Britains Seek Change In Wave Length Setup

LONDON (UP)—The technical committee of the British Radio Equipment Manufacturers Assn. has issued a plan for changing distribution of wave lengths in hopes of having it adopted by an international conference.

The committee's scheme called for shifting of local services of Great Britain and Europe to the lower end of the medium wave band and extending the present long wave band downwards.

On the fact that the longer the wave length, the greater the area of reliable service, this would give every European country two reliable national programs, the committee feels.

Other features of the proposed plan would be designed to reduce interference between stations and to improve quality of transmissions.

One association official said he believed "they will have to be an international conference on wave lengths and we hope this plan will be accepted."

White Collar Westinghouse Workers Strike

A back to work movement of Westinghouse Electric Corp. office workers went into reverse today as white-collar employees renewed their strike.

The walkout that started yesterday ended in the afternoon and then broke out again today, threw 12,000 workers into idleness at six offices of Westinghouse.

Despite the flareup by the Electric manufacture workers, the total number of workers idled by strikes throughout the nation declined. A United Press survey put the total out of work because of strikes at less than 90,000.

Houston Oil Refinery Fire Under Control

HOUSTON (UP)—After fighting desperately for almost 18 hours, Houston firemen today brought under control an oil fire at the eastern states refinery.

The blaze wrecked three large storage tanks, sent 26 persons to the hospital and threatened to envelop the entire Manchester residential and industrial area. The fire started late yesterday when lightning struck a crude oil storage tank. It flared out of control shortly after midnight.

Order Goes Out For Arrest Of Tojo's Cabinet

TOKYO (UP)—A general arrest order went out today for the entire Tojo cabinet that led Japan into war and 25 other Jap war criminals, including the infamous Lt. Gen. Masaharu Homma, perpetrator of the Bataan death march.

Homma took Gen. Wainwright's surrender on Corregidor and was directly responsible for the march from Bataan to Fort O'Donnell.

KOREA FREED

KEIJO, Korea (UP)—An American military government was established today to replace gradually the Jap administration that has held Korea in bondage since 1910.

ONE KILLED SEVERAL HURT IN ACCIDENT

In an accident which occurred about 9:30 P. M. Monday night between Alinga and Grant Town, Mrs. Johnnie Marie Bell of Strawn was fatally injured and several other people slightly injured including Miss Freda Hughes of Ranger who is in the West Texas Hospital for treatment.

Mrs. Bell who died while enroute to a doctor, was riding in a Ford car with Miss Edith Mann, J. F. Mann, and Shorty Mann who was reported to have been struck from the rear by an Oldsmobile in which Miss Hughes and R. L. Henslee were riding. The impact was said to have knocked the Ford car 168 feet from the accident.

Other occupants of the car were not critically injured and were dismissed after emergency treatment.

Both cars were reported to have been badly damaged.

