What the difference is between these and other trick phrases is something that only lawyers and congressmen could think up. If Coopers didn't pass something to make it official, the war might go on forever and you wouldn't know the difference.

BUT even an act of Congress doesn't end the war adequately. Every individual has his own final V-Day, and the dates will differ. For some people the war won't be over till the last tin can can be stepped on, the last pound of fat turned in, the last scrap of paper

For others-wives, mothers and best girls-the war really won't be over till a certain very special man in uniform can come home from the armies of occupation in Germany and Japan. Maybe two, maybe fee years from now. The last man out should signify something when the last displaced war-plant worker finds a peacetime jub.
when the last bit of surplus war property is disposed of, when the
lest record of WPB, WLB and all the other alphabetical war agencies is bound in red tape and shipped to the Archives building, when the last war-criminal is tried, the end will be at hand.

WHEN the new United Nations Organization succeeds in stopping the next war-any next war-that will be something to celebra end wars, like the last one.

As the Veterans' Bureau was recently reported still paying a pension to a descendant of a veteran of the War of 1812, which was begun 133 years ago, it is reasonable to assume that the Veterans' Bureau will be paying benefits to the descendants of this war 133 years hence. That would put the end of the war in the year 2078.


