Most Important Airfield And Large Port. Army Air Base Eight Miles From Tokyo Now Occupied

GENERAL MACARTHUR'S HEADQUARTERS, Yokohama (UP) — Thousands of American troops began the occupation of southern Japan by sea and air today, taking over Kyushu's most important airfield and a large port. Some 600 miles to the northeast, the first 200 of an ultimate force of 20,000 American air and ground force crewmen moved into the Tachikawa army air base, eight miles west of Tokyo, under an occupation program that will put troops in the Tokyo metropolitan district Friday. A delayed dispatch from John Grovers, representing the combined Allied press, datelined Dairen, Manchuria, said Americans of the Seventh Fleet task units had found the city virtually undamaged. Large scale transfer of troops from Atsugi to the Tachikawa airbase will begin Thursday, 19 days ahead of schedule. Gen. MacArthur, supreme commander, probably will move his headquarters from Yokohama to Tokyo proper next week. Japanese foreign minister Naramura Shigemitsu conferred at length with MacArthur today for the second straight day. Landings on the southern tip of Kyushu, southernmost of the Japanese islands, began at dawn without incident. Not a single Japanese plane was in the air. Japanese sources estimated that 2,500 troops of the American Sixth Army, veterans of the Philippines and New Guinea, will be stationed at Kanoya, most important airfield in southern Kyushu and formerly a base for Japanese planes attacking Okinawa.

## Texans Have 60 More New Laws To Be Observed

AUSTIN, Tex. (UP) — Texans today have more than 60 new laws to observe. They were enacted by the last legislature and became effective today — 90 days after end of the session. Included are statutes which raise the maximum gross weight load for motor trucks from 38,000 to 48,000 pounds, more extensive authority for the Texas Railroad Commission in regulating safety in liquefied petroleum gas sales, and four tax remissions for flood control. Another law provides state inspection of most and requires mufflers to be placed on motor boat engines operating near homes.

## British Marines Landing Today In Singapore

KASDI, Ceylon (UP) — Crack British Marines were expected to land today at vanguard of the Empire's night returning to the great naval base of Singapore, after Admiral Sir Arthur Power triumphantly led his East Indies fleet into the famous harbor last night. Re-entry into Singapore wipes out the bitter humiliation of one of the sternest military disasters in British history. Japs captured the stronghold three years, six months and 17 days ago. Although the Japs used Singapore for a naval base, only battered hulks of a few enemy warships remained.

## TO HAVE LIGHT

HOUSTON, Tex. (UP) — Houstonians will be "beginning to see the light" as light and power company officials notified the city utilities division that their orders for street lights can be filled since materials are available again. One thousand of the intercom circuit devices will be installed by the end of the year.

## Holiday Dead Reaches 252

By United Press Preliminary reports indicated today that the nation's three-day Labor celebration—its first peace time holiday weekend in four years—cost 252 dead and hundreds injured. The toll was highest on the highways where at least 139 died—17 of them in California but only a few in Texas.

## Three Texans Help Perfect Atomic Bomb

HOUSTON, Tex. (UP) — A Texan does not have to brag about his state; he merely has to look at the facts. Facts like the story of three Rice Institute scientists who helped to perfect the atomic bomb. The trio—Dr. H. A. Wilson, professor of physics; Dr. Tom W. Bonner, assistant professor of physics; and Dr. William E. Bennett, chief instructor of physics—went to Chicago where they worked with many other American scientists to beat the Germans to the perfection of the devastating weapon.

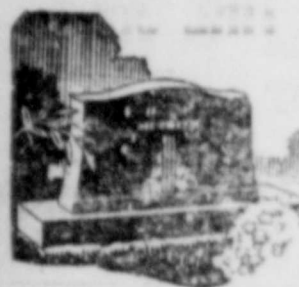

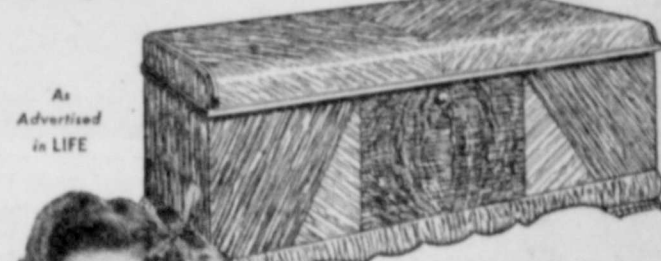

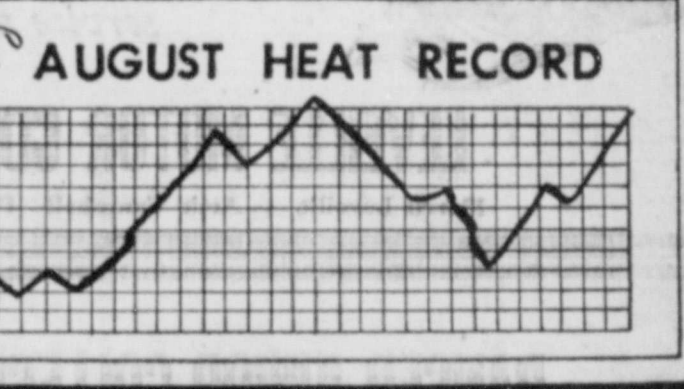