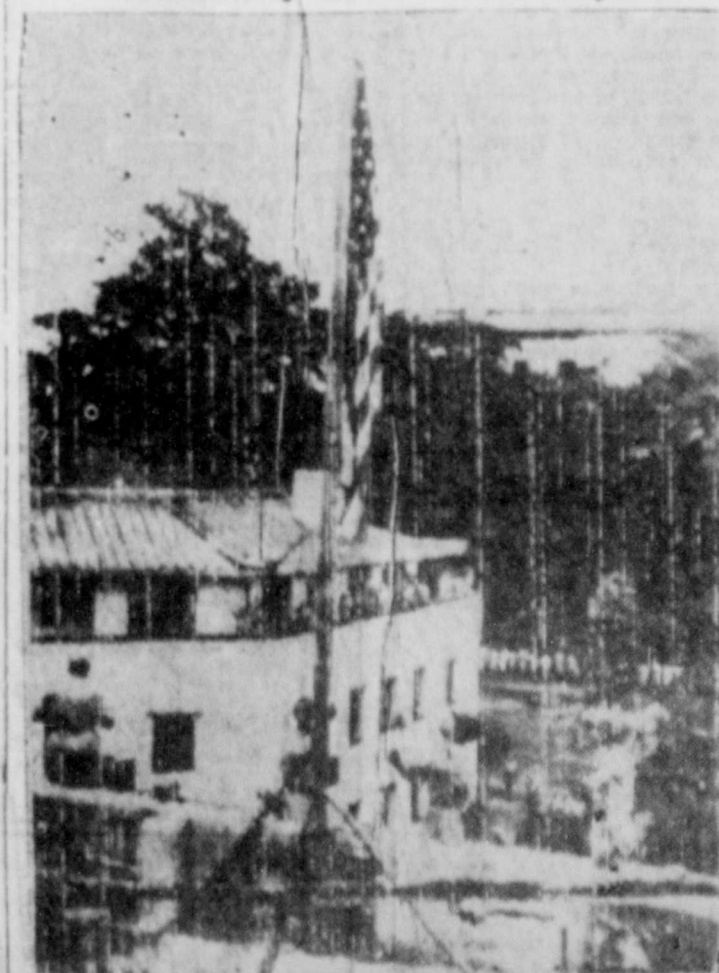
As zone chairman Dennis will preside at all zone meetings which are held quarterly at designated places in the zone.

John H. Ainsworth of Ranger has received word that his son, Sgt. Jessie A. Ainsworth, has been awarded the Bronze Star for meritorious achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy in France, Belgium and Germany, from July 1, 1944 to March 30, 1945.

Sgt. Ainsworth was serving with the signal corps and had been in foreign service since November 1943.

The father is making his home with another son, Monroe Ainsworth on Route 1, Ranger.

Ministers Of 5 Major Powers In Conference

LONDON (UP)—Foreign ministers of the world's five major powers met behind closed doors in London's Lancaster House today to seal across the conference table the peace won by force of arms.

All correspondents were barred from the opening session. The agenda was understood to be headed by the problem of drafting a peace treaty for Italy, first of the major Axis powers to surrender.

SHOOTS SELF AS AMERICANS ATTEMPT TO ARREST HIM

TOKYO (UP)—Former Premier Hideki Tojo, master mind of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, shot himself below the heart today and late tonight his life flickered low as he was taken to a U. S. Army hospital in Yokohama.

for the Pacific war, tried to kill himself by firing a bullet through his body when the U. S. Army sent a detail to his villa in suburban Tokyo to arrest him as Japan's top war criminal.

Sustained by plasma injections and semi-conscious, the little brown man who plunged more than half the population of the world into war was loaded into an American ambulance and taken by way of a first aid station near the Meiji shrine to the 98th Evacuation Hospital at Yokohama.

The Japanese foreign office asked that Tojo not be removed from his residence because of the gravity of his condition. But a U. S. Army doctor gave him a chance to survive, and the ambulance carted him away.

Hours after the shooting it was learned that Tojo made elaborate preparations for his death. The Japanese once emphatically demanded that he kill himself when Emperor Hirohito issued his rescript ending the war.

Capt. James Johnson, a U. S. Army doctor who stitched up Tojo's gaping wound and said he had a chance to live, said he believed it was a .32 caliber bullet that ripped through his body while American troops waited to arrest him.

Tojo shot himself in a room be-decked with swords, a crystal cigarette holder and a bound copy of the rescript proclaiming Japan's defeat.

Frank H. Bartholomew, United Press vice-president for the Pacific, was at Tojo's side immediately after he shot himself.

Bartholomew says Tojo uttered these words: "I wanted to die by the sword, but the pistol had to do. I assume responsibility for the war . . . banzai!"

Cheese Ration Lifted; Meats Due For Same

WASHINGTON (UP)—Point values on cheese will be reduced to zero at midnight tonight, the OPA announced today.

At the same time it was learned lower grades of beef will become ration free before Oct. 1. Pork chops and bourbon whiskey are on the way back, OPA chiefs said, because of the bumper corn crop.

The United Press was told yesterday that all meat rationing would end by Oct. 1. However, the Department of Agriculture and the OPA said today pork still is scarce and it was assumed the initial outbreak of meat rationing would involve only beef, perhaps only the lower grades at first.

Standard Time To Be Resumed On September 30

WASHINGTON (UP)—The House interstain commerce committee today approved a bill to turn the nation's clocks back an hour to prewar standard time.

Under terms of the measure, war time would be abolished at 2 A. M. on Sunday, Sept. 30. War time—one hour later than standard time—has been in effect since early February, 1942.

WASHINGTON COLUMN

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Paul V. McNutt is back in town. For the past month he's been making a careful study of conditions in the Philippines, Guam and Okinawa for the President.

It's the same mission that Sen. Millard E. Tydings (D. Md.) attempted recently when he returned in three days after planning to be there four weeks. Why he returned so suddenly is still a mystery. Persons who accompanied him don't know either, but firmly deny the rumor that it was because of a clash with Gen. Douglas MacArthur. So Truman sent McNutt to do the job. He had been high commissioner of the Philippines and knew the situation.

Exactly what McNutt will tell the President isn't known yet. But he has said several times that he favors the immediate appointment of a high commissioner.

Secretary of Interior Harold Ickes has had charge of Philippine affairs during the war. He has been urging the appointment of a high commissioner since the fall of Manila. But Sergio Osmena, president of the Commonwealth, is known to have gotten a promise from the President that he would hold up the appointment. MacArthur was against it, too.

NOW, however, everybody appears to be for it. Something has to be done for the islands soon, and Osmena admits it. MacArthur, with his new eyes in the Pacific, also approves. McNutt himself would be the logical man.

Other possibilities are Weldon Jones, assistant director of the Budget Bureau, who formerly was auditor general of the islands, and Wayne Coy, member of the Filipino Rehabilitation Committee. The sudden end of the war points up the grave situation which exists in the islands. The government there is running out of money. Many local officials haven't been paid for months and the school system is about to fold.

SENATOR TYDINGS has introduced a bill which would lend the government there \$100,000,000 in lieu of payment for war damage but the bill is stuck in a committee. Nothing has been done to pay for war damages other than that and the islanders think we should pay varying amounts from a half to a billion dollars immediately.

Principal reason for the empty coffers is the disappearance of tax sources. The big sugar industries are said to be practically all closed.

Congress has done nothing to prepare for giving the islands their independence. Something will have to be done about trade relations. This is the issue most vitally affecting industry. Under the U. S. there were no regular tariff barriers. If imports to U. S. from an independent Philippines republic have to pay such taxes, the principal industries there won't be worth a nickel.

On top of everything else, politics among the natives is chaotic. General elections will be held the first week of November and it is believed not unlikely that Osmena might be defeated.

BILL KLEM, dean of umpires, called Robert William Andrew Feller the greatest pitcher who ever lived. Certainly none broke in as spectacularly, and the beauty of it was that the Iowa farm boy kept right on going.

The battle-starred gun-fire control director of three theaters won 26 games while losing 33 his last three years, averaging 250 strikeouts the last four years.

No wonder Cleveland pitched a civic celebration for Rapid Robert following his three years and eight months in the Navy.

Feller's return to baseball brings stirring memories.

The August afternoon in 1936 when a 17-year-old Bullet Bob struck out eight Cardinals in the three innings he pitched in an exhibition game. Frank Frisch going crazy when told the kid was a peanut butter. He was, for Cy Slopnicka had his contract all ballooned up, and had him working in the concession department.

FELLER tying the modern big league record by whiffing 17 Athletics in his first start.

Eastern baseball writers seeing Feller for the first time, April 1, 1937, in an exhibition game with the Giants at Jackson, Miss. The press box at the county fair park was only 10 feet behind the catcher, and young Bob wasn't feeling. The baseball writers fell out of it with every pitch.

Following the game the writers hastened to the champion Giants' dressing room for opinions, catching Klem on the way. Feller had pitched only three innings, but Klem, in his enthusiasm, called him the greatest pitcher who ever

lived. A rare compliment indeed, coming from an eagle-eyed umpire pre-dating Christy Mathewson and a National Leaguer at that.

The only criticism came from Dick Bartell. "He's not as fast as Munga," observed the shortstop. Feller struck out Bartell 19 times out of the next 23 times he faced him on the exhibition tour.

FELLER hurting his arm. Slap-nicks taking him to specialists all over the country, and finally yanking the precious soupbone yanked into place by Doc Austin, a bonsetter residing only a few blocks from the Cleveland park.

Feller fanning 16 Red Sox.

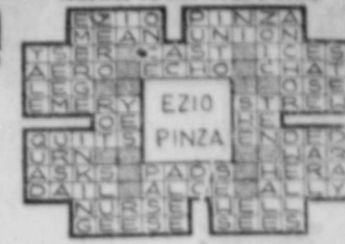

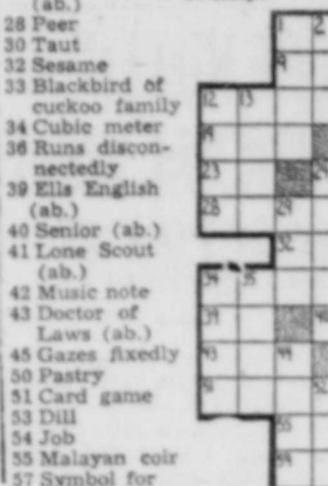

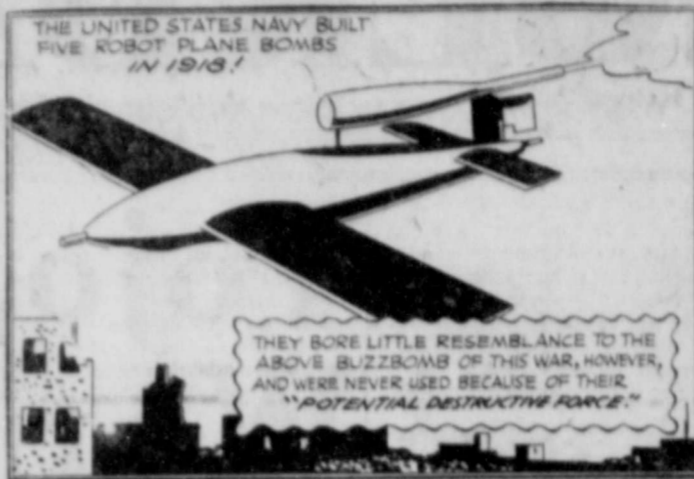

Anglo-Indians May Set Up their Own Colony

BOMBAY (UP)—A new nation may be born after the war if a scheme providing for the colonization of the Andaman Islands by Anglo-Indians and other Eurasians and "Domiciled Europeans" finds sufficient support in India. These peoples, composed of those of mixed European and Asiatic blood and Europeans who have lived in India for generations are faced with a complex problem as the "Indianization" of the government of India draws near, for, while certain leaders advocate an effort to merge with the Indians, others wish to retain close ties with Britain.

As far back as the winter of 1918-19 Anglo-Indians and other leaders met in Singapore to discuss the future of the "Eurasian race" and formed an association which they called the "Britishian League" with the idea of colonizing the Andaman Islands, former

The area of the islands is more than 2,500 square miles and there are less than 500,000 Anglo-Indians and Domiciled Europeans in India, he explained. It is, of course not certain how many of these would wish to go to the Andamans.

The main difficulty in the way of this scheme, he said, is that most members of these communities hesitate to sacrifice their jobs on the Indian railways, posts and telegraphs and in other government organizations. The "pioneering spirit" needed for such an enterprise may be found seriously lacking.

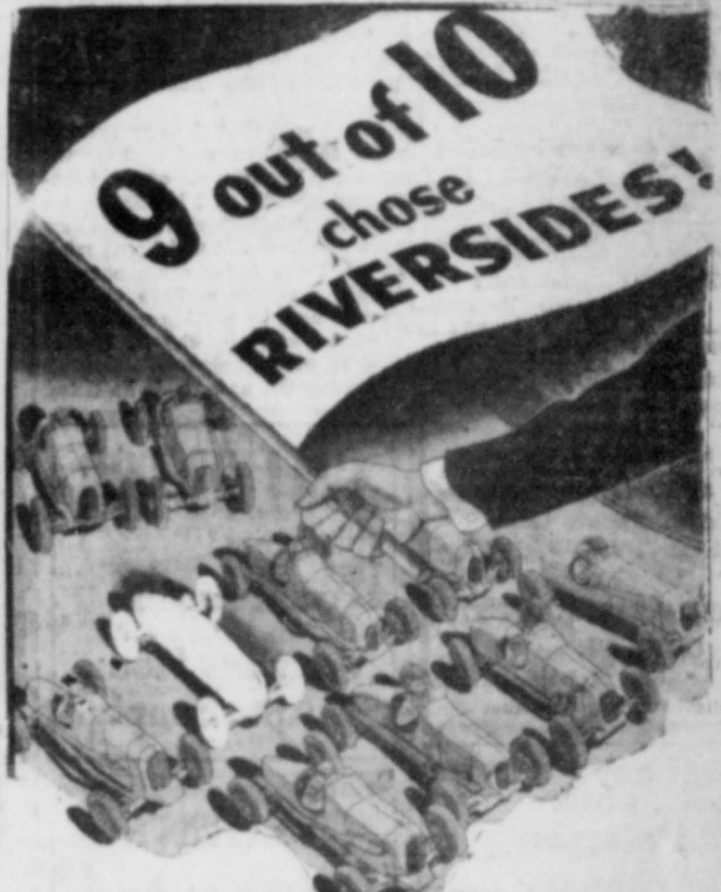

Broken 'Printer' Chief Concern Of United Press Man

LONDON (UP)—United Press bureau in Singapore was located in Battery Road in the center of Singapore city close by the General Post Office.

United Press news service for distribution to newspaper clients throughout Malaya, in December, 1941, was brought to the bureau by a land telegraph line from Penang to a teleprinter in the bureau.

The incoming news service started at 5 a. m., Singapore time and it was the duty of a Malay office assistant named Arshad to check the teleprinter circuit each morning at 4 a. m.

In the event of any defect in the circuit, Arshad was instructed to inform the bureau manager, Harold Guard, immediately by telephone.

At 4:10 a. m., on Dec. 8, 1941, Guard was awakened by a telephone call from Arshad and the following conversation took place:

Arshad: "The teleprinter is

broken, Sir."

Guard: "Broken! How come?" Arshad: "It fell from the table, Sir."

Guard: "Hell! How come it fell from the table?"

Arshad: "Because the bomb

Guard: "Bomb!" And where did the bomb come from?"

Arshad: "From the Japanese airplane, Sir."

It transpired that the first bomb on Singapore city landed in the office building adjoining the UP bureau. All windows were shattered

and a large portion of roof caved in; but Arshad was concerned only with his beloved teleprinter.

London Rents Zoom as Pinch Hits Furniture

LONDON (UP)—If you have the furnishings for a five room apartment in London and a long lease on an apartment to go with them, you can retire to the country.

There's no trick about it. Your house rent, frozen by wartime regulations, probably runs about three guineas (\$12.75) a week. There's no limit on furnished apartments and those with five-room furnishings—stony mattresses included—are going from eight to 12 guineas (\$34-\$51) per week.

On such an income you can live in the English country comfortably even though you pay half your net as income tax.

Those figures typify just one phase of Britain's housing problem—its toughest postwar brow-wrinkler and pocket-pincher.

Costs go like this: Rooming house with breakfast, prewar \$5 per week, now \$17; furnished news (alleys where horses were once stabled) flat, prewar \$8 per week, now \$19-\$20; luxury apartment, furnished, good location, three bedrooms, prewar \$20 per week now \$80 per week.

The average price in London for a two-bedroom furnished apartment comparable to something which goes for \$70 a month in New York City, is approximately \$160 per month. Prewar the same place in London would have been available for approximately \$60 a month. The unfurnished lease actually carries a rental of probably \$40 a month.

There isn't much that can be done about such prices. There is no law against a man asking what he thinks the rental of his furniture is worth. You could complain legally against an exorbitant rate but few bother.

There also is no rule by which you can measure rents, except that you can expect them to be high. The only fixed ones are on unfurnished dwelling units of a total assessed valuation of \$500 and less. And at most rental agencies signs are posted on doors "No unfurnished flats available." As an attendant to this rise in the rental of furnished apartments and houses, furniture prices have gone up. There have

been practically no rugs made for more than five years and little furniture except for the "utility" type in severe line.

A rug which cost new prewar \$80 will bring \$300 in a private sale today. Other articles of value have had comparable rises.

The most recent hikes came as the war ended and Londoners who had moved to escape the blitz, bombs and rockets started to come back. They took over from wartime tenants and automatically the demand went to unheard of levels above supply.

London has a greater problem than this particular furnished flat phase—one involving hundreds of thousands of damaged homes in the London area.

But one thing was obvious: Britain, among the better nations of this part of the world as regards inflationary effects, is in such shape that a single shipment of furniture from America delivered dockside is worth a fortune, and a big one.

Increase In Use Of Milk Causes Austin Shortage

AUSTIN, Tex., (UP) — With people drinking more milk than ever before, this city is facing a serious milk shortage and dairymen are recommending that the city use "recombined milk."

This milk, pasteurized and with the right amount of butter fat is a combination of a milk condensate, which can be easily shipped, cream and water.

The army uses this type of milk, although it inspects the source of the condensate. The chief objection to it is that the condensate is shipped in from distant states, and local health authorities have no way of inspecting those dairies.

The milk may not be sold under Austin ordinances, unless the city health officer declares an emergency.

Dairymen are urging that "recombined milk" be sold, what with the re-opening of the schools and the arrival of the Second Division at Camp Swift.

But Dr. J. M. Coleman, city-county health director, says he must have definite proof that an emergency exists, and until then, "I have no intention," to declare one, he said.

Not even at the peak of our war effort, when fats were required for munitions of shells and bombs and medicines, in addition to the ever-present need for soap, were our needs for salvaging fat greater than now. Our stocks have been drained by four long years of war, and there isn't enough on hand to meet all requirements.

Don't let "Victory psychology" blind you to this national need! If housewives stop saving fats now, the shortage will become even more critical.

Don't let a single drop of used fats go to waste! Little trimmings of fat left on plates, even the skinnings of soups and gravies are important. It is the consistent saving of these small amounts that counts.

Don't turn in fats that can be re-used! But some fats, such as those rendered from lamb and mutton, are not suitable for re-use. Put them immediately in the salvage can. And, with other fats, after you've got all cooking good out of them, there is always a little left. No matter how little it is, save it.

Your butcher will still give you 4c and 2 red points for every pound you turn in. Save consistently—save every drop you can—every day—until Uncle Sam says the job is done.

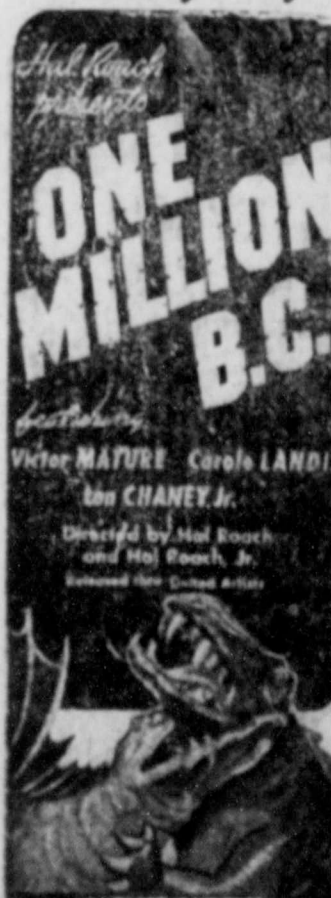
